Jorge Cano, CIP Deputy Director, handed out a written report and stated that program to date expenditures total \$28.7 million of first series funds, \$100 million are under contract or in contract negotiations. City is negotiating \$45 million in job order contracts. Gibson Park, Black Police Precinct, Belafonte Tacolcy improvements, Shenandoah Park and Police headquarter locker rooms are under construction. It's anticipated that by August 2005, the City will have spent or under contract more than \$130 million. Police training facility is going through conceptual design stage. Fire Station 11 is moving forward. Parks and recreation has expenditures over \$20 million. Waterfront improvement projects there are ten active and completed projects. Structural improvements to Orange Bowl stadium have cost nearly \$8 million. Streets and drainage projects are progressing. Quality of Life projects are mostly right-of-way improvements, traffic calming, sidewalks, curbs. Robert Flanders requested that a press release be done to encapsulate this report. Manolo Reyes asked why the water mitigation project in Flagami is taking so long. Jorge Cano explained pump stations were being bided, which would serve the most critical areas. Mary Conway explained that contracting difficulties had slowed project and that a philosophical shift in administration had taken place in that originally the plan was to make pump station improvements but not repave the whole street, fix broken sidewalks, not address American with Disabilities Act deficiencies. A business decision was made to add those elements to the project, which created a time lag.

<u>UPDATES</u>:

1. FEC Corridor Initiatives.

Carmen Sanchez, Planning Department, reported that the regulating plan and economic development component and transportation piece are still pending. This function is now absorbed by the Miami 21 project. Another status report will be given after discussion with the Commissioner of area.

2. Model City Trust – Replacement of HOME Investment Partnership Funds.

Marva Wiley, President of Model City Community Revitalization District Trust, reported that a total of \$3,615,000 has been approved by the HD/NIB board for retrospective and current acquisition. There is a balance of \$1,020,000 remaining currently. Following is a list of projects proposed to be funded with the balance of funds:

- Trust has been successful in receiving other grants, some of them to remediate brownsvilles (contaminated lands). Some of the HD/NIB funds are to be used as matching funds for remediation of contaminated lands.
- A second priority for the Trust is addressing the digital divide by implementing a hot zone to create the opportunity for residents of the area to have access to the internet.
- Lastly, infrastructure improvements will be addressed.

Ms. Wiley further stated that no one has moved into houses yet. The first priority of the Trust was to acquire all properties prior to beginning construction. The reason for this is once you construct houses, the value of area properties increases. Master plan was approved in 2004. There are 86 properties currently in the inventory; of that 26 are slated for single family homes. There are 16 houses ready for implementation. The past six months have been processing necessary permits.

3. Dinner Key Mooring Anchorage Field Project.

Steven Bogner, Marinas Manager, Department of Public Facilities, reported that: (1) the engineering and permitting consultant is in regular contact; (2) preparing to remove 11 derelict and sunken vessels from project area within the next 45 days and identifying additional vessels to be removed; (3) submitting applications for Florida Inland Navigation District for grant monies.

4. Dinner Key Marina Fuel Dock.

Steven Bogner, Marinas Manager, Department of Public Facilities, reported that permit approvals for fuel dock have been secured; construction phase of project has been put out to bid and responses are due March 22, 2005. The next step is the evaluation of proposals by the CIP Dept. and the approval of the contract by the City Commission.

5. Baywalk Improvements at One Miami Site.

Kevin Brown, CIP Dept., reported this walkway along the Miami River is expected to be completed by September or October 2005. Project includes art pieces and water fountain.

6. Neo Lofts Greenway Segment.

Kevin Brown, CIP Dept., reported that a pre-construction meeting took place on February 3rd. Notice to proceed with contract was issued on February 13th. Currently, contractor is acquiring necessary permits. Expecting construction to begin next week. Gary Reshefsky requested before and after photographs. Robert Flanders requested photographs be posted on the board website.

7. Environmental & Title Services for Little Haiti Park Parcel's 18, 60 & 61. Madeline Valdes, Dept. of Economic Development, reported that assessment report was provided to DERM and are awaiting results of its review. Attorney is working on title searches.

8. Summary of Environmental Issue for Little Haiti Park Parcels 60 & 61. Madeline Valdes, Dept. of Economic Development, reported that assessment report was provided to DERM and are awaiting results of its review.

9. Land Acquisition for Little Haiti Park Parcels 93 & 94. Madeline Valdes, Dept. of Economic Development, reported that the City is expected to close on those parcels on March 31st. There are still 23 trailers on site, 13 of them are currently on eviction, nine are owned by employees of the owner. Expected to close at end of March.

10. Little Haiti Park Land Acquisition & Development – Special Counsel for Legal Services.

Madeline Valdes, Dept. of Economic Development, reported that special counsel was retained for eminent domain cases. Parcel No. 92 was successfully acquired. The remaining parcels are pending court hearings. Fund balance of \$165,000 left out of \$200,000 allocated by board.

IV. ADDITIONAL ITEMS:

Oral presentation made by Cary Sanchez-Rea regarding the design build packages for recreational components of Grapeland and Little Haiti Parks.

Grapeland Park: Phase I will encompass full design of the entire facility, construction build out of the tournament fields, auxiliary pavilion for storage rooms, electrical systems, open press area, dugouts, batting cages and vita course and associated parking; phase II will encompass recreational facility, associated parking, and water park component. Commissioner Gonzalez and City Manager Joe Arriola spoke highly in favor of this project and urged the board's support when the item comes back for approval. Manolo Reyes suggested that revenues from concessions of this park should be reverted toward maintenance costs of the park. Mariano Cruz made a motion to accept this presentation, Luis De Rosa seconded. Mary Conway clarified that no board action was necessary. The presentation was for informational purposes only and the board would have a full detail presentation by staff at its March meeting.

• Little Haiti Park: is proposed for N.E. 2 Avenue corridor. Project is to include a 4,000 square foot structure for recreational facility, a 6,000 square foot retrofit structure of 1917 church, breezeway, playground, picnic area, domino park, soccer field, bleachers, equipment rooms, restrooms, concession areas, multi use field, vita course, and landscaping. Staff will come back to board with contracts for approval.

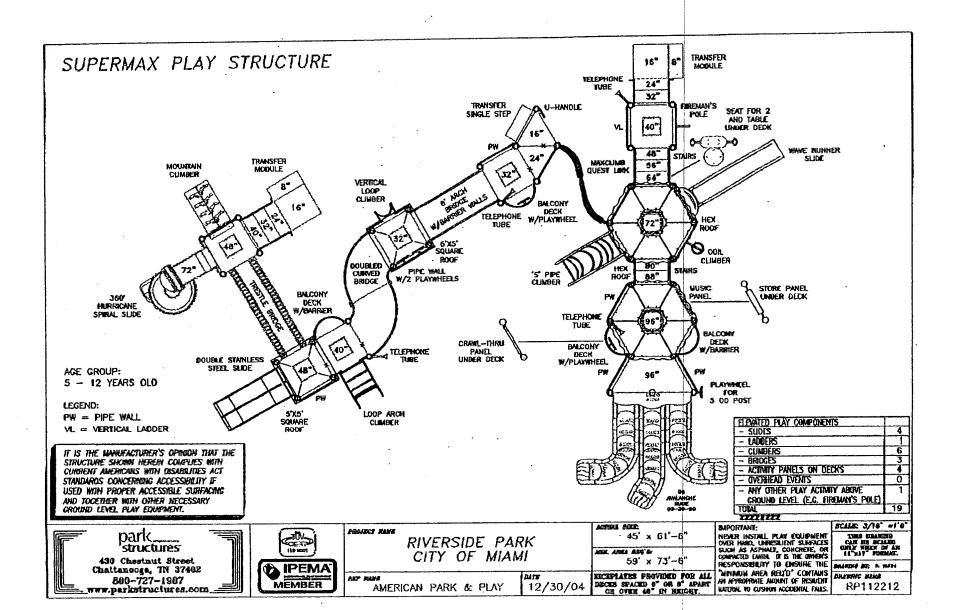

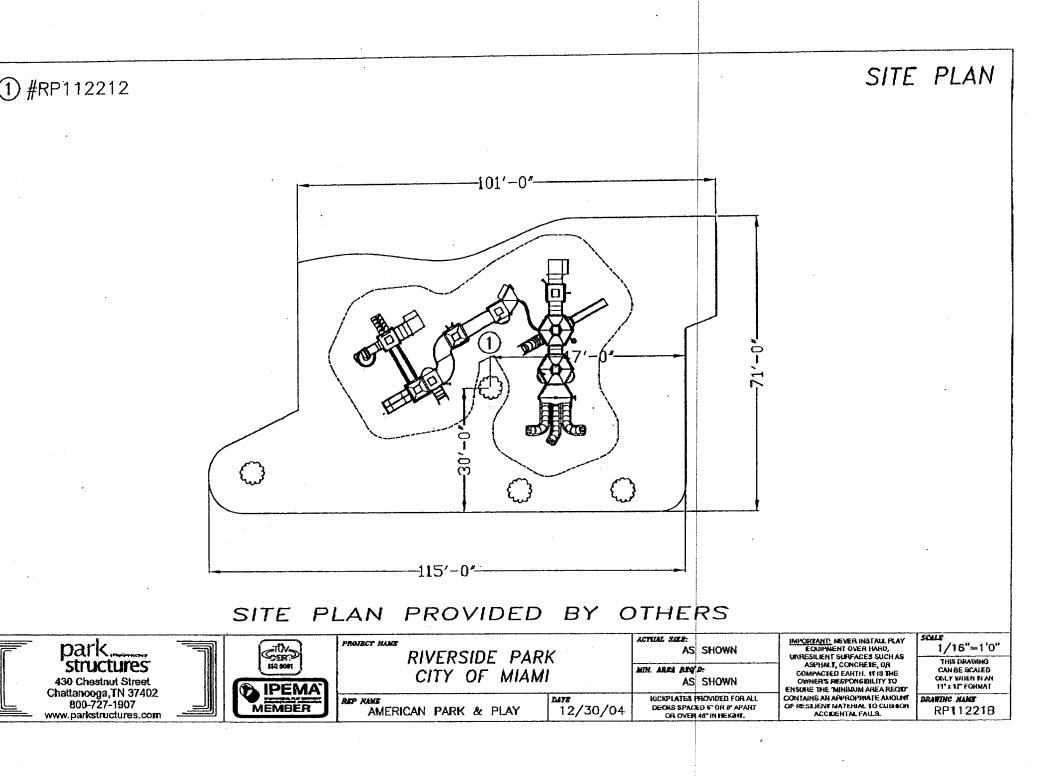

Background Information:

The development of a fine arts museum in Bicentennial Park has been the intent of the City since the late 1990's. When the voters approved the referendum for the Homeland Defense Neighborhood Improvement Bond Program in November 2001, this was an identified project in the pubic information campaign and enabling legislation. MAM has now requested funds to support development activities related to the Project, including a community planning and education charrette and the work of consultants specializing in fine arts museum planning, financial feasibility and project management, having an combined initial cost of \$1,400,000. The City will contribute \$700,000 as an initial grant from available Bond proceeds.

A project cooperation agreement has been devised to govern the responsibilities of the City and MAM in this endeavor. Highlights of that agreement are:

* The museum project and related development activities are deemed to constitute a paramount public purpose

* The City will be given owenership of all ocuments, reports, materials and drawings that are developed with the assistance of City, and will be subsequently donated back to MAM and the County, if applicable, for use on the Project

* MAM and its successors will maintain public access to facilities developed with Bond proceeds, and said facilities will be publicly owned

WHEREAS, on November 13, 2001, the voters of the City of Miami (the "City") approved by referendum the City's issuance of \$255 million in limited ad valorem tax general obligation bonds for homeland security, neighborhood improvements, capital projects and infrastructure improvements, the "Homeland Defense/Neighborhood Improvement Bonds" (the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, the public information campaign conducted for the voter referendum and the enabling legislation identified the "Miami Art Museum" and the allocation of Bond proceeds "to assist the museum in establishing a development site at Bicentennial Park", which is a recreational facility owned by the City and located at 1075 Biscayne Boulevard; and

WHEREAS, the City has completed and approved a community-based plan entitled "Bicentennial Park – Museum Park" which recommends that 4 acres in the Park be reserved for the development of an art museum and an additional 4 acres be reserved for the development of a science museum; and

WHEREAS, Miami Dade County voters also approved, in November of 2004, the issuance of general obligation bonds and has included in its bond program the sum of \$100,000,000 to support the development of a new art museum facility in Bicentennial Park, hereinafter referred to as the "Project"; and

WHEREAS, the Project will be a public fine arts museum, a significant community asset offering a first class art collections, exhibitions, classes and courses located in an approved site in the Park and will enhance the artistic and cultural vibrancy and life of the City, and of its residents and visitors

WHEREAS, the Center for Fine Arts Association, Inc. was the operator of the regional fine arts museum located on Miami-Dade County property when it opened in 1984, and was subsequently re-organized in 1996 as Miami Art Museum of Dade County, Inc. ("MAM"); and

WHEREAS, MAM is a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization devoted to the collection and presentation of works of fine art for the use and enjoyment of the general public and has operated the regional fine arts museum since 1996; and

WHERAS, MAM has been a significant contributor and an integral partner in the processes undertaken thus far for the Project; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the City to continue to foster the existing coalition for the Project with MAM and Miami Dade County and to secure a legal arrangement with the parties for the design and implementation of the Project at said City-owned park; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the Project, MAM has conducted a community planning and education charrette and desires to secure consultants specializing in fine arts museum planning, financial feasibility and project management, having an combined initial cost of \$1,400,000; and

WHEREAS, MAM has requested funds from the Bond proceeds in the amount of \$700,000 to cover one-half the cost of these initial Project activities; and

WHEREAS, MAM has agreed that all documents, reports, materials and drawings that are developed with the assistance of City Bond proceed shall become the property of and be owned by the City, which will subsequently donate such documents, reports, materials and drawings back to MAM and the County, if applicable, for use on the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City finds and determines that these activities to be conducted by or on behalf of MAM for the Project will ultimately and primarily benefit the general public as a downtown regional cultural facility accessible to the public; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission, by passage of this Resolution, will authorize the allocation of City funds in the amount of \$700,000 for the acquisition of certain capital project related planning, design and project management activities and will further authorize the City Manager to execute an project cooperation agreement for this purpose; and

WHEREAS, the agreement lays forth the duties and responsibilities of the City and MAM provides for the use, accountability, accessibility, and terms of this undertaking by MAM; and

WHEREAS, the agreement also provides for MAM and its successors to maintain public access to facilities developed with Bond proceeds, and that said facilities will be publicly owned; and

WHEREAS, the City's Bond Oversight Board additionally reviewed and favorably recommended the proposed use of such funds at its meeting of March 22, 2005; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission hereby finds and determines that proper use of this allocation will primarily benefit the general public and serves a paramount public purpose; and

WHEREAS, funds for this purpose are available from Capital Improvements Project No. 333144, entitled "Miami Art Museum – Bicentennial Park", under the Homeland Defense – Neighborhood Improvement Bond Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MIAMI, FLORIDA:

Section 1. The recitals and findings contained in the Preamble to this Resolution are hereby adopted by reference thereto and incorporated herein as if fully set forth in this Section.

Section 2. An initial grant of \$700,000 to the Miami Art Museum Of Dade County Association, Inc. ("MAM") to support the development of a new museum facility in the Cityowned Bicentennial Park as approved by a referendum of the voters in November 2001 as a specified project in the Homeland Defense Neighborhood Improvement Bond Program, and allocating funds in said amount from Capital Improvement Project No. 333144 entitled "Miami Art Museum – Bicentennial Park".

Section 3. The City Manager is authorized {1} to execute the attached project cooperation agreement, in substantially the attached form, for this purpose.

Section 4. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption and signature of the Mayor {2}

Project Description: Planning, development and project management activities relating to the construction of Miami Art Museum to be located at the CITY's Bicentennial Park.

THIS AGREEMENT (hereinafter referred to as the "AGREEMENT") is made and entered into as of ______, 2004, with the specified effective date, by and between the CITY OF MIAMI, a municipal corporation of the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as "CITY"), with offices at 444 S.W. 2nd Avenue, Miami, Florida 33130-1910 and the GRANTEE named above, with offices located at the Grantee Street Address given above.

RECITALS

The intent of this Agreement is to outline the respective expectations and obligations of the parties regarding the specified cooperative capital improvement project (the "PROJECT") named above and further defined in this document.

The GRANTEE has initiated and/or is responsible for the completion of the PROJECT, for which it has requested financial assistance from the CITY for payment of certain allowable costs and expenses.

The CITY has adopted Enabling Legislation, referenced above and incorporated by reference as though set forth in full, to allow the CITY'S participation in the PROJECT, and authorizes the

CITY MANAGER to execute the necessary documents for this purpose.

WHEREAS, GRANTEE is to be the operator of the PROJECT which will be a public museum, offering a first class art collections, exhibitions, classes and courses which will be located in an approved site in the CITY of Miami Bicentennial Park (the "Museum Site") for not less than twenty (20) years from the date its doors open to the public;

WHEREAS, the Miami Art Museum to be located at the Museum Site will further enhance the public arts in an area adjacent to the future Miami-Dade County Cultural Arts Center, projected to open in 2006, and will further enhance the artistic and cultural vibrancy and life of the CITY, and of its residents and visitors;

WHEREAS, the PROJECT will be a significant community asset, and the grant funds appropriately employed by the GRANTEE in accordance with this Agreement serve an important public purpose, and accordingly the CITY has agreed to make the Grant to the GRANTEE under the terms and conditions set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of foregoing, the GRANTEE and the CITY intend as follows:

1 Definitions

- 1.1 <u>DELIVERABLES</u>: Items identified on Exhibit A to be submitted to the CITY for approval prior to proceeding to a subsequent task or activity of the WORK and required as a condition for reimbursement.
- <u>DIRECTOR</u>: shall mean the CITY's Director of the Department of Capital Improvements, or his authorized Designee.
- 1.3 ELIGIBLE EXPENSES: For purposes of this Agreement, Project-related costs that may be funded from the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT shall be defined to mean and include fees for professional engineers, architects, landscape architects, surveyors, mapping, other bona fide design professionals, planning professionals and related materials, and geotechnical testing. There shall be no mark up on such cost passed to the CITY. All persons and/or firms engaged shall be duly licensed and certified as required by the laws of the State of Florida. These costs are identified in Exhibit A as approved Project-related expenses, and as such, shall be eligible for reimbursement from the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT.
- 1.4 <u>GRANTEE:</u> A Florida not-for-profit corporation existing under the laws of the State of Florida.
- 1.5 <u>GRANTEE Project Manager</u>: Person designated by Grantee to manage and supervise all activities relating to the PROJECT.
- 1.6 <u>INELIGIBLE EXPENSES</u>: For purposes of this Agreement, eligible expenses may not be used for payment to employees, employee benefits, day-to-day expenses, payroll, lobbyists, legal counsel, or other obligations, debts, liabilities or costs or GRANTEE. In addition, expenses shall not include the costs of land or rights of way, and fees for lobbyists, legal or tax, environmental or regulatory counsel, auditors, accountants, brokers and salespersons or any other costs not expressly allowable by Section 1.3. There shall be no mark up by GRANTEE on any costs, that is, only the actual, direct

cost incurred by GRANTEE may be billed to the CITY for reimbursement.

- 1.7 <u>PROJECT</u>: Shall mean all activities and items, including but not limited to the WORK, required to provide a functional and/or useable facility or program for the use and enjoyment of the public as described above and as approved by the CITY Commission as appropriate for CITY participation.
- 1.8 <u>WORK</u>: Shall mean the activities and items approved by CITY (or Director) to be paid by the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT, as identified in Exhibit A or revisions thereto.
- 1.9 <u>TERM</u>: Shall mean the period this agreement is in effect, which shall commence on the effective date and shall terminate no later than three (3) years from the effective date. The CITY shall provide the option to renew for additional one (1) year periods upon the CITY's approval for satisfactory performance and progress.

2 <u>CITY Representative</u>: Except as otherwise stipulated herein, the DIRECTOR shall be responsible to render direction, assistance and decisions to GRANTEE regarding this Agreement. The DIRECTOR shall assign a Representative to handle the day-to-day, ministerial and other matters relating to this Agreement.

3 Assistance From CITY: The CITY agrees to provide the following:

- 3.1 Financial assistance in an amount not to exceed \$600,000, the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT, from the designated FUNDING SOURCE for the WORK approved by the Enabling Legislation and as further specified in the attached Exhibit A. CITY shall have no obligation to fund any amounts in excess of the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT. Said funds will be paid on a reimbursement basis to GRANTEE as set forth in Section 10 herein.
- 3.2 Other Assistance not applicable
- 4 Grantee Responsibilities:

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- 4.1 The GRANTEE shall ensure the timely and satisfactory completion of the WORK relating directly to the PROJECT within the Total Estimated Project Cost and within the Time for Performance as specified in Exhibit A to this Agreement.
- 4.2 GRANTEE shall provide all additional funds above the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT to complete the PROJECT up to the Total Estimated Project Cost, including without

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limitation any Cost Overruns and/or change orders for the WORK.

- 4.3 The GRANTEE shall manage and supervise all aspects of the WORK including without limitation, designing, engineering, scheduling, permitting, materials, labor, means and methods of construction, and the hiring of contractors, consultants, and suppliers the like.
- 4.4 The GRANTEE shall fund the cost of all WORK from its own resources and seek reimbursement from the CITY in the manner set forth in this Agreement.
- 4.5 Any advance payment of the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT and funds of the GRANTEE shall be maintained in separate and independent bank accounts to be used solely and exclusively for the PROJECT. Any interest accruing from any advance of City funds shall be regularly reported and repaid to the City.
- 4.6 Unless otherwise approved by the CITY Commission, GRANTEE shall not be entitled to any unspent funds from the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT should the WORK be completed at a cost less than the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT.
- 4.7 If the cost of completion of the Project is less than the FUNDING AMOUNT, one hundred percent of the savings shall accrue to the CITY.

5 <u>Ownership:</u> The parties agree that the <u>CITY</u> shall be the owner of the <u>documents</u>, plans, specifications and permits <u>created by virtue of the</u> <u>CITY FUNDING AMOUNT</u>, which shall be donated <u>back to GRANTEE for its use in connection solely</u> with the PROJECT.

Homeland Defense Bonds, Condition Precedent: Where the CITY FUNDING SOURCE for the FUNDING AMOUNT, or any portion thereof, has been identified as the Limited Ad Valorem Tax Bonds, Series 2002, "Homeland Defense / Neighborhood Improvement Bonds" (the "Bonds"), it is a condition precedent to the CITY'S ability to lawfully enter into this Agreement that the CITY receive a favorable recommendation from its Bond Oversight Board stating that the CITY may apply a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds to fund the specified PROJECT pursuant to the terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement. This condition has been fully performed as the Bond Oversight Board approved the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT for these stated purposes at its meeting of

Land and facilities acquired, developed, improved or rehabilitated using Bond proceeds shall be dedicated and maintained in perpetuity for the benefit of the general public. All sites and/or facilities receiving the benefit of Bond proceeds shall be open and/or accessible to the public at reasonable times and shall be managed in a safe and attractive manner appropriate for public use. Equipment acquired using Bond proceeds shall be used for a bona fide public purpose and there shall be no resulting, or only incidental, private benefit.

7 Project Progress.

In addition to those items listed on Exhibit A as Deliverables, the DIRECTOR or his duly authorized designee, may require for his review and approval all specifications and/or preparatory or design documents and cost estimates at progress phases deemed appropriate by the DIRECTOR. GRANTEE shall duly consider and implement comments and revisions suggested by the DIRECTOR from such periodic reviews. Throughout the preparatory or design process, GRANTEE shall use its best effort to ensure that the WORK and the PROJECT can be completed within the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT and Total Estimated Project Cost, respectively.

Such Documents shall be forwarded to the DIRECTOR for his review and approval as to consistency with the PROJECT as presented by GRANTEE to CITY, and said approval by DIRECTOR shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. In the event the DIRECTOR fails to comment in writing on such documents in writing within thirty (30) days of their transmittal to him, the documents will be deemed approved without the necessity of further action.

GRANTEE shall keep DIRECTOR informed as to the progress of the PROJECT by submitting progress reports quarterly within 30 days of the month following the end of each quarter ending December 31, March 31, June 30 and September 30. The report should provide information regarding project status, activities, funding raised and expended.

8 Changes to Scope of WORK: In order to assure that the WORK and the PROJECT can be completed within the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT and Total Estimated Project Cost, respectively, the GRANTEE may request adjustments to the scope of WORK identified in Exhibit A. Such adjustments and any revisions to Exhibit A shall be at the sole discretion of the DIRECTOR. There shall be no modification in scope that, solely in the opinion of the DIRECTOR, negatively impacts or reduces the standards of quality or aesthetics incorporated into the PROJECT as originally presented to the CITY. 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9 <u>Match Required</u>:

The GRANTEE shall identify, secure and expend <u>an</u> amount equal to the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT as the required matching funds for the Work. At the request of DIRECTOR, GRANTEE shall furnish such evidence of matching funds as DIRECTOR deems appropriate, including submittal of an audited financial statement prepared by and Independent Certified Public Accountant. Any portion of the GRANTEE match funds not substantiated will result in a proportionate reduction in the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT.

The use of Matching Funds shall be restricted to the Eligible Expenses defined herein. Any expenditure of Matching Funds occurring before <u>August 2002 are not</u> Eligible Expenses.

10 Reimbursement Requests.

- 10.1 The Reimbursement request will be payable no earlier than forty five (45) days following the execution of this Agreement.
- 10.2 GRANTEE shall submit a detailed invoice or reimbursement request, as required by Section 3.1, which complies with Florida's Prompt Payment Act, §218.70, Fla. Stat. (2003) to the CITY for all Eligible Expenses relating to the WORK performed during the preceding period, with along reasonable substantiating documentation requested by as the DIRECTOR including, without limitation, copies of invoices and cancelled checks. Provided the WORK has been performed, the CITY shall make payment within forty-five (45) days after the date the CITY receives a completed reimbursement request including a sufficiently detailed invoice.
- DIRECTOR, in his/her sole discretion, may 10.3 approve advance payments to GRANTEE of not more than 10% of the available balance of the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT upon receipt of written request justifying, in DIRECTOR'S sole opinion, the need for such advance payment. A percentage of all advance payments shall be deducted from all subsequent reimbursement requests until such time that the advance payment is covered 100%. Verification and substantiation as to the use of all advance payments shall be as stated above. The DIRECTOR has the right to retain a portion of the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT equal to all advance payments until such time as the advance payments are properly documented.
- 10.4 City will not make reimbursement of any expenses occurring before <u>August 2002</u>.

11 No damages for Delay. In the event of anydelays to the PROJECT and/or WORK, GRANTEE's sole remedy shall be to seek an extension of time from the DIRECTOR. GRANTEE is not entitled to delay damages under this Agreement or under any related agreement with the CITY. The CITY will not be liable for any delay damages or damages in any way attributable to performing work out of sequence, acceleration claims, Eichlea formula claims, or other similar type claims, work slow downs, inefficiencies, sequencing issues, strikes, lockouts, reduced productivity, or even Acts of God.

12 Insurance and Bonding

- 12.1 Insurance: The CITY's Risk Management Administrator. reserves..the .right to .require. GRANTEE, prior to commencing the WORK, to provide the CITY's Risk Management Administrator with evidence, consisting of certificates or policies of insurance documenting: (a) builder's risk insurance; and (b) general liability insurance, (c) professional liability insurance. The CITY of Miami shall be a named insured on all liability policies relating to the WORK except professional liability policies. See Exhibit C.
- Payment and Performance Bond: 12.2 Where WORK includes the construction of improvements, prior to commencing the WORK, GRANTEE shall provide to the CITY's Risk Management Administrator a copy of the Payment and Performance Bond from the general contractor in substantially the form prescribed for a public construction bond by Section 255.05, Fla. Stat. (2003). The CITY shall be a named obligee on the Payment And Performance Bond required by this section which shall be in an amount not less than the CITY FUNDING AMOUNT allocated for those improvements. As allowed under the provisions of §255.05(7), Florida Statutes (2003) the CITY'S Risk Management Administrator may, in writing, decide to accept an alternative form of security in lieu of the Payment and Performance Bond, in such form and amounts as may be reasonably required by the CITY's Risk Management Administrator.
- 12.3 The CITY's Risk Management Administrator shall be given at least 30 days prior written notice of any cancellation, lapse, or material modification of said insurance coverage and/or bond.

13 Indemnity

The GRANTEE shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY and its officers, employees, agents and instrumentalities from any and all liability, losses or damages, including attorneys' fees and costs of Formatted: Underline

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defense, which the CITY or its officers, employees, agents or instrumentalities may incur as a result of claims, demands, suits, causes of actions or proceedings of any kind or nature arising out of, relating to or resulting from the performance of this agreement by the GRANTEE or its employees, agents. servants. partners, principals subcontractors. The GRANTEE shall pay all claims and losses in connection therewith and shall investigate and defend all claims, suits or actions of any kind or nature in the name of the CITY, where applicable, including appellate proceedings, and shall pay all costs, judgments, and attorneys' fees which may issue thereon. Provided, however, this indemnification, when applied to negligence actions, shall only be to the extent and within the limitations of Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, subject to the provisions of that statute whereby the GRANTEE shall not be held liable to pay a personal injury or property damage claim or judgment by any one person which exceeds the sum of \$100,000, or any claim or judgment or portions thereof, which, when totaled with all other claims or judgment paid by the government entity arising out of the same incident or occurrence, exceed the sum of \$200,000 from any and all personal injury or property damage claims, liabilities, losses or causes of action which may arise as a result of the negligence of the GRANTEE. The limitations in Section 768.28, Florida Statute shall only apply to indemnity claims relative to negligence actions, otherwise (e.g. for contract and all other civil actions) this indemnity is not so limited.

14 <u>Audit_Rights.</u> Pursuant to the applicable provisions of §18-100 to §18-102 of the Code of the CITY of Miami, as amended from time to time which are deemed as being incorporated by reference herein, the CITY may audit GRANTEE's records relating to this Agreement, during regular business hours, at a location within the CITY of Miami during the term of this Agreement and for three (3) years thereafter.

15 <u>Compliance With Laws</u>. GRANTEE and the CITY shall at all times comply with all applicable municipal, county, state and federal laws, ordinances, codes, statutes, rules and regulations, approved development orders, and written CITY of Miami Guidelines governing the design and construction of the Improvements and the granting of funds for use thereof.

16 Miscellaneous

16.1 <u>Enforcement</u> The provisions of this Agreement may be enforced in Miami Dade County by all appropriate actions in law and in equity by any party to this Agreement. In order to expedite the conclusion of the actions brought pursuant to this Agreement, the parties, their successors and assigns will not demand jury trial nor file permissive

counterclaims outside the bounds of this Agreement in such actions. Each party shall bear their own respective attorney's fees. A court of competent jurisdiction may award court costs to a prevailing party.

- 16.2 <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts and by the separate parties hereto in separate counterparts, each of which when taken together shall be deemed to be one and the same instrument.
- 16.3 <u>CITY Officials</u>. The "CITY" is a municipal corporation, and the CITY Manager as its Chief Administrative Officer, or the DIRECTOR as the CITY Manager's designee, is empowered to make all decisions with regard to this Agreement on behalf of the CITY, unless otherwise provided by law or by resolution of the CITY Commission.
- 16.4 Successors and Assigns. This Agreement may not be assigned, sold, pledged, hypothecated or encumbered, in whole or in part, to any third party or business entity, contract vendee, successor, assign or to an institutional lender providing funding for the PROJECT, without the prior approval of the Miami CITY Commission. The CITY is relying on the commitment, skill and reputation of GRANTEE in performing this work and may withhold or cancel funding in the event there is any assignment, pledge, sale or other disposition by GRANTEE without having first secured the approval of the CITY Manager or his designee, which may be unreasonably withheld or delayed.
- 16.5 Notices. Any and all notices required or desired to be given hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered by hand (including recognized overnight courier services, such as Federal Express) or three (3) business days after deposit in the United States mail, by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, and addressed to the CITY Manager and/or Director for the CITY; and President/CEO of the GRANTEE as applicable at the address for such party set forth in the introductory paragraph to this Agreement (or to such other address as any party hereunder shall hereafter specify to the other in writing).
- 16.6 <u>Construction</u>. The section headings contained in this Agreement are for reference purposes only and shall not affect the meaning or interpretation hereof. All of the parties to this Agreement have participated fully in the

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negotiation of this Agreement, and accordingly, this Agreement shall not be more strictly construed against any one of the parties hereto. In construing this Agreement, the singular shall be held to include the plural, the plural shall be held to include the singular, and reference to any particular gender shall be held to include every other and all genders.

- 16.7 <u>Exhibits</u>. All of the Exhibits attached to this Agreement are incorporated in, and made a part of, this Agreement.
- 16.8 <u>Amendments: Termination</u>. This Agreement may not be amended, modified or terminated except by written agreement of the parties hereto. Further, no modification or amendment, excepting a termination for cause by the CITY under Section 17 herein, shall be effective unless in writing and executed by the parties, employing the same formalities as were used in the execution of this Agreement.
- 16.9 <u>OSHA</u>. The GRANTEE warrants that it will comply with all safety precautions as required by federal, state or local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances. The CITY reserves the right to refuse GRANTEE access to CITY property, including project jobsites, if GRANTEE employees are not properly equipped with safety gear in accordance with OSHA regulations or if a continuing pattern of non-compliance with safety regulations is exhibited by GRANTEE.
- 16.10 <u>ADA</u>. In the course of providing any work, labor or services funded by the CITY, GRANTEE (or its agents and representatives, as applicable) shall affirmatively comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") including Titles I & II of the ADA regarding non-discrimination on the basis of disability, and related regulations, guidelines and standards as appropriate. Additionally, GRANTEE will take affirmative steps to ensure non-discrimination in employment of disabled persons.

17 Default, Termination.

17.1 In the event of default, CITY shall suspend or withhold reimbursements from GRANTEE. The GRANTEE agrees to repay the CITY on or before thirty (30) days from the date the City Manager declares default of the Agreement that has not been cured to the satisfaction of the City Manager in accordance with Section 17.3 of this Agreement. In the event of default the FUNDING AMOUNT will be considered a loan from the CITY and the CITY may institute any civil actions available by virtue of Florida law, including without limitation, moneys lent

and/or open account, among others, to recover such funds. Any amounts not paid when due shall accrue interest at the highest rate permitted by Florida law.

- 17.2 Default, and subsequent termination for cause may include, without limitation, any of the following:
 - 17.2.1 GRANTEE fails to obtain the insurance or bonding herein required.
 - 17.2.2 GRANTEE fails to comply, in a substantial or material sense, with any of its duties under this Agreement, any terms or conditions set forth in this Agreement, or any Agreement it has with the CITY, its architect, engineer or contractor arising by virtue of this Agreement, beyond the specified period allowed to cure such default.
 - 17.2.3 GRANTEE fails to complete the Improvements in a timely manner as required by this Agreement.
- 17.3 <u>Termination for Cause; Force Majeure</u>. In the event of a default, which is not cured within ninety (90) days following the date of a written notice mailed as provided in Section 16.5, the parties shall have all rights and remedies provided by law or equity, subject to the limitations of this Agreement. The CITY Manager may grant one additional extension of not more than ninety (90) additional days in total if such failure to cure is due to Force Majeure as that term is interpreted under Florida law.
- 17.4 This Agreement and/or the CITY's funding obligations under the Agreement may be terminated, for cause, at the option of and by the CITY Manager, if any default is not cured by GRANTEE or GRANTEE does not comply with any material terms, covenants or condition provided herein within ninety (90) days from the date of a written notice from the CITY Manager; or when, in the opinion of the CITY Commission, termination is necessary to protect the interests of public health, safety or general welfare. This subsection shall not apply during any period of Force Majeure extension pursuant to Section 17.3.
- 17.5 The laws of the State of Florida shall govern this Agreement. Venue in any civil actions between the parties shall be in Miami-Dade County, Florida. In order to expedite the conclusion of any civil actions instituted by virtue of this Agreement the parties voluntarily and mutually waive their respective rights to demand a jury trial or to file permissive

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counterclaims in civil actions between them. Each party shall bear their own attorney's fees.

18 <u>No Third-Party Beneficiaries</u>. Neither the CITY nor GRANTEE intends to directly or substantially benefit a third-party by this Agreement. Therefore, the parties agree there are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement and that no third-party shall be entitled to assert a claim against either of them based upon this Agreement.

19 <u>Authority of GRANTEE Signatories</u>. The undersigned executing this Agreement on behalf of GRANTEE has authority of record pursuant to the attached Corporate Resolution, and all applicable laws of the State of Florida to act on behalf of and

bind GRANTEE to every condition, covenant and duty set forth herein.

20 <u>Contingency</u> Clause. Funding for this Agreement is contingent on the availability of funds and of continued authorization for program activities and is subject to termination due to lack of funds or authorization, reduction of funds, and/ or change in laws or legal requirements.

21 Joint Preparation. Preparation of this Agreement has been a joint effort of the CITY and GRANTEE and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than the other.

Purpose of Item:

To authorize the City Manager to execute the negotiated Design-Build contract with Recreation Design and Construction, Inc. for the Grapeland Heights Park Ballfield Complex, B-60496 in the total amoount of \$6,000,000.

Background Information:

The City has established a capital improvement project under the Homeland Defense - Neighborhood Improvement Bond program to design and construct a regulation ballfield complex in Grapeland Heights Park, located at 1550 NW 37th Street, Miami. In December of 2004, the City determined that this Project is best implemented using a Design-Build process, with Recreation Design and Construction, Inc. serving as the contractor lead and Corzo Castella Carballo Thompson Salman, PA. ("C3TS") as the design consultant; pursuant to Resolution No. 04-0786.

RDC and the Director of the Capital Improvements and Transportation Department have negotiated an agreement for the design and construction of the Project, laying forth the duties and obligations of the parties, and established a not to exceed fee of \$6,000,000 for the comprehensive design-build service. The Project will consist of a four (4) tournament regulation baseball/softball fields, a building to house concessions, locker rooms, restrooms, storage and a press box, batting cages, dugouts, demolition, sitework and grading, irrigation, sport and security lighting, and related parking.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MIAMI CITY COMMISSION, WITH ATTACHMENT(S), BY A FOUR-FIFTHS (4/5THS) AFFIRMATIVE VOTE, RELATING TO CERTAIN PROJECTS FUNDED FROM THE HOMELAND DEFENSE NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT BOND PROCEEDS, SPECIFICALLY, GRAPELAND HEIGHTS PARK WATER THEME PARK (B-35828), GRAPELAND HEIGHTS PARK COMMUNITY RECREATION FACILITY AND PARKING (B-30105), GRAPELAND HEIGHTS PARK FIELDS & SITE DEVELOPMENT (B-60496); JOSE MARTI PARK GYMNASIUM (B-35857), LITTLE HAITI PARK CULTURAL CAMPUS (B-30295) AND LITTLE HAITI PARK SOCCER AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES (B-38500), RATIFYING, APPROVING AND CONFIRMING THE CITY MANAGER'S FINDING OF AN EMERGENCY THAT IT IS IN THE BEST INTEREST OF THE PUBLIC TO WAIVE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR COMPETITIVE PROCUREMENT PROCEDURES, PROVIDED IN THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MIAMI CODE SECTIONS 18-86 AND 18-87 AND UNDER FLORIDA STATUTES 255.20 AND 287.055, FOR THE SELECTION OF THE ARCHITECT/ENGINEER AND/OR CONTRACTOR FOR THE PROJECTS DEFINED HEREIN; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO NEGOTIATE AGREEMENTS BETWEEN THE CITY OF MIAMI AND THE FIRMS NAMED HEREIN TO PROVIDE THE REQUIRED DESIGN (ARCHITECTURE AND ENGINEERING), DESIGN-BUILD, AND/OR CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT-AT-RISK SERVICES, AS APPLICABLE PER PROJECT, AND PRESENT SAID CONTRACTS TO THE CITY COMMISSION FOR REVIEW AND APPROVAL AT A LATER DATE.

WHEREAS, on August 8, 2002 the CITY, with the prior approval of the voters, issued Limited Ad Valorem Tax Bonds, Series 2002, known as the Homeland Defense Neighborhood Improvement Bonds ("Bonds"), in the aggregate principle amount of \$153,186,405.85 as taxexempt bonds, for the purpose of funding capital improvement projects identified pursuant to Ordinance No. 12137 adopted October 11, 2001; and

WHEREAS, projects to be implemented with the included several sizeable projects for improvements at Grapeland Heights Park and Jose Marti Park, and the creation of a new, state-of-the-art park within the Little Haiti community; and

WHEREAS, these projects have been further refined, scoped and subsequently programmed into the City's Capital Improvement Program and Multi-Year Plan as: Grapeland Heights Park Water Theme Park (B-35828), Grapeland Heights Park Community Recreation Facility and Parking (B-30105), Grapeland Heights Park Fields & Site Development (B-60496), Jose Marti Park Gymnasium (B-35857), Little Haiti Park Cultural Campus (B-30295), and Little Haiti Park Soccer And Recreational Facilities (B-38500); and

WHEREAS, the total present commitment of Bond proceeds to these projects is \$33,879,655, representing over 21% of the Bonds issued, and the combined estimated cost of these projects is approximately \$58 million based on a total build out of the desired project scope, with funds anticipated from other City and outside sources; and

WHEREAS, there have been lengthy delays in implementing the projects funded from Bond Proceeds, which delays preclude the City's ability to issue subsequent bonds for other City needs, including the balance of projects intended under the Bond Program; and

WHEREAS, the Administration has determined that the most expeditious methods to implement these projects are as either Design-Build projects, governed by Section 18-87 of the City Code and Section 287.055 of Florida Statutes, known as the Consultants Competitive Negotiations Act ("CCNA), or as Construction Management-at-Risk projects, governed by Section 18-86 of the City Code; and

WHEREAS, these delivery methods combine design and construction teams to compress project schedules over traditional design – bid – build scenarios to a 1 - 3 year time frame, improve project integrity, and reduce costs, particularly addressing or eliminating change orders and cost overruns; and

WHEREAS, procurement procedures normally utilized to secure these methods also require significant time, from six (6) months to one (1) year, to complete, thereby compounding the delay, further hampering the City's bonding capacity and the delivery of these projects for the benefit of the community; and

WHEREAS, the Administration has determined that the most expeditious method of implementing the Grapeland Heights Park projects (B-35828, B-30105 and B-60496), and the Little Haiti Park Soccer and Recreational Facilities project (B-38500) is to use the **Design-Build** method; and

WHEREAS, the Administration recommends that Recreation Design Consultants serve as the prime consultant/contractor for the Grapeland Heights Park projects (B-35828, B-30105, and B-60496) with the design firm of Carzo Castella Caballo Thompson Salman (C3TS) as the subconsultant/engineer; and

WHEREAS, the Administration recommends that Recreation Design Consultants serve as the prime consultant/contractor for the Little Haiti Park Soccer and Recreational Facilities (B-38500) with the design firm of Zyscovich Architects as the subconsultant/architect; and

WHEREAS, the Administration has determined that the most expeditious method of implementing the Jose Marti Park Gymnasium (B-35857) and Little Haiti Park Cultural Campus (B-30295) projects is to use the **Construction Management-at-Risk** method, and

WHEREAS, the Administration recommends that Pirtle Construction Company, Inc. serve as the contractor, Construction Manager at Risk, for the Jose Marti Park Gymnasium project (B-35857) and that the design firm of Zyscovich Architects serve as the architect for the project under a previously existing agreement dated June 24, 2002 subject to the additional approval of the City Commission requested herein; and

WHEREAS, the Administration recommends that Pirtle Construction Company, Inc. serve as the contractor, Construction Manager at Risk, for the Little Haiti Park Cultural Campus (B-30295) project and that the design firm of Zyscovich Architects continue as the architect for the project as approved by Resolution No. 04-0151 adopted March 11, 2004 under its previously existing agreement dated June 24, 2002; and

WHEREAS, the Administration has investigated and identified the aforementioned firms as having excellent qualifications uniquely geared to the projects for which they are recommended, substantial records of experience in projects of like size and complexity, and are appropriately licensed; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager recommends that he be authorized to negotiate appropriate contract terms, conditions and compensation with each Design-Build and

Construction Management-at-Risk service provider and return to the City Commission for review and approval of each contract at a later date; and

WHEREAS, presently, funds for the Projects are available under the Capital Improvement Program as follows: Grapeland Heights Park Water Theme Park (B-35828) - \$7,000,000, Grapeland Heights Park Community Recreation Facility and Parking (B-30105) - \$5,000,000, Grapeland Heights Park Fields & Site Development (B-60496) - \$4,00,000, Jose Marti Park Gymnasium (B-35857) - \$5,000,000, Little Haiti Park Cultural Campus (B-30295) - \$6,889,655, and Little Haiti Park Soccer and Recreational Facilities (B-38500) - \$6,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager has made a written finding of a valid public emergency attached hereto and incorporated by reference to the effect that, among other things, further delays required for the competitive procurement and award of contracts for these projects jeopardizes the City's bonding capacity and creates an undue hardship on the public welfare, thus it is in the best interest of the public and appropriately justified to waive the requirements for competitive procurement procedures of the City of Miami Code Chapter 18 (The Procurement Ordinance) and Florida Statutes 255.20 (entitled "Local Bids and Contracts for Public Construction Works") and 287.055 (known as the "Consultants Competitive Negotiations Act" or "CCNA") for the selection of the architect/engineers and/or contractors for these Projects; and

WHEREAS, said finding of the City Manager has been duly considered and adopted by the City Commission; and

WHEREAS, as stipulated in 255.20, Florida Statute, the architect/engineer of record, Zyscovich Architects, has provided written recommendation, attached hereto and incorporated by reference, that the Construction Management-at-Risk projects, Jose Marti Park Gymnasium project (B-35857) and Little Haiti Park Cultural Campus (B-30295) be awarded without competitive selection to the above-referenced firm, and this recommendation has been duly considered by the City Commission in relation to the action requested; and

WHEREAS, this matter is being considered at a duly advertised public meeting and the City Commission having considered Florida Statute 255.20 and 287.055 (Consultant's Competitive Negotiation Act: "CCNA"), 18-89 (Public Works and Contracts) and 18-90 (Emergency Procurements) of the Code of the City of Miami, which are each deemed as being incorporated by reference herein as though set forth in full, and which sets forth the criteria for the aforementioned waiver of competitive processes; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statute 255.20 allows the City to use any contract arrangement with a private sector contractor to award contracts for public construction work that is allowed by municipal ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the procedures required by 287.055, Florida Statutes ("CCNA") may be waived if there is a finding of a valid public emergency certified by the agency head; and

WHEREAS, the City of Miami is complying with the aforementioned laws and procedures;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MIAMI, FLORIDA:

Section 1. The recitals and findings contained in the Preamble to this Resolution are adopted by reference and incorporated as if fully set forth in this Section.

Section 2. By a four-fifths (4/5ths) affirmative vote, the City Commission ratifies, approves and confirms the City Manager's finding of a valid public emergency; said finding to the effect that it is in the best interest of the public and justified to waive competitive procurement procedures governed by 287.55, Florida Statutes, and Chapter 18 of the Code of the City of Miami, Florida, and select, outside of said competitive procurement processes, the professional design or design-build firms for the specified projects funded from Homeland Defense Neighborhood Improvement Bond proceeds as follows: for the Jose Marti Park Gymnasium project (B-35857), the design firm of Zyscovich Architects is selected to serve as the architect for the project under a previously existing agreement dated June 24, 2002; for the Grapeland Heights Park projects (B-35828, B-30105 and B-60496), Recreation Design Consultants will serve as the prime consultant/contractor for Design-Build services, with the design firm of Carzo Castella Caballo Thompson Salman (C3TS) as the subconsultant/engineer; and for the Little Haiti Park Soccer and Recreational Facilities (B-38500), Recreation Design Consultants will serve as the prime consultant/contractor for Design-Build services with the design firm of Zyscovich Architects as the subconsultant/contractor for Design-Build services with the design firm of Zyscovich Architects as the prime consultant/contractor for Design-Build services with the design firm of Zyscovich Architects as the subconsultant/contractor for Design-Build services with the design firm of Zyscovich Architects as the subconsultant/contractor for Design-Build services with the design firm of Zyscovich Architects as the subconsultant/architect.

By a four-fifths (4/5ths) affirmative vote, the City Commission ratifies, approves, confirms and adopts as its own, the City Manager's finding of a valid public emergency with regard to the selection of certain firms to provide Construction Management-at-Risk services, said finding to the effect that the time required for the competitive procurement and award of contracts for said projects jeopardizes the City's bonding capacity and creates an undue hardship on the public welfare, thus it is in the best interest of the public to waive competitive procurement procedures prescribed in City Code Chapter 18 and in 255.20, Florida Statute, and select pursuant to City Code Section 18-90 "Emergency Procurement", the construction firms listed below for the specified projects funded from Homeland Defense Neighborhood Improvement Bond proceeds, having determined that said firms are appropriately certified licensed and certified contractors, and are uniquely qualified to undertake and perform the required work on behalf of the City, as follows: for the Jose Marti Park Gymnasium project (B-35857), Pirtle Construction Company, Inc. is selected to serve as the contractor, Construction Manager at Risk, and for the Little Haiti Park Cultural Campus (B-30295), Pirtle Construction Company, Inc. is selected to serve as the contractor at Risk.

Section 4. The City Manager is authorized to negotiate Agreements, in a form acceptable to the City Attorney, for each project with the respective firm listed below for the provision of the required design (architectural and engineering) services, design-build services, and/or construction management-at-risk services, and to return to the City Commission for review and approval of said Agreements at a later date.

Section 5. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption and signature of the Mayor.{2}

This is an Agreement (the "Agreement") made and entered into this ______ day of 2005, by and between the City of Miami, (COM) and Recreational Design and Construction, a Florida corporation ("FIRM") for the provision of Design-Build services for Grapeland Heights Park, Phase 1.

In consideration of the mutual terms and conditions, promises, covenants and payments hereinafter set forth, COM and FIRM agree as follows:

1. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

For the purposes of this Agreement and the various covenants, conditions, terms and provisions which follow, the DEFINITIONS set forth below are assumed to be true and correct and are agreed upon by the parties.

Whenever the following terms or pronouns in place of them appear in this Agreement the intent and meaning shall be interpreted as follows:

- 1.1 <u>Architect</u>: An architectural firm, in good standing and licensed pursuant to Chapter 481, Florida Statutes, to be retained by the FIRM for the provision of architectural services to the Project. This definition includes the rendering or offering to render services in connection with the design and construction of the Project including providing preliminary study designs, drawings and specifications, job-site inspection, administration of construction costs, drawings and specifications, and job-site observations.
- 1.2 <u>Change Order</u>: A written document ordering a change in the Contract Sum or contract time or a material change in the work as determined by the OAR/Owner's Representative (OAR). Change Orders will be in compliance with the applicable provisions of the City of Miami Procurement Code. No Change Order initiated by FIRM shall be authorized if the Change Order will result in an increase in either the Contract Sum or the Contract time unless the time and/or price change is a direct consequence of a new or changed government regulation enacted or imposed after the date this Agreement is approved by COM. COM shall have the discretion to initiate Change Orders to add or delete work, including increases or decreases in the Contract Sum or the Contract time.
- 1.3 <u>Commission</u>: The City of Miami Commission, which is the governing body of the COM and is the only body which is authorized to approve amendments to this Agreement and Change Orders exceeding limits as set forth in the City of Miami Procurement Code.
- 1.4 <u>Construction Documents Phase</u>: The phase in which the Architect prepares the final documents for construction of the Project based upon the approved Design Development Documents.
- 1.5 <u>Construction Phase</u>: The phase of services which constitutes the construction of the Project and all activities necessary for the completion of the Project.
- 1.6 <u>Contract</u>: This Agreement and all addenda and amendments thereto between the COM and the FIRM all as defined berein. Contract shall mean the same as Agreement.

1.7 <u>Contract Completion</u>: The date certified by FIRM that all conditions of the permits and regulatory agencies have been met, all construction, including corrective work, has been performed, all administrative requirements of the Contract Documents have been completed, and COM has received, from FIRM, a release of all liens, consent of surety, release of claims by FIRM, corrected as-built drawings, a final bill of materials, executed final adjusting Change Order if any, final invoice, final reconciliation, copies of pertinent test results, correspondence and other necessary documentation.

- 1.8 <u>Contract Documents</u>: The Design Criteria for the Project which includes preliminary plans, the plans and specifications, addenda, qualifications, and supplemental instructions, which are to be developed by FIRM pursuant to this Agreement, the performance bond and payment bond, the design documents, the construction documents such as Critical Path Method (CPM) and Schedule of Values, and any additional documents, the submission of which is required by this Agreement. When reference is made in the Contract Documents to publications, standards or codes issued by associations or societies, the intent shall be to specify the current edition of such publication or standard including revision and effect on the date of the Contract advertisement notwithstanding any reference to a particular date.
- 1.90 <u>CPM:</u> The Critical Path Method (CPM) is one of several related techniques for doing project planning. CPM is for projects that are made up of a number of individual "activities." If some of the activities require other activities to finish before they can start, then the project becomes a complex web of activities, requiring a methodical path.
- 1.10 Design Phase: This phase will consist of the Schematic Design Phase during which FIRM will consult with the OAR and prepare Schematic Design Documents consisting of drawings and other documents illustrating the scale and relationship for approval of the COM. The Design Development Phase also includes the preparation by FIRM, of Design Development Documents, based on approved Schematic Design Documents, and submittal to the COM of a further Statement of Construction Costs.
- 1.11 <u>FIRM</u>: Recreational Design and Construction. The FIRM has been selected to perform the Work pursuant to action of the City Commission evidenced by Resolution No., 04-786, adopted December 9, 2004. The FIRM has full responsibility under this Agreement for the design and construction of the Project and is liable for the acceptable performance of the work and payment of all sums due to its employees, agents, servants, consultants, subcontractors, materialpersons, and suppliers pertaining to the Project. All references in the Contract Documents to third parties under contract or control of FIRM shall be deemed to be a reference to FIRM. The FIRM will be responsible for the provision, installation, and performance of all equipment, materials, and services offered.
- 1.12 <u>Field Order</u>: A written order issued by the OAR which orders minor changes in the Project but which does not involve a change in the total cost or time for performance.
- 1.13 <u>Final Completion</u>: The date certified by the OAR that all conditions of the permits and regulatory agencies have been met, all construction, including corrective and punch list

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work, has been performed, all administrative requirements of the Contract Documents have been completed, and COM has received from FIRM a release of all liens, consent of surety, release of claims by FIRM, corrected as-built drawings, a final bill of material, executed final adjusting Change Order if any, final invoice, and copies of pertinent test results, including all warranties, guarantees, operational manuals, spare parts, service contracts and tools. At a minimum, a final Certificate of Occupancy is one of the requirements for final completion.

- 1.14 <u>Liquidated Damages</u>: The amount prescribed in this Agreement to be paid the COM, or to be deducted from any payments due the FIRM for each day's delay in completing the whole or any specified portion of the work beyond the Contract Time.
- 1.15 <u>Notice to Proceed</u>: A written document issued by the OAR informing the FIRM to officially begin each phase of the Project.
- 1.16 <u>Owner's Authorized Representative (OAR)</u>: The individual expressly designated in writing by COM's City Manager to administer the Project and to act as the authorized agent of the COM.
- 1.17 <u>Plans and/or Drawings</u>: The official graphic representations of this Project which, upon written approval of COM, shall become a part of the Contract Documents.
- 1.18 <u>Project</u>: Design Services for the entire Grapeland Heights Park project, and Construction Services for Phase 1 of the project, consisting of the baseball complex, as more particularly described in, and in accordance with the Design Criteria attached hereto as Exhibit "A". The Construction Services for other phases of the entire Grapeland Heights Park project shall be authorized by separate agreement, or amendments to this Contract, subject to Commission approval.
- 1.19 <u>Project Commencement Date</u>: The date upon which the Notice to Proceed is issued by the OAR.
- 1.20 <u>Project Representative</u>: An authorized representative of FIRM assigned to represent FIRM on the Project as approved by the OAR, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- 1.21 <u>Proposal:</u> The Proposal submitted by the FIRM for Design-Build Services for the entire Grapeland Heights Park project dated December 9, 2004.
- 1.22 <u>Shop Drawings</u>: Drawings, diagrams and schedules (excluding, however, the CPM Schedule), and other data specially prepared by the FIRM or its subcontractors, sub-subcontractors, manufacturer, supplier or distributor to illustrate some portion of the work.
- 1.23 <u>Subcontractor</u>: The person or entity having a direct contract with FIRM including one who furnishes material worked to a special design according to the Contract Documents for this Project, but does not include one who merely furnishes material not so worked.

- 1.24 <u>Substantial Completion</u>: Subject to the requirements of this Agreement, the date certified by the OAR that all conditions of the permits and regulatory agencies have been met for the COM's intended use, and all construction has been performed in accordance with the Contract Documents so COM can occupy or utilize the Project for its intended purposes. At a minimum, a Temporary Certificate of Occupancy is one of the requirements for Substantial Completion.
- 1.25 <u>Superintendent</u>: Individual employed by FIRM to provide construction management services for the Project.
- 1.26 <u>Surety</u>: The surety company which is bound by the performance bond and payment bond with and for FIRM and who is primarily liable and responsible for FIRM's acceptable performance of the work under this Contract and for the payment of all debts pertaining thereto in accordance with Section 255.05, Florida Statutes.
- 1.27 <u>Work</u>: The completed construction required by the Contract Documents, including all labor necessary to produce such construction, and all materials and equipment incorporated or to be incorporated in such construction.

2. <u>PREAMBLE</u>

It is the intent of the Contract Documents and this Agreement to describe a functionally complete Project to be designed and constructed by the FIRM in accordance with the Contract Documents. All work, materials or equipment that may reasonably be inferred from the Contract Documents as being required to produce the intended result will be supplied by FIRM whether or not specifically called for, unless same may be the subject of a Change Order. When words which have a well-known technical or trade meaning are used to describe work, materials or equipment, such words shall be interpreted in accordance with that meaning. Reference to standard specifications, manuals or codes of any technical society, organization or association, or to laws or regulations of any governmental authority, whether such reference be specific or by implication, shall mean the standard specification, manual, code, laws or regulations in effect at the time of the execution of this Agreement. A change in the applicable laws or codes after execution of this Agreement or after a permit is issued may result in additional compensation should additional work be required on behalf of the FIRM. The FIRM shall be deemed to have decided for itself the character and difficulties which may be encountered at the Project site; and FIRM acknowledges that it is satisfied regarding the nature and extent of the work and that it has correlated its study and observations of the Project site with the requirements of the Contract Documents.

This Project is funded with public funds, and COM has budgeted FIVE MILLION SEVEN HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED FORTY-TWO and 00/100 Dollars (\$5,725,942.00)_for the Project. The FIRM agrees that the foregoing amount constitutes the maximum price and payment that COM will be obligated to pay for Firm's design and construction services for the complete and fully functional Project described in this Contract except for COM-approved Change Orders.

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3. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

3.1 FIRM shall not deviate but shall strictly follow the Contract Documents as to work, material, and dimensions except when the OAR in his/her sole reasonable discretion, authorizes an exception in writing.

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- 3.2 FIRM shall maintain four (4) copies of the Contract Documents; two (2) of which shall be preserved and always kept accessible to the OAR or his/her authorized representatives.
- 3.3 This Contract incorporates by reference and in the following order of authoritative precedent, the following documents (i) the Contract Documents defined in Section 1.9; and (ii) the Proposal, including any addenda.

4. <u>SCOPE OF WORK</u>

- 4.1 FIRM hereby agrees to complete the Project described by the Contract Documents and the final Design Criteria as set forth in Exhibit A, including furnishing all architectural, engineering, landscape architecture, and land surveying services, labor, materials, equipment and other services necessary to perform all of the work described in the Contract Documents including drawings and addenda thereto for the construction of the Project to be constructed in accordance with the requirements and provisions of the Contract Documents. The Scope of Work shall include all items necessary to provide a complete project which meets all codes as defined by plan review incident to permitting. The Scope of Work also includes all Project site preparation. The Scope of Work for this Project shall be performed pursuant this Agreement for the Contract Sum.
- 4.2 FIRM agrees to meet with OAR or designee at reasonable times and upon reasonable notice.
- 4.3 FIRM will develop from its proposal and layout drawings the specifications which will be reviewed and approved by COM for concept only and will meet or exceed the standards noted in the scope of services attached hereto and incorporated herein, and all applicable codes, ordinances, statutes and any other regulations imposed by any regulatory body or authority governing the design and construction. All such documents shall become a part of the Contract Documents at the time they are provided by FIRM and approved for concept by COM.
- 4.4 Prior to the Final Completion there shall be established a record set of plans and specifications, on Mylar and the latest commercially released version of AutoCAD, which shall bear the approval of FIRM and OAR. Such approval shall be indicated by the written signature of both parties. In addition, prior to the commencement of services under this Agreement, FIRM shall submit to the OAR a Critical Path Method (CPM) Schedule for the Design, Permitting and Construction Phases of the Project. The CPM shall be updated monthly and submitted to OAR as part of each pay request.
- 4.5 The major elements of the Project are the Design Phase and the Construction Phase, all in accordance with the requirements and provisions of the following documents which are

hereby made a part of this Agreement: FIRM's Final Proposal and the Plans and Specifications as approved and accepted by COM and attached hereto as Exhibit B, and thereafter amended by FIRM and approved by COM.

If, during performance of the Work, FIRM encounters subsurface or concealed conditions at the Project site which differ materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of the character called for in the Contract Documents, or unknown physical conditions of the Project site of an unusual nature which differ materially from that ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of the character called for in the Contract Documents, FIRM shall, without disturbing the conditions and before performing any work affected by such conditions, notify the OAR in writing, by facsimile with telephone, of the existence of the aforesaid conditions no later than twenty-four (24) hours after their discovery and request an equitable adjustment of the Contract Price and/or Contract Time. FIRM shall also notify the OAR of such conditions in writing by certified mail forwarded no later than the next business day. Within twenty-four (24) hours after receipt of FIRM's written notice, excluding legal holidays, the OAR shall investigate the site conditions identified by FIRM. If, in the sole opinion of the OAR, the conditions materially differ and justify an increase or decrease in FIRM's cost of performing any part of the Work, the OAR shall determine an equitable adjustment to the Contract Price and/or Contract Time. Should the OAR determine that the conditions of the Project site are not so materially different to justify a change in the Contract Price and/or Contract Time, the OAR shall so notify FIRM in writing, stating the reasons. If FIRM does not agree with the OAR's determination, FIRM may invoke the procedure authorized by Section 33. No request by FIRM for an equitable adjustment to the Contract under this provision shall be allowed unless FIRM has given written notice in strict accordance with the provisions of this Section. No request for an equitable adjustment or change to the Contract Price or Contract time for differing site conditions shall be allowed if made after the date of Substantial Completion.

COMPLETION DATE - LIQUIDATED DAMAGES 5.

Contract Time: 5.1

5.1.1 OAR shall instruct the FIRM to commence the Design Phase and the Construction Phase of the Project by written instructions in the form of a Notice to Proceed. The Project shall be commenced within fifteen (15) calendar days from FIRM's receipt of the Notice to Proceed. The Notices to Proceed will not be issued until receipt by the OAR of all required documents and after the proper execution of this Agreement by all parties.

5.1.2 Time is of the essence throughout this Contract. Substantial Completion of the The Design Phase will conclude with the Project by the FIRM shall be October 1, 2005. issuance of a building permit to support a construction date of not later than December 15, 2005. The Design Phase duration assumes a permitting period not to exceed 30 calendar days. Should additional time be required for permitting processes, the FIRM's only remedy will be an extension of time for the Design Phase, to be requested in accordance with this Agreement. The time frames and dates stipulated in this Section 5.1.2. are based on an assumed Contract execution date of no later than March 10, 2005 Should the Contract execution date be delayed,

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then all time frames and dates referenced herein shall be extended accordingly. The total Project shall be completed by FIRM and ready for final payment in accordance with Section 7.2.4 no later than 45 calendar days after Substantial Completion. Any time extension authorized by COM or the OAR pursuant to this Agreement shall extend the dates in this Section by an equal amount of time.

5.1.3 Upon failure of FIRM to substantially complete the Project by the date specified for Substantial Completion, plus approved time extensions for such Substantial Completion, FIRM shall pay to COM Liquidate Damages in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for each calendar day after such time, until Substantial Completion. Upon failure of FIRM to finally complete the Project by the date specified for Final Completion, plus approved time extensions for Final Completion, FIRM shall pay to COM the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each calendar day after such time until Final Completion. These amounts are not penalties but are Liquidated Damages to COM for its inability to obtain full beneficial use of the Project. Liquidated Damages are hereby fixed and agreed upon between the parties, recognizing the impossibility of precisely ascertaining the amount of damages that will be sustained by COM as a consequence of such delay, and both parties desiring to obviate any questions or dispute concerning the amount of said damages and the cost and effect of the failure of FIRM to complete this Contract on time.

5.1.4 COM is authorized to deduct Liquidated Damages from monies due to FIRM for the work under this Contract or as much thereof as COM may, at its own option, deem just and reasonable.

6. FIRM'S RESPONSIBILITY

- 6.1 The parties acknowledge and agree that COM is purchasing, and FIRM is bound to deliver, the design and construction of a complete Project including landscaping, and drainage, which shall be constructed in accordance with the Contract Documents, and in compliance with all applicable laws and technical codes in effect at the time of permitting.
- 6.2 FIRM shall be responsible for applying for and securing all permits and approvals from all governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the Project. All permits and licenses required by federal, state or local laws, rules and regulations necessary for the prosecution of the Project by FIRM pursuant to this Agreement shall be secured and paid for by the FIRM. An aggregate maximum of 30 days extension of time shall be granted to FIRM for completion of the Project due to delays in obtaining any approval or permit from a governmental authority. It is FIRM's responsibility to have and maintain appropriate certificate(s) of competency, valid for the work to be performed and for all persons working on the Project for whom a certificate of competency is required.
- 6.3 FIRM shall be fully responsible for the actions or omissions of all its agents, servants, employees, subcontractors, sub-subcontractors, material persons, and persons working for it in conjunction with the design and construction of the Project.
- 6.4 FIRM shall be fully responsible for all acts or omissions of its consultants and subcontractors and of persons directly employed by FIRM's consultants and

subcontractors and of persons for whose acts any of them may be liable to the same extent FIRM is responsible for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by FIRM. Nothing in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between any consultant or subcontractor and COM or any obligation on the part of COM to pay or to see to the payment of any monies due to any consultant or subcontractor. ٠,

- 6.5 FIRM agrees to bind specifically every subcontractor and consultant to the applicable terms and conditions of this Agreement for the benefit of COM.
- 6.6 FIRM shall provide and pay for all architecture, engineering, landscape architecture, and land surveying services, materials, labor, water, tools, equipment, light, power, transportation and other facilities and services necessary for the proper execution and completion of the Project, whether temporary or permanent, and whether or not incorporated or to be incorporated in the Project.
- 6.7 FIRM shall at all times enforce strict discipline and good order among its employees, consultants, and subcontractors at the Project site and shall not employ on the Project any unfit person or anyone not skilled in the work assigned to him or her.
- 6.8 FIRM shall maintain suitable and sufficient guards and barriers as may be necessary, as may be determined by FIRM, OAR or permitting authority, and at night suitable and sufficient lighting for the prevention of accidents and thefts.
- 6.9 FIRM shall keep itself fully informed of, and shall take into account and comply with, all applicable state and national laws and municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting those engaged or employed in the Project, or the materials used or employed in the Project, or in any way affecting the conduct of the Project, and of all such orders and decrees of bodies or tribunals having any jurisdiction or authority over the same and of all provisions required by law to be made a part of this Agreement, all of which provisions are hereby incorporated by reference and made a part hereof. If any specification or contract for this Project is in violation of any such law, ordinance, regulation, order or decree, FIRM shall forthwith report the same to the OAR in writing. FIRM shall cause all its agents, employees, subcontractors and consultants to observe and comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees.
- 6.10 FIRM shall pay all applicable sales, consumer, use and other taxes required by law in effect at the execution of this Agreement. FIRM is responsible for reviewing the pertinent state statutes involving state taxes and complying with all requirements.
- 6.11 COM shall have the right to inspect and copy, at COM's expense, the books and records and accounts of FIRM which relate in any way to the Project, and to any claim for additional compensation made by FIRM, and to conduct an audit of the financial and accounting records of FIRM which relate to the Project and to any claim for additional compensation made by FIRM. FIRM shall retain and make available to COM all such books and records and accounts, financial or otherwise, which relate to the Project and to any claim for the required retention period of the Florida Public Records Act (Chapter 119, Fla. Stat.), if applicable, or, if the Florida Public Records Act is not applicable, for a

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period of three (3) years following final completion of the Project. During the Project and the three (3) year period following final completion of the Project, FIRM shall provide COM access to its books and records upon 3 days prior written notice. If an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of the retention period or the three-year period, whichever is longer, the books, records, and accounts shall be retained and made available to COM until resolution of the audit findings.

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7. COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

7.1 <u>Contract Sum</u>

7.1.1 COM agrees to pay FIRM, as compensation for its services under the terms of this Agreement, the sum of <u>FIVE MILLION NINE HUNDRED SEVENTY-NINE THOUSAND</u> <u>SIXTY-THREE AND 00/100 Dollars (\$5,979,063.00)</u> ("Contract Sum"). FIRM's failure to properly evaluate any cost factors prior to submitting a its Proposal shall not form the basis for additional compensation. The compensation for the Project to be performed by FIRM includes all costs, expenses and fees for all Work provided by the FIRM and its subcontractors and consultants and all other persons retained by the FIRM to perform the services described herein.

7.1.2 The Contract Sum shall be the maximum amount payable by COM to FIRM for the costs of this Project. The Sum is a specific amount set forth which is the total payment for performance of this Contract and shall not be exceeded unless authorized by Change Order.

7.1.3 FIRM shall submit to the OAR a schedule of values for each item comprising the Contract Sum. Any negotiated Change Order shall be based upon such schedule of values.

7.2 Method of Billing and Payment

7.2.1 During the Design Phase, payments shall be made monthly based upon percentage of completion of final construction plans and specification preparation. Payments shall be made no more frequently than monthly. The OAR shall verify completion of the various stages as noted and authorize payment. During the Construction Phase, FIRM may submit a request for payment thirty (30) calendar days after beginning field operations and every thirty (30) calendar days thereafter. Payment will be based on quantitles certified by the FIRM and approved by the OAR. FIRM's requisition shall show a complete breakdown of the Project components, the quantities completed and the amount due, together with such supporting evidence as may be required by the OAR. When applicable, the requisition for payment shall be accompanied by a completed certification of work. The certification of work will mean compliance by FIRM with SDBE, CPM Schedule, and prevailing wages and applicable laws, codes, rules and regulations. Each requisition shall be submitted in triplicate to the OAR for approval. An updated CPM Schedule shall be submitted monthly with payment requests. Should the Project fall behind schedule as indicated in the CPM Schedule, FIRM shall include a written plan demonstrating how the final completion date shall be maintained.

7.2.2. COM agrees that it will pay FIRM ninety percent (90%) of the total shown to be due on such statement within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of FIRM's proper invoice, as provided above, accompanied by an acceptable updated CPM Schedule and as-built drawings.

7.2.3 Ten percent (10%) of all monies earned by FIRM shall be retained by COM until the Project is totally completed and the Final Certificate for Payment has been issued. After . After seventy-five percent (75%) of the Project has been completed, OAR shall have the authority to reduce to five percent (5%) the amount of retainage for moneys earned subsequent to achieving 75% completion. After Substantial Completion, OAR shall have the authority to reduce to two and one-half percent (2.5%) the amount of retainage for I monies earned after Substantial Completion. Any interest earned on retainage shall accrue to the benefit of COM.

7.2.4 Upon receipt of written notice from FIRM that the Project is ready for final inspection and acceptance, the OAR shall, within ten (10) calendar days, make an inspection thereof. If the OAR finds the Project fully performed and in compliance with the Contract Documents, and DESIGN BUILDER complies with the provisions of Section 7.2.4. below, the OAR shall issue a Final Certificate of Payment in the form of Exhibit I.

7.2.5. Before issuance of the Final Certificate for Payment, FIRM shall deliver to the OAR a final receipt in the form of Exhibit J, a complete release of all liens arising out of this Agreement, or receipts in full in lieu thereof, and an Affidavit certifying that all suppliers and subcontractors have been paid in full and that all other indebtedness connected with the Project has been paid, and a consent of the surety to final payment. All warranties, guarantees, operational and maintenance manuals and videos, and instructions in operation must be delivered to COM at this time. As built drawings will be completed, a hard reproducible copy and an AutoCAD version in the latest commercially released format, uncompressed shall be delivered to COM, and certificate of occupancy will be obtained prior to final payment being made.

7.2.6. COM may withhold final payment or any progress payment to such extent as may be necessary on account of:

- (i) Defective work not remedied.
- (ii) Claims filed or written notices of nonpayment indicating probable filing of claims as may be prescribed by law by other parties against FIRM unless Surety consents to payment.
- (iii) Failure of FIRM to make payments properly to subcontractors or consultants or for material or labor unless Surety consents to payment.
- (iv) Liquidated Damages pursuant to Section 5 hereof.
- (v) As-built drawings not being in a current and acceptable state.

7.2.7 The FIRM warrants to the COM that all materials and equipment furnished under this Agreement will be new unless otherwise specified, and that all work will be of good quality and in conformance with the Contract Documents. All work not conforming to these requirements, including substitutions not properly approved and authorized by OAR, may be considered defective. If required by the COM, the FIRM shall furnish satisfactory evidence as to the origin, nature and quality of materials and equipment used for the Project. FIRM shall properly store and protect all construction materials. Materials which become defective through improper storage shall be replaced by FIRM with new materials at no additional costs to COM. When the above grounds are removed or resolved or FIRM provides a surety bond or consent of Surety satisfactory to COM which will protect COM in the amount withheld, payment may be made to FIRM in whole or in part, as applicable. 14

7.2.8 COM may withhold final payment to such extent as may be necessary on account of damage to another subcontractor, supplier, material person, party, or person, not remedied which are attributable to FIRM, its agents, servants, employees, subcontractors and sub-subcontractors, material person and suppliers. FIRM shall use reasonable measures to remedy such damage, and COM shall not unreasonably withhold final payment.

7.2.9 If, after the Project has been substantially completed, full completion thereof is delayed through no fault of FIRM, or by issuance of Change Orders affecting final completion, and the OAR so certifies, COM shall, upon certification of the OAR, and without terminating this Contract, make payment of the balance due for that portion of the Project fully completed and accepted. Such payment shall be made as required by law under the terms and conditions governing final payment, except that it shall not constitute a waiver of claims.

7.2.10 The making and acceptance of the final payment shall constitute a waiver of all claims by COM, other than those arising from faulty or defective work, failure of the Project to comply with requirements of the Contract Documents or terms of any warranties required by the Contract Documents. It shall also constitute a waiver of all claims by FIRM, except those previously made in writing and identified by FIRM as unsettled at the time of the final application for payment.

7.2.11 Payment will be made to FIRM at:

8. ADDITIONAL SERVICES AND CHANGES IN SCOPE OF WORK

Without invalidating this Agreement and without notice to any surety, COM reserves and shall have the right to make such changes from time to time in the character or quantity of the Project as may be considered necessary or desirable to complete fully and acceptably the

proposed construction in a satisfactory manner. Any extra or additional work within the scope of this Project may be accomplished by means of appropriate and fully executed and approved Change Orders. FIRM shall not be obligated to perform any extra or additional work until a valid change order has been executed.

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9. <u>COM'S RESPONRIBILITIES</u>

COM shall assist FIRM by placing at its disposal any available information pertinent to the Project including previous reports, laboratory tests and inspections of samples, materials and equipment; property, boundary, easement, rights-of-way, topographic and utility surveys; property descriptions; and known zoning, deed and other land use restrictions. COM shall arrange for access to and make all provisions for FIRM to enter upon public and private property as required for FIRM to perform its services.

10. RESOLUTION OF DISPUTES – WAIVER OF TRIAL BY JURY

- 10.1. Claims, disputes or other matters in questions between the FIRM and COM arising out of or relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, shall be initially subject to mediation by a mediator to be selected by the parties, as a condition precedent to litigation. Unless the parties mutually agree otherwise, such mediation shall be conducted in accordance with the Construction Industry Mediation Rules of the American Arbitration Association in effect at the time of the claim. Requests for mediation shall be filed in writing with the other party to this Agreement. The parties shall endeavor to expedite the mediation and, if necessary, any litigation or arbitration during the actual construction of the Project. The parties shall share the Mediator's fee and any mediation filing fees equally. The mediation shall be conducted in Miami, Florida, unless the parties mutually agree otherwise. Agreements reached in mediation shall be set forth in writing and executed by both parties and shall be enforceable as settlement agreements in any court having jurisdiction thereof.
- 10.2 Claims, disputes or other matters in questions between the FIRM and COM arising out of or relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, which are not resolved by mediation shall be subject to and decided by litigation exclusively in the sate or federal courts of Mlami-Dade county, Florida, unless COM elects, in its sole discretion, to have such claims, disputes, or other matters in questions, be subject to and decided by arbitration in accordance with the Construction Industry Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association currently in effect. FIRM consents to the exclusive venue of the sate and federal courts of Mlami-Dade County, Florida.
- 10.3 Pending final resolution of a claim, including mediation, unless otherwise agreed in writing, FIRM shall proceed diligently with performance of this Contract and the COM shall continue to make payments in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- 10.4 Any mediator used shall be certified in accordance with Florida law. Mediation will be conducted in Miami-Dade County.
- 10.5 IN THE EVENT OF LITIGATION, FIRM HEREBY KNOWINGLY, IRREVOCABLY, VOLUNTARILY AND INTENTIONALLY WAIVES ANY RIGHT IT MAY HAVE TO A TRIAL BY JURY IN DESDECT OF ANY ACTION REOCEEDING CLAIM OF

COUNTERCLAIM ARISING OUT OF OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, OR BREACH THEREOF, OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE WORK, OR ANY COURSE OF CONDUCT, COURSE OF DEALING, STATEMENTS (WHETHER VERBAL OR WRITTEN), OR ANY ACTIONS OR INACTIONS OF EITHER PARTY. COM RESERVES ALL RIGHTS TO DETERMINE WHETHER THE DISPUTE WILL BE DECIDED BY ARBITRATION OR BY A JURY.

11. PRE-CONSTRUCTIONCONFERENCE

- 11.1 Before beginning work at the Project site, the FIRM shall schedule, administer, and attend a pre-construction conference and bring the Superintendent employed by the FIRM for this Project. Advance written notice of the pre-construction conference shall be provided to the OAR.
- 11.2 At the pre-construction conference, all parties concerned will discuss the Project under contract and prepare a program of procedure in keeping with requirements of the drawings and specifications. The Superintendent shall henceforth make every effort to expeditiously coordinate all phases of the work to obtain the end result within the full purpose and intent of the drawings and specifications for the Project.
- 11.3 The FIRM shall be fully responsible for coordinating, and taking all required steps and precautions, to ensure the COM full security measures without interruption during the progress of the work and within the areas of construction and other assigned areas for FIRM's use during construction. The FIRM shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with the performance of the Work.
- 11.4 The FIRM shall cooperate in every respect with COM in the execution of this work. FIRM shall abide by security requirements of the COM at all times, and shall schedule work so as to conform to the CPM Schedule and related schedules of this Project.

12. PROJECT MEETINGS

FIRM shall schedule periodic progress meetings with the OAR twice a month and, as necessary, shall call special meetings throughout the progress of the work. Representatives of FIRM, subcontractors and suppliers, and OAR attending meetings shall be qualified and authorized to act on behalf of the entity each represents.

13. <u>SECURITY</u>

FIRM shall provide a project security program to protect work, stored products and construction equipment from theft and vandalism, and to protect premises from entry by unauthorized persons. In the event any such materials, equipment and supplies are lost, stolen, damaged or destroyed prior to final inspection and acceptance, FIRM shall replace same with no cost to COM.

14. INSPECTION OF PROJECT

- 14.1 The OAR or designee shall at all times have access to the Project, and FIRM shall provide proper facilities for such access.
- 14.2 Should the Contract Documents, instructions, any laws, ordinances, or any public authority require any work for the Project to be specially tested or approved, FIRM shall give to the OAR timely notice of readiness of the work for inspection. If the testing or approval is to be made by an authority other than COM, timely notice shall be given of the date fixed for such testing. Inspections shall be made promptly, and, where practicable, at the source of supply. If any work for the Project should be covered up without inspection, approval or consent of the OAR, it must, if required by the OAR, be uncovered for examination and properly restored at FIRM's expense.
- 14.3 Reexamination and retesting of any work for the Project may be ordered by the OAR; and if so ordered, such work must be uncovered by FIRM. If such work is found to be in accordance with the Contract Documents, COM shall pay the cost of reexamination, retesting and replacement. If such work is not in accordance with the Contract Documents, FIRM shall pay such cost.
- 14.4 No City of Miami Inspector nor any other person or entity with regulatory authority affecting the Project shall have authority to permit deviations from, or to relax any of the provisions of, the Contract Documents without the written permission or instruction of the OAR.
- 14.5 The payment of any compensation, regardless of its character or form, or the giving of any gratuity or the granting of any valuable favor by FIRM to any inspector other than its consultant, is forbidden, and any such act on the part of FIRM will constitute a breach of this Agreement.

15. SUPERINTENDENCE AND SUPERVISION

- 15.1 The orders of the COM are to be given through the OAR, whose instructions are to be strictly and promptly followed in every case, provided that they are in accordance with this Contract. FIRM shall keep on the Project during its progress a competent supervisor who shall serve as the Project Representative, and any necessary assistants. The Superintendent on site shall be responsible for continuous field supervision, coordination, and completion of the Work. The Superintendent shall not be changed except upon notice to the OAR, unless the Superintendent proves to be unsatisfactory to FIRM. The Superintendent shall represent FIRM, and all direction given to the Superintendent shall be as binding as if given to FIRM. Directions will be confirmed in writing to FIRM. Other directions will be so confirmed on written request in each case.
- 15.2 FIRM's Superintendent shall prepare, on a daily basis, and keep on the Project site, a bound log setting forth at a minimum, for each day: the weather conditions and how any weather conditions affected progress of the work, work performed, equipment utilized for the work, any idle equipment and reasons for idleness, visitors to the Project site, labor utilized for the work, and any materials delivered to the Project site. The daily bound log shall be available for inspection by the OAR or designee at all times during the Project.

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- 15.3 The parties acknowledge and recognize that this is a Design/Build Project and, except where based on an authorized Change Order (as provided pursuant to this Contract), all work for this Project shall be done for the Contract Sum. Thus, any errors or omissions shall be corrected by FIRM without claim for additional time and/or funds from COM. Nevertheless, if, in the course of the Project, FIRM finds any discrepancy between the Contract Documents and the physical conditions of the site, or any errors or omissions in the Contract Documents including drawings (plans) and specifications, it shall be the FIRM's duty to immediately inform the OAR.
- 15.4 FIRM shall coordinate, supervise and direct the Project competently and efficiently, devoting such attention thereto and applying such skills and expertise as may be necessary to perform the Project in accordance with the Contract Documents. FIRM shall be solely responsible for the design, means, methods, techniques, safety, sequences and procedures of construction. FIRM shall give efficient supervision to the work, using FIRM's best skill, attention, and judgment.

16. <u>COM'S RIGHT TO TERMINATE AGREEMENT – OTHER REMEDIES</u>

If FIRM fails to begin the design and construction of the Project within the time specified, 16.1 or fails to perform the Project with sufficient workers and equipment or with sufficient materials to ensure the prompt completion of the Project, in accordance with the Contract Documents and schedules, or shall perform the work unsuitably, or cause it to be rejected as defective and unsuitable, or shall discontinue the prosecution of the Project, except for excused delays in accordance with this Agreement; or if FIRM shall become insolvent or be declared bankrupt, or commit any act of bankruptcy or insolvency, or shall make an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or shall not carry on the Project in accordance with the Contract Documents, or shall breach a material provision of this Contract (each such event referred to herein as a "Default"), COM shall give notice in writing to FIRM and its surety of such default, specifying the same. If FIRM fails to cure such default within a period of ten (10) business days after receipt of such notice then, upon written certificate from the OAR that the default has not been cured, COM, in addition to all legal and equitable remedies available to it, may terminate the services of FIRM by giving written notice of its intent to terminate in accordance with Subsection 16.5 (the "Notice of Termination"). The Notice of Termination shall specify the effective date of termination, Upon giving the which shall be no earlier than 10 days from the date of the notice. Notice of Termination, COM shall have the right to exclude FIRM from the site and take the prosecution of the Project out of the hands of FIRM, as appropriate or use any or all materials and equipment on the Project site as may be suitable and acceptable. In such case, COM may enter into an agreement with another party for the completion of the Project according to the terms and provisions of the Contract Documents or use such other methods as in its opinion shall be required for the completion of the Project in an acceptable manner. All damages, costs and charges incurred by COM shall be deducted from any monies due or which may have become due to said FIRM without affecting COM's rights to proceed against the surety under the bonds. In case the damages and expense so incurred by COM shall be less than the sum which would have been payable under this Agreement, if it had been completed by said FIRM, then COM shall have no obligation to remit the difference to the FIRM. If such damages and costs exceed the unpaid balance, then FIRM shall be liable and shall pay to COM the amount of said AXCess,

- 16.2 If, after Notice of Termination, it is determined for any reason that FIRM was not in default, the rights and obligations of COM and FIRM shall be the same as if the Notice of Termination had been issued pursuant to the Termination for Convenience clause as set forth below.
- 16.3 The performance of work under this Agreement may be terminated in writing by COM for convenience upon giving a Notice of Termination at least ten (10) business days prior to the intended effective date of termination. In such case, FIRM shall be paid for all work executed, and expenses incurred prior to termination in addition to termination settlement costs reasonably incurred by FIRM relating to commitments which had become FIRM prior to the termination. Payment shall include reasonable profit for services actually performed in full prior to termination date, but shall exclude all lost profits, indirect or special, or other damages.
- 16.4 Upon receipt of Notice of Termination as provided above, FIRM shall promptly discontinue all affected work, unless the Notice of Termination directs otherwise, and deliver to COM within fourteen (14) calendar days of termination all data, drawings, specifications, reports, estimates, summaries and such other information as may have been required by the Contract Documents whether completed or in process. Compensation shall be withheld until all documents are provided to COM pursuant to this Agreement.
- 16.5 Notice of Termination shall be in writing and shall be delivered by personal service or by certified mail addressed to the FIRM at the address indicated in Section 7.2.10, or as the same may be changed in writing from time to time. Such notice shall be deemed given on the day on which personally served, or if by certified mail, on the fifth (5th) day after being posted or the date of actual receipt, whichever is earlier.

17. FIRM'S RIGHT TO STOP WORK OR TERMINATE CONTRACT

If the Project should be stopped under an order of any court or other public authority for a period of more than ninety (90) calendar days, through no act or fault of FIRM or of anyone employed by FIRM, or if the OAR should fail to review or approve without stating in writing the reasons for non-approval of any estimate for payment within twenty (20) calendar days after it is presented, or if COM fails to pay FIRM within thirty (30) calendar days after approval and certification by the OAR of any proper statement certified by FIRM accompanied by the required update of the CPM Schedule, then FIRM may, upon seven (7) calendar days prior written notice to COM and the OAR, stop work until payment is made. If COM fails to cure the matter for which notice was given within the seven-day notice period, FIRM may terminate this Agreement and recover from COM payment for all work executed and any expense incurred prior to termination in addition to termination settlement costs reasonably incurred by FIRM relating to commitments which had become FIRM prior to the termination. Payment shall include reasonable profit for services actually performed in full prior to termination date, but shall exclude all lost profits, indirect or special, or other damages.

18. <u>"OR EQUAL" CLAUSE</u>

- 18.1 Whenever a material, article or piece of equipment is identified in the Contract Documents including drawings (plans) and specifications by reference to manufacturers' or vendors' names, trade names, catalog numbers, or otherwise, it is intended merely to establish a standard; and, unless it is followed by words indicating that "no substitution is permitted," any material, article, or equipment of other manufacturers and vendors which will perform or serve the requirements of the general design will be considered equally acceptable provided the material, article or equipment so proposed is, in the opinion of the OAR:
 - 18.1.1 At least equal in quality, durability, appearance, strength and design;
 - 18.1.2 Performs at least equally the function imposed in the general design for the Project;
 - 18.1.3 Conforms substantially, even with deviations, to the detailed requirements for the items as indicated by the Plans and Specifications; and
 - 18.1.4 Carries the same guaranty or warranty of the specified equipment.

All substitution requests shall be made in writing by FIRM to OAR which shall be attached to a shop drawing and/or Field Order which shall be attached to a detailed description of the specified item and a detailed description of the proposed substitution. A comparison letter itemizing all deviations from specified items must be included for the OAR to properly evaluate substitution. Failure to provide the deviation comparison sheet shall automatically deny the request.

Any changes, inclusive of design changes, made necessary to accommodate substituted equipment under this paragraph shall be at the expense of FIRM or subcontractor responsible for the work item.

18.2 OAR's written consent shall be required as to acceptability, and no substitute will be ordered, installed or utilized without OAR's prior written acceptance which will be evidenced by either a Field Order or an accepted shop drawing. COM may require FIRM to furnish at FIRM's expense a special performance guarantee or other surety with respect to any substitute.

19. PLANS AND WORKING DRAWINGS

COM, through its OAR, shall have the right to require FIRM to modify the details of these drawings (plans) and specifications, to supplement said plans with additional plans, drawings or additional information as the Project proceeds which are within the specific intent and stated scope of the Project and which do not cause increase in Contract Sum or Contract time, all of which shall be considered as part of the Contract Documents at no additional cost to the COM. All plans, general and detail, are to be deemed a part of this Agreement, and the plans and specifications and Agreement are to be considered together, and are intended to be mutually complementary, so that any work shown on the plans, though not specified in the specifications, and any work specified in the specifications though not shown on the plans, is to be executed by FIRM as part of this Agreement. Figured dimensions are to preval over scale. All things which in the opinion of the OAR may reasonably be inferred from this Agreement and plans at

developed by FIRM and approved by COM are to be executed by FIRM under the terms of this Agreement; and the OAR shall determine whether the detail plans conform to the Contract Documents. The dispute resolution procedures set forth in this Agreement shall be applicable to the determination of the OAR.

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20. FIRM TO CHECK DRAWINGS AND DATA

FIRM shall take measurements and verify all dimensions, conditions, quantities and details shown on the drawings, schedules, or other data. Failure to discover or correct errors, conflicts or discrepancies shall not relieve FIRM of full responsibility for unsatisfactory work, faulty construction, or improper operation resulting therefrom nor from rectifying such condition at FIRM's sole cost and expense. FIRM will not be allowed to take advantage of any error or omissions.

21. WARRANTY

FIRM warrants to COM that all materials and equipment furnished for the Project will be new unless otherwise specified and that all work for the Project will be of good quality, free from faults and defects and in conformance with the Contract Documents. The standard of quality shall be at least that employed by similarly qualified Design/Build FIRMs that are duly qualified and licensed to perform similar projects. All work for the Project not conforming to these requirements, including substitutions not properly approved and authorized, may be considered defective. If materials or equipment is improperly stored and becomes altered as a result of such improper storage, FIRM shall replace said materials with new materials at no additional cost to COM. FIRM shall be responsible for proper storage and safeguarding of all materials. If required by the OAR, FIRM shall furnish satisfactory evidence as to the kind and quality of materials and equipment. The warranty requirements set forth in the Contract Documents as herein defined shall govern warranty terms and conditions for all warranty items expressed or implied. The FIRM's warranty period under this Section shall be twelve (12) months from the date of Substantial Completion. However, this Section shall not abridge the times or impede the rights and remedies afforded the COM against other entitles or persons under the Contract Documents, or by law.

22. <u>SUPPLEMENTARY DRAWINGS</u>

- 22.1 When, in the opinion of FIRM and/or COM, it becomes necessary to explain more fully the work to be done, or to illustrate the Project further to show any changes which may be required, supplementary drawings, with specifications pertaining thereto, will be prepared by the Architect and submitted by FIRM to the OAR for review and written acceptance.
- 22.2 The authorized supplementary drawings shall be binding upon FIRM with the same force as the Contract Documents.

23. <u>DELIVERY, INVENTORY, AND STORAGE OF MATERIALS AND PARTIAL</u> <u>PAYMENT THEREFORE</u>

23.1 COM may, at its sole option, allow partial payment for materials delivered and securely stored either on or off site for use on the Project.

- 23.2 Material stored on the job site shall be verified as to quantity and condition by the OAR or his or her representative prior to any payment. Safeguarding the material shall be the responsibility of the FIRM. Any materials which have been lost, stolen, damaged or otherwise deemed unacceptable by the OAR shall be removed and/or immediately replaced by the FIRM at no additional cost to COM.
- 23.3 Materials stored off the job site for which partial payment is sought shall be stored in a bonded warehouse. The material shall be inspected by the OAR who will verify quantities and condition of all materials. Safeguarding the material shall be the responsibility of the FIRM. Such bonded warehouse shall have insurance for fire, extended coverages, and theft protection in the full one hundred percent (100%) amount of the materials stored off the job site for which partial payment is sought.

24. <u>GENERAL WORKMANSHIP</u>

- 24.1 Articles, materials, and equipment specified or shown on drawings shall be new and shall be applied, Installed, connected, erected, used, cleaned, and conditioned for proper forming, as per the manufacturer's directions, and as approved by the OAR. FIRM shall, if required, furnish satisfactory evidence as to kind and quality of the materials. Should materials arrive to the job-site new and be improperly stored and deteriorate from new condition, the materials shall be replaced at no additional cost to COM.
- 24.2 FIRM shall apply, install, connect, and erect manufactured items or materials according to recommendations of manufacturer when such recommendations are not in conflict with the Contract Documents. FIRM shall furnish copies of manufacturer's recommendations to COM before proceeding with the work.
- 24.3 If there is conflict between manufacturer recommendations and the Construction Documents, OAR shall be notified and participate in the corrective actions.

25. <u>DEFECTIVE WORK</u>

- 25.1 OAR shall have the authority to reject or disapprove work for the Project which OAR finds to be defective. Defective work is defined as work not in accordance with the Contract Documents, in violation of code, installed in violation of the manufacturer's written instructions where the installation has caused new materials to be detrimentally affected where the life expectancy of the material installed is reduced, or otherwise installed in a non-work-like manner. If required by OAR, FIRM shall promptly either, as directed, correct all defective work or remove it from the Project site and replace it with non-defective work. FIRM shall bear all costs of such removal or correction.
- 25.2 If, within one (1) year after Substantial Completion, any work is found to be defective or not in accordance with the Contract Documents, FIRM shall correct it promptly without cost to COM, after receipt of written notice from COM to do so unless COM has given FIRM a written acceptance of such conditions. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to establish a period of limitation with respect to any other obligations which FIRM might have under applicable state law.

- 25.3 Should FIRM fail or refuse to remove or correct any defective work performed for the Project or to make any necessary repairs in an acceptable manner and in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement within a reasonable time, indicated in writing, COM shall have the authority to cause the unacceptable or defective work to be removed or corrected, or make such repairs as may be necessary to be made at FIRM's expense. Any expense incurred by COM in making these removals, corrections or repairs, which FIRM has failed or refused to make shall be paid for out of any monies due or which may. become due to FIRM, or may be charged against the bond or guaranty. Continued failure or refusal on the part of FIRM to make any or all necessary repairs promptly, fully, and in an acceptable manner shall be sufficient cause for COM to declare this Agreement forfeited, in which case COM, at its option, may purchase materials, tools, and equipment and employ labor or may contract with any other individual, FIRM or corporation, or may proceed with its own forces to perform the work. All costs and expenses incurred thereby shall be charged against the defaulting FIRM; and the amount thereof deducted from any monies due, or which may become due to FIRM, or shall be charged against the bond or guaranty. Any special work performed, as described herein, shall not relieve FIRM in any way from its responsibility for the work performed by it.
- 25.4 Failure to reject any defective work or material shall not in any way prevent later rejection when such defect is discovered or obligate COM to final acceptance. Work shall not be rejected after final acceptance by COM.

26. SUBCONTRACTS

FIRM shall, at such times as FIRM decides which subcontractors shall perform the various portions of the work, promptly notify the OAR in writing of the names of subcontractors for the Project and identify the portion of the work for the Project each will perform. FIRM shall have a continuing obligation to notify the OAR of any change in subcontractors. Notification of the names of subcontractors shall not relieve FIRM from the prime responsibility of full and complete satisfactory performance of all contractual obligations.

27. CONSTRUCTION AREA

- 27.1 FIRM shall use areas approved by the OAR for deliveries and personnel. Contract limits of construction area are indicated on the concept drawings as issued by the OAR. Equipment, material and personnel shall be in conformance with this Contract.
- 27.2 To provide for maximum safety and security, FIRM shall erect and maintain all necessary barricades, and any other temporary walls and structures as required, and boarding or fencing to protect life and property during the period of construction.

28. LANDS FOR WORK

COM shall provide as indicated in the Contract Documents, the lands upon which the Project is to be performed, rights-of-way and easements for access thereto and such other lands as are designated for the use of FIRM. No claim for damages or other claim other than for an extension of time shall be made or asserted against COM by reason of any delay arising as a result of any failure of COM to provide such lands, rights-of-way and easements for access thereto and such other lands as are designated for the use on the date needed by FIRM.

29. LEGAL RESTRICTIONS AND TRAFFIC PROVISIONS

FIRM shall conform to all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances with regard to labor employed, hours of work and FIRM's general operations. FIRM shall also conduct its operations so as to assure the least possible obstruction to traffic and inconvenience to the general public, and provide adequate protection of persons and property in the vicinity of the work. FIRM shall make all necessary arrangements concerning maintenance of traffic and selection of detours required, which shall be subject to the approval of the OAR.

30. DAMAGE TO EXISTING FACILITIES, EQUIPMENT OR UTILITIES

- 30.1 It is the FIRM's responsibility to ascertain the location of existing utilities and verify such information and to preserve all existing utilities whether shown in the Contract Documents or not. If utility conflicts are encountered by FIRM during construction, FIRM shall give sufficient notice to the owners of the utilities so that they may make the necessary adjustments.
- 30.2 FIRM shall exercise care and take all precautions during excavation and construction operations to prevent damage caused by FIRM to any existing facilities, equipment, or utilities. Any damage caused by FIRM shall be reported immediately to the OAR and such work shall be repaired and/or replaced by FIRM in a manner approved by COM. All costs to repair and/or replace any damage caused by FIRM to existing facilities, equipment, or utilities shall be the sole responsibility of FIRM, and such repair or replacement shall be performed expeditiously with no cost to COM.
- 30.3 FIRM shall provide protection for finished work at all times and protect adjacent work during cleaning operations, and make good any damage resulting from neglect of this precaution.
- 30.4 Protection of work shall include protecting of work that is factory finished, during transportation, storage, during and after installation. Where applicable and as required, FIRM shall close off spaces of areas where certain work has been completed to protect it from any damages caused by others during their operations.
- 30.5 FIRM shall store materials and shall be responsible for and shall maintain partly or wholly finished work during the continuance of this Contract and until the final acceptance of the structure. If any materials or part of the work should be lost, damaged, or destroyed by any cause or means whatsoever, the FIRM shall satisfactorily repair and replace the same at FIRM's own cost. The FIRM shall maintain suitable and sufficient guards, if necessary, and barriers, and at night, suitable and sufficient lighting for the prevention of accidents. The determination of necessity will be made by the OAR.
- 30.6 To all applicable sections where preparatory work is part of work thereon, FIRM shall carefully examine surfaces over which finished work is to be installed, laid or applied, before commencing with the work. FIRM shall not proceed with said work until defective surfaces on which work is to be applied are satisfactorily corrected by FIRM.

30.7 It will be the FIRM's responsibility to preserve all existing utilities within the Project limits or as otherwise effected by FIRM. If utility conflicts are encountered by the FIRM during construction, sufficient notice shall be given to their owners so that they may make the necessary adjustments. Damage to any utilities caused by FIRM, shall be repaired at the FIRM's expense.

31. <u>CONTINUING THE WORK</u>

FIRM shall carry on the Project and adhere to the progress schedule during all disputes or disagreements with COM. No work shall be delayed or postponed pending resolution of any disputes or disagreements. Unless otherwise specifically stated, the provisions of this Section shall supersede all other provisions of this Agreement.

32. FIELD ORDERS AND SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTIONS

- 32.1 The OAR shall have the right to approve and issue Field Orders setting forth written interpretations of the intent of the Contract Documents and ordering minor changes in contract execution, providing the Field Order involves no change in the total cost of the Project or the time of performance.
- 32.2 The OAR shall have the right to approve and issue supplemental instructions setting forth written orders, instructions, or interpretations concerning this Agreement or its performance, provided they make no major changes in Contract execution and involve no change in the total cost of the Project or the time of performance.

33. CHANGE ORDERS

- 33.1 Changes in the quantity or character of work within the scope of this Project which are not properly the subject of Field Orders or supplemental instructions, to include all changes resulting in changes in the total cost of the Project or the time of performance, shall be authorized only by Change Orders approved and issued by COM in accordance with the City of Miami Procurement Code.
- 33.3 FIRM shall not start work on any alteration requested by OAR which requires an increase in price or extension of time for completion unless and until a Change Order setting forth the adjustments is approved by COM.
- 33.5 On approval of any Change Order increasing the price, FIRM shall ensure that the applicable Performance and Payment Bonds and Guarantees are each increased so that it reflects the total amount of the Project as increased.
- 33.6 Proposed Change Orders shall be prepared by the OAR on forms provided by COM. When submitted for approval, they shall carry the signature of the FIRM and the OAR.
- 33.7 Change Orders may be issued unilaterally by COM.
- 33.8 FIRM shall deliver copies of all Change Orders to the Surety.
- 33.9 Change Orders which arise from oversight in the Design by FIRM shall be the sole

34. VALUE OF CHANGE ORDER WORK

- 34.1 The value of any work covered by a Change Order shall be determined in one of the following ways:
 - 34.1.1 Where the work involved is covered by unit prices contained in the Contract Documents, by application of unit prices to the quantities of items involved, subject to the provisions herein.
 - 34.1.2 By mutual acceptance of a lump sum which includes FIRM's fee for overhead and profit and includes any Design and Subcontractor fees.
 - 34.1.3 On the basis of the "cost of the work," determined as provided in Sections 34.2 and 38.3 below.
- 34.2 The term "cost of work" means:
 - 34.2.1 For all labor, including employees, on-site project manager, project engineer, project superintendent, and assistant project superintendent, the FIRM shall receive a sum equal to the current local rate of wage for every hour that the labor is actually engaged in such work, to which shall be added an amount equal to 15% of such sum. Additionally the FIRM shall be paid the actual cost of Social Security Taxes, Health Insurance, Surety Bond, Unemployment Insurance, Workmen's Compensation Insurance and other employee benefits, and Public Liability and Property Insurance involved in such extra work, based on actual wages paid to such labor.
 - 34.2.2 For all materials used, the actual costs of such materials used and incorporated in the Project, including costs of transportation, to which cost shall be added an amount equal to 10% thereof. All cash discounts shall accrue to FIRM unless COM deposits funds with FIRM. All trade discounts, rebates and refunds, and all returns from sale of surplus materials and equipment shall accrue to COM, and FIRM shall make provisions so that they may be obtained.
 - 34.2.3 The actual cost of rentals of construction equipment and machinery and the parts thereof whether rented from FIRM or others in accordance with rental agreements approved by COM and the costs of transportation, loading, unloading, installation, dismantling and removal thereof, all in accordance with the terms of said agreements. The rental of any such equipment, machinery or parts shall cease when the use thereof is no longer necessary for the Project. Late charges, penalties, restocking charges and similar assessments in said agreements will not be recognized by the COM as a supplemental cost, unless such charges were incurred and actually assessed against the FIRM due to performance of the work at the request of the COM.
 - 34.2.4 Payments made by FIRM to subcontractors for work performed by subcontractors. The term subcontractor shall include architects and engineers employed for sensions encifically colored to the Design of required by the OAR, FIRM shall obtain competitive bids from

subcontractors acceptable to FIRM and shall deliver such bids to COM who will then determine which bids will be accepted. If the subcontract provides that the subcontractor is to be paid on the basis of cost of the work plus a fee, the subcontractor's cost of the work shall be determined in the same manner as FIRM's cost of the work. Whenever a subcontractor is involved, a complete and separate breakdown must be submitted by the subcontractor for its portion of work. All subcontractors shall be subject to the other provisions of the Contract Documents insofar as applicable.

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- 34.2.5 Costs of special consultants, including, but not limited to, testing laboratories, surveyors, lawyers and accountants, employed for services specifically related to the Project.
- 34.3 The term "cost of the work" shall not include any of the following:
- 34.3.1 Payroll costs and other compensation of FIRM's officers, executives, principals (of partnership and sole proprietorships), general managers, estimators, lawyers, auditors, accountants, purchasing and contracting agents, expediters, timekeepers, clerks and other personnel employed by FIRM whether at the Project site or In FIRM's principal or branch office for general administration of the Project and not specifically included in the agreed-upon schedule of job classifications, all of which are to be considered administrative costs covered by FIRM's fee.
- 34.3.2 Expenses of FIRM's principal and branch offices other than FIRM's office at the Project site.
- 34.3.3 Any part of FIRM's capital expenses, including interest on FIRM's capital employed for the Project and charged against FIRM for delinquent payments.
- 34.3.4 Cost of premiums for all bonds and for all insurance whether or not FIRM is required by the Contract Documents to purchase and maintain the same, except for additional bonds and insurance required because of changes in the Project.
- 34.3.5 Costs due to the negligence of FIRM, any subcontractors, any consultants of FIRM, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or for whose acts any of them may be liable, including but not limited to, the correction of defective or nonconforming work, disposal of materials or equipment wrongly supplied and making good any damage to property.
- 34.3.6 Other overhead or general expense costs of any kind and the cost of any litem not specifically and expressly included in Section 34.2.
- 34.4 The amount of credit to be allowed by FIRM to COM for any such change which results in a net decrease in cost will be the amount of the actual net decrease. When both additions and credits are involved in any one change, the combined overhead and profit shall be decrease af the metric profit.

- 34.5 Whenever the cost of any work is to be determined pursuant to this Section, FIRM will submit in a form acceptable to the OAR an itemized cost breakdown together with the supporting data.
- 34.6 Where the quantity of work with respect to any item that is covered by a unit price is increased or decreased by more than twenty percent (20%) from the quantity of such work indicated in the Contract Documents, an appropriate Change Order may be issued to adjust the unit price, if warranted.
- 34.7 Whenever a change in the work is to be based on mutual acceptance of a lump sum, whether the amount is an addition, credit or no-change-in-cost, FIRM shall promptly submit to the OAR an estimate substantiated by a complete itemized breakdown.
 - 34.7.1 Breakdown shall list quantities and unit prices for materials, labor, equipment and other items of cost.
 - 38.7.2 Whenever a change involves FIRM and one or more subcontractors or consultants and the change is an increase in the Contract price, overhead and profit percentages for FIRM and each subcontractor or consultant shall be itemized separately.
- 34.8 Each Change Order must state within the body of the Change Order whether it is based upon unit price, negotiated lump sum, or "cost of work."

35. CHANGE OF CONTRACT TIME OR CONTRACT SUM

- 35.1 The Contract Time and the Contract Sum may only be changed by a Change Order. Any claim for an extension of the Contract time or for an increase in the fee to be paid to FIRM shall be based on written notice delivered by the party making the claim to the OAR promptly (but in no event later than seven (7) business days after the occurrence of the event giving rise to the claim and stating the general nature of the claim). Notice of the extent of the claim with supporting data shall be delivered within twenty (20) calendar days after such written notice (unless OAR allows, in writing, an additional period of time to ascertain more accurate data in support of the claim) and shall be accompanied by the claimant's written statement that the adjustment claimed is the entire adjustment to which the claims for adjustment in the Contract Time or for an increase in the Contract Sum shall be decided by the OAR in accordance with this Agreement. No claim for an adjustment in the Contract time or for an increase in the Section.
- 35.2 The Contract time will be extended in an amount equal to time lost due to days beyond the control of and through no fault or negligence of FIRM if a claim is made therefor as provided herein. Such delays shall include, but not be limited to, acts or neglect by COM, or by any employee of COM, or any separate contractor or consultant employed by COM, fires, floods, labor disputes, epidemics, or acts of God.

36. NO DAMAGES FOR DELAY

NO CLAIM FOR DAMAGES OR ANY CLAIM, OTHER THAN FOR AN EXTENSION OF TIME, SHALL BE MADE OR ASSERTED AGAINST COM BY REASON OF ANY DELAYS. FIRM shall not be entitled to an increase in the Contract Sum or payment or compensation of any kind from COM for direct, indirect, consequential, impact or other costs, expenses or damages, including, but not limited to, costs of acceleration or inefficiency, arising because of delay, disruption, interference or hindrance from any cause whatsoever, whether such delay, disruption, interference or hindrance be reasonable or unreasonable, foreseeable or unforeseeable, or avoidable or unavoidable; except due solely to fraud, bad faith or active interference on the part of COM or its agents. Otherwise, FIRM shall be entitled only to extensions of the contract time as the sole and exclusive remedy for such resulting delays, in accordance with and to the extent specifically provided above. The specific application of this Section to other provisions of this Agreement shall not be construed as a limitation of any sort upon the further application of this Section. Ten dollars (\$10.00) of FIRM'S fee is acknowledged as separate and independent consideration for the covenants contained in this Section.

37. SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION

When FIRM considers a Phase of the Project, or a designated portion thereof which is acceptable to COM, is substantially complete, FIRM shall so notify the OAR in writing and shall prepare for submission to the OAR a thorough list of items to be completed or corrected, together with a schedule for completion of all items. Said list shall include all disciplines including but not limited to HVAC, plumbing, electric, architecture, civil, landscape, etc. List shall be prepared by Design Professional in each discipline. The failure to include any items on such list does not alter the responsibility of FIRM to complete all work in accordance with the Contract Documents. The OAR or a designee shall conduct an inspection to determine that the Project or designated portion thereof is substantially complete. The OAR will then instruct FIRM to prepare and deliver to the OAR a Certificate of Substantial Completion which shall establish the date of Substantial Completion. After review of the Certificate by the OAR, COM shall either accept or reject the Certificate. Acceptance of Substantial Completion by COM and its OAR shall be based upon compliance with the Contract Documents and applicable codes, laws, rules, and regulations having jurisdiction over this Project and obtaining a temporary certificate of occupancy. FIRM shall have thirty (30) days to complete the items listed therein. Warranties required by the Contract Documents and submitted in appropriate form to the OAR along with the request for Substantial Completion shall commence on the date of Substantial Completion. The Certificate of Substantial Completion shall be submitted to COM through the OAR and FIRM for written acceptance of the responsibilities assigned to them in such Certificate.

38. SHOP DRAWINGS AND SCHEDULE OF VALUES

- 38.1 FIRM shall submit Shop Drawings for all equipment, apparatus, machinery, fixtures, piping, wiring, fabricated structures and manufactured articles. The purpose of a Shop Drawing is to show the suitability, efficiency, technique of manufacture, installation requirements, details of the item and evidence of its compliance or noncompliance with the Contract Documents.
- 38.2 FIRM shall submit to the OAR within thirty (30) calendar days following the application for a building permit a complete list of preliminary data on items for which Shop Drawings are to be submitted. Approval of this list by the OAR shall in no way relieve FIRM from submitting complete Shop Drawings and providing materials, equipment, etc., fully in **exposulance-with the Continue Decuments.** This precedence is required in enter to exposite final approval of Shop Drawings.

- 38.3 After the approval of the list of items required in this Section, FIRM shall promptly request Shop Drawings from the various manufacturers, fabricators, and suppliers.
- 38.4 FIRM shall thoroughly review and check the Shop Drawings and each and every copy shall show FIRM's approval thereon.
- 38.5 If the Shop Drawings show or indicate departures from the Contract requirements, FIRM shall make specific mention thereof in its letter of transmittal. Failure to point out such departures shall not relieve FIRM from its responsibility to comply with the Contract Documents.
- 38.6 No work called for by Shop Drawings shall be done until the said Drawings have been furnished to and accepted by the OAR. Acceptance is for design intent only and shall not relieve FIRM and Architect from responsibility for fit, form, function, quantity or for errors or omissions of any sort on the Shop Drawings.
- 38.7 No acceptance will be given to partial submittal of Shop Drawings for items which interconnect and/or are interdependent. It is FIRM's responsibility to assemble the Shop Drawings for all such interconnecting and/or independent items, check them and then make one submittal to the OAR along with FIRM's comments as to compliance, noncompliance, or features requiring special attention.
- 38.8 If catalog sheets or prints of manufacturers' standard drawings are submitted as Shop Drawings, any additional information or changes on such drawings shall be typewritten or lettered in ink. Catalog sheet with multiple options shall be highlighted to depict specific pertinent data including options.
- 38.9 FIRM shall submit, to OAR, six (6) copies. Resubmissions of Shop Drawings shall be made in the same quantity until final acceptance is obtained.
- 38.10 OAR's acceptance of the Shop Drawings as approved by FIRM will be for general compliance with the plans and specifications design intent and shall not relieve FIRM of responsibility for the accuracy of such Drawings, nor for the proper fittings and construction of the work, nor for the furnishing of the materials or work required by this Contract and not indicated on the Drawings.
- 38.11 FIRM shall keep one set of Shop Drawings marked with the OAR's acceptance at the Project site at all times.
- 38.12 At least thirty (30) calendar days prior to the Project Commencement Date, the FIRM shall submit a schedule of values to the OAR. FIRM shall submit to COM a separate schedule of values for demolition, abatement, and site work thirty (30) calendar days prior to commencing such portion of the work. The schedule will be typed on 8-1/2" x 11" white paper listing: Title of project, location, project number, architect, contractor, contract designation, and date of submission. The schedule shall list the installed value of the component parts of the work in sufficient detail to serve as a basis for computing values for progress payments during the construction. The table of contents of the specifications shall establish the format for listing the component items. Each line item will de identified day the number and diffe of the sub-values of major products or

operations under the item. Each item shall include the proportion of FIRM's overhead and profit. For any items for which progress payments will be requested for stored materials, the value will be broken down with (i) the cost of materials delivered, unloaded, properly stored and safeguarded, with taxes paid; and (ii) the total installed value. ٠,

39. FIELD ENGINEERING

- 39.1 The FIRM shall provide and pay for field engineering services required for the Project. This work shall include the following elements:
 - 39.1.1 Survey work required in execution of the Project.
 - 39.1.2 Civil, structural or other professional engineering services specified, or required to execute the FIRM's construction methods.
- 39.2 The survey completed by FIRM shall identify the qualified engineer or registered land surveyor, acceptable to the COM, and he or she shall be retained by the FIRM at the outset of this Project. The surveyor shall be duly registered as a surveyor or mapper, as required by state law.
- 39.3 The survey will locate and protect control points prior to starting site work, and will preserve all permanent reference points during construction. The surveyor shall be required to replace Project control points which may be lost or destroyed. Replacements shall be established based upon original survey control. A report shall be made to the FIRM when any reference point is lost or destroyed, or requires relocation because of necessary changes in grades or locations. No changes or relocations will be made without prior written notice to FIRM. Threshold inspection and test and balancing to be done by consultants directly employed by COM.

40. FIELD LAYOUT OF THE WORK AND RECORD DRAWINGS

- 40.1 The entire responsibility for establishing and maintaining a line and grade in the field lies with FIRM. FIRM shall maintain an accurate and precise record of the location and elevation of all pipe lines, conduits, structures, underground utility access portals, handholds, fittings and the like and shall deliver these records in good order to the OAR as the work is completed. These records shall serve as a basis for "record" drawings. The cost of all such field layout and recording work is included in the prices bid for the appropriate items.
- 40.2 FIRM shall maintain in a safe place at the site one record copy of all Drawings (Plans), Specifications, Addenda, written amendments, Change Orders and written interpretations and clarifications in good order and annotated to show all changes made during construction. These record documents together with all approved samples and a counterpart of all approved Shop Drawings will be available to OAR for reference. Upon completion of the Project, these record documents, samples and Shop Drawings shall be delivered to OAR.
- 40.3 At the completion of the Project, the FIRM shall turn over do the COM a set of reproducible drawings (Mylars) and a complete set of all drawings in the latest **commercially-released worsign of AutoCAD an AD ant completes made to the construction** reflect the "as built" conditions of the new facility. All changes made to the construction

documents, either as clarifications or as changes, will be reflected in the plans. The changes shall be submitted on Mylar at least monthly to the OAR. These "as built" drawings on Mylar and the latest commercially released version of AutoCAD media must be delivered and found to be acceptable prior to final payments.

41. SAFETY AND PROTECTION

- 41.1 FIRM shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with the Project. FIRM shall take all necessary precautions for the safety of, and shall provide the necessary protection to prevent damage, injury or loss to: (i) all employees on the Project and other persons who may be affected thereby; (ii) all the work and all materials or equipment to be incorporated therein, whether in storage on or off the Project site; and (iii) other property at the site or adjacent thereto, including trees, shrubs, lawns, walks, pavements, roadways, structures and utilities not designated for removal, relocation or replacement in the course of construction.
- 41.2 FIRM shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders of any public body having jurisdiction for the safety of persons or property or to protect them from damage, injury or loss; and shall erect and maintain all necessary safeguards for such safety and protection. FIRM shall notify owners of adjacent property and utilities when prosecution of the work may affect them. All damage, injury or loss to any property referred to in this section, caused directly or indirectly, in whole or in part, by FIRM, any subcontractor or consultant or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, shall be remedied by FIRM; however, FIRM shall not be liable for injury or damage caused by COM, its employees, consultants or its separate contractors. FIRM's duties and responsibilities for the safety and protection of the Project shall continue until such time as the Project is completed and the OAR has issued a notice to FIRM that the Project is acceptable.
- 41.3 FIRM shall designate a responsible member of its organization at the Project site whose duty shall be the prevention of accidents. This person shall be FIRM's Project Representative unless otherwise designated in writing by FIRM to COM.
- 41.4 In an emergency affecting safety of persons or property, the FIRM shall act, at the FIRM's discretion, to prevent threatened damage, injury or loss

42. PROJECT_SIGNAGE

FIRM, in consultation with COM, shall furnish and erect two (2) signs at the Project site. Each sign shall be made of 3/4 inch plywood, substantially in accordance with this Section. Signs shall be placed in a prominent location and maintained in good condition until completion of the Project when signs shall then become the property of COM. The dimensions of the Project Signs shall be four feet by eight feet or as otherwise determined by the OAR. The detail of the Project Signs, and the language to be displayed, shall be as determined by the OAR. At a minimum, FIRM shall submit artwork with name and logos of Project, FIRM, COM and date of completion.

43. CLEANING UP AND REMOVAL OF EQUIPMENT

43.1 With elastic times help the Project elto free from accommutation of master materials of rubbish caused by FIRM's operations. At the completion of the Project, FIRM shall

remove all its waste materials and rubbish from and about the Project as well as its tools, construction equipment, machinery and surplus materials. If FIRM fails to clean up at the completion of the Project, COM may do so; and the cost thereof shall be charged to FIRM.

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- 43.2 If a dispute arises between FIRM and separate contractors as to responsibility for cleaning up, COM may clean up and charge the cost thereof to the contractors responsible therefore in the proportion for which they are responsible after timely notice and opportunity to correct. This provision is solely for cleaning.
- 43.3 In case of termination of this Agreement before completion for any cause whatever, FIRM, if notified to do so by COM, shall promptly remove any part or all of FIRM's equipment and supplies from the property of COM, failing which COM shall have the right to remove such equipment and supplies at the expense of FIRM.

44. DAVIS-BACON WAGE DETERMINATION AND SECTION 3 REQUIREMENTS

45. <u>BONDS AND INDEMNIFICATION INOTE: SUBJECT TO RISK MANAGEMENT'S</u> <u>APPROVAL)</u>

FIRM shall furnish, on or before execution of this Agreement, the following:

- 45.1 Performance Bond and Payment Bond (Surety):
 - 45.1.1 A performance bond and payment bond in the form and containing all the provisions attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibits E and F.
 - 45.1.2 The Bonds shall be in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract Sum guaranteeing to COM the completion and performance of the Project as well as full payment of all suppliers, materialpersons, laborers, or subcontractors employed pursuant to this Project. Such Bonds shall be with surety qualified pursuant to Section 45.3.
 - 45.1.3 Such Bonds shall continue in effect for one year after completion and acceptance of the Project with liability equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract price, or an additional bond shall be conditioned that FIRM will, upon notification by COM, correct any defective or faulty work or materials which appear within one year after completion of this Contract.

45.2 Performance and Payment Guaranty:

45.2.1 In lieu of a performance bond and payment bond under Section 45.1, FIRM may furnish to COM an alternate form of security which may be in the form of cash, money order, certified check, cashier's check or irrevocable letter of credit. Such alternate forms of security shall be for the same purpose and shall be subject to the same conditions as those applicable above and shall be hold by GOM (in an average completion and acceptance of the Project.

45.3 Qualifications of Surety:

45.3.1 A separate performance bond and payment bond must be executed by a surety company of recognized standing, authorized to do business in the state of Florida as surety, having a resident agent in the state of Florida and having been in business with a record of successful continuous operation for at least five (5) years.

45.3.2 In addition to the above-minimum qualifications, the surety company must meet at least one of the following additional qualifications:

45.3.2.1 The surety company shall hold a current certificate of authority as acceptable surety on federal bonds in accordance with United States Department of Treasury Circular 570, Current Revisions. If the amount of the Bond exceeds the underwriting limitation set forth in the circular, in order to qualify, the net retention of the surety company shall not exceed the underwriting limitation in the circular, and the excess risks must be protected by coinsurance, reinsurance, or other methods in accordance with Treasury Circular 297, revised September 1, 1978 (31 CFR Section 223.10 Section 223.111). Further, the surety company shall provide COM with evidence satisfactory to COM, that such excess risk has been protected in an acceptable manner.

FIRM shall indemnify and save harmless COM and the City of Miami, its officers, agents, and employees, from or on account of any injuries or damages, received or sustained by any person, persons, or property caused by the negligence or misconduct of FIRM, its agents, employees, subcontractors, or other persons permitted by FIRM to perform on the Project site during, or on account of, any operations connected with the construction of this Project, including warranty period; or by or in consequence of any such peologence or misconduct, evoluting negligence of COM, in connection with the same; or any negligent act or

omission of FIRM or its subcontractors, agents, servants or employees. FIRM agrees to indemnify and save harmless COM, its officers, agents and employees, against any claims or liability arising from or based upon the violation of any federal, state, or local laws, ordinances or regulations and any misconduct related thereto by FIRM, its subcontractor, agents, servants or employees. FIRM agrees to indemnify and save harmless COM, its officers, agents and employees, from all such claims and fees. and from any and all suits and actions of every name and description that may be brought against COM, its officers, agents and employees, on account of any claims, fees, royalties, or costs for any invention or patent. and from any and all suits and actions that may be brought against COM. its officers, agents and employees, for the negligence or misconduct of FIRM which results in infringement of any and all patents or patent rights claimed by any person, FIRM, or corporation. FIRM further agrees to indemnify and save harmless COM, its officers, agents and employees, for or on account of any injuries or damages, received or sustained by any person or persons resulting from any construction defects, including patent defects caused by the negligence or misconduct of FIRM, its agents. servants. emplovees. and subcontractors. These indemnifications survive the term of this Contract. In the event that any action or proceeding is brought against COM by reason of any such claim or demand, FIRM, upon written notice from COM shall resist and defend such action or proceeding by counsel satisfactory to COM. This consideration is separate and distinct from any other consideration received by FIRM.

- 45.4.2 The indemnification provided above shall obligate FIRM to defend at its own expense to and through appellate, supplemental or bankruptcy proceeding, or to provide for such defense, at COM's option, any and all claims of liability and all suits and actions of every name and description that may be brought against COM which may result from the operations and activities under this Agreement performed by FIRM, its subcontractors, its consultants or by anyone employed by any of the above.
- 45.4.3 The execution of this Agreement by FIRM shall obligate FIRM to comply with the foregoing Indemnification provision.

45.5 INSURANCE

Without limiting any other obligations or liabilities of FIRM, FIRM shall provide, pay for, and maintain in force at all times until the Project is completed and accepted by COM and COM's Risk Management (provided that if a longer duration is specified in this Agreement for particular coverages, then the longer duration shall be applicable thereto), such insurance as follows:

46.1 ROYALTIES AND PATENTS

All fees, royalties, and claims for any invention, or pretended invention, or patent of any article, material, arrangement, appliance or method that may be used upon or in any manner be connected with the construction of this Project or appurtenances, are hereby included in the prices stipulated in this Agreement for said Project.

46.2 <u>DATUM</u>

All elevations are referred to as National Geodetic Vertical Datum (N.G.V.D.) of 1929.

46.3 RIGHTS OF VARIOUS INTERESTS

Whenever work being done by COM's forces or by other contractors is contiguous to work covered by this Agreement, the respective rights of the various interests involved shall be established by the OAR to secure the completion of the various portions of the work in general harmony.

46.4 THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Neither FIRM nor COM intends to directly or substantially benefit a third party by this Agreement. Therefore, the parties agree that there are no third party beneficiarles to this Agreement and that we third party chall the entitled to expect a claim against either them based upon this Agreement. The parties expressly acknowledge that it is not their intent to create any rights or obligations under this Agreement in any third person or entity.

46.5 ASSIGNMENT

Neither party to this Agreement shall assign this Agreement nor subcontract it as a whole without the written consent of the other, nor shall FIRM assign any monies due or to become due to it hereunder, without the prior written consent of theOAR.

46.6 NO INTEREST

Any monies not paid by COM when claimed to be due to FIRM under this Agreement shall not be subject to interest. However, the provisions of COM's prompt payment ordinance, as such relates to timeliness of payment, and the provisions of Section 218.74(4), Florida Statutes, as such relates to the payment of interest, shall apply to valid and proper involces.

46.7 <u>OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS</u>

Drawings, specifications, designs, architectural plans, models, photographs, computer AutoCAD disks, reports, surveys, and other data provided in connection with this Agreement and for which COM has rendered payment, are and shall become and remain the property of COM whether the Project for which they are made is executed or not. FIRM and COM agree that all such work shall be considered work made for hire. If this Agreement is terminated for any reason prior to completion of the work, COM may, in its discretion, use any design and documents prepared hereunder for the purpose of completing the Project; provided that if such termination occurs prior to completion of documents and/or through no fault of FIRM; FIRM shall have no liability for such use. After COM has paid for services under this Agreement, COM may reuse any design and documents prepared pursuant to this Agreement at other locations or sites without written verification or adaptation of FIRM, including reuse with modification or adaptation by others; provided that any reuse without the written verification or adaptation of FIRM for the specific purpose intended will be without liability to FIRM. At the completion of the Project, as part of the Project closeout, copies of all drawings on AutoCAD disks shall be transmitted from FIRM to the OAR within seven (7) calendar days of termination of this Agreement in addition to the record drawings (Mylars). The provisions of this clause shall survive the completion of this Agreement and shall thereafter remain in full force and effect. Any compensation due to FIRM shall be withheld until all documents are received as provided herein.

46.8 <u>RECORDS</u>

FIRM shall keep such records and accounts and require any and all architects, consultants and subcontractors to keep records and accounts as may be necessary in order to record complete and correct entries as to personnel hours charged to this engagement. Such books and records will be available at all reasonable times for examination and audit by COM and shall be kept for the required retention period of the Florida Public Records Act (Chapter 119, Fla. Stat.) if applicable or, if the Florida Public Records Act is not applicable, for a period of three (3) years after the completion of the Project pursuant to this Agreement. Incomplete or incorrect entries in such books and records will be grounds for disallowance by COM of any fees or expenses based upon such entries.

46.9 <u>NONDISCRIMINATION, EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY, AND AMERICANS</u> WITH DISABILITIES ACT

FIRM shall not unlawfully discriminate against any person in its operations and activities in its use or expenditure of the funds or any portion of the funds provided by this Agreement and shall affirmatively comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in the course of providing any services funded in whole or in part by COM, including Titles I and II of the ADA (regarding nondiscrimination on the basis of disability), and all applicable regulations, guidelines, and standards.

FIRM's decisions regarding the delivery of services under this Agreement shall be made without regard to or consideration of race, age, religion, color, gender, national origin, marital status, physical or mental disability, political affiliation, or any other factor which cannot be lawfully or appropriately used as a basis for service delivery or other affected activity.

FIRM shall comply with Title I of the Americans with Disabilities Act regarding nondiscrimination on the basis of disability in employment and further shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, age, religion, color, gender, sexual orientation, national origin, marital status, political affiliation, or physical or mental disability.

FIRM shall not engage in or commit any discriminatory practice in violation of any applicable law in the performance of this Agreement.

46.10 NO CONTINGENT FEE

FIRM warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for FIRM to solicit or secure this Agreement and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual or FIRM, other than a bona fide employee working solely for FIRM, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement. For the breach or violation of this provision, COM shall have the right to terminate this Agreement without liability at its discretion, to deduct from the Contract price, or otherwise recover the full amount of such fees, commission, percentage, gift or consideration.

46.11 REPRESENTATIVE OF COM AND FIRM

- 46.11.1 It is recognized that questions in the day-to-day conduct of the Project will arise. The OAR shall designate in writing and shall advise FIRM in writing, of one (1) or more COM employees to whom all communications pertaining to the day-to-day conduct of the Project shall be addressed.
- 46.11.2 The OAR will represent COM in administering the Contract Documents from concept through Closeout. The OAR is the chief liaison between COM and the FIRM. All communications between the FIRM and the COM shall be through the OAR.

46.11.3 FIRM shall inform the OAR in writing of the representative of FIRM to whom matters involving the day-to-day conduct of the Project shall be addressed.

46.12 ALL PRIOR AGREEMENTS SUPERSEDED; AMENDMENTS

The Contract Documents incorporate and include all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements or understandings applicable to the matters contained herein, and the parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements or understandings concerning the subject matter of this Agreement that are not contained in the Contract Documents. Accordingly it is agreed that no deviation from the terms hereof shall be predicated upon any prior representations or agreements whether oral or written.

It is further agreed that no modification, amendment or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document executed with the same formality and of equal dignity herewith.

46.13 NOTICES

Whenever either party desires to give notice unto the other, it must be given by written notice, sent by certified United States mail, with return receipt requested, addressed to the party for whom it is intended, at the place last specified; and the place for giving of notice shall remain such until it shall have been changed by written notice in compliance with the provisions of this paragraph. For the present, the parties designate the following as the respective places for giving of notice:

FOR FIRM:

46.14 TRUTH-IN-NEGOTIATION CERTIFICATE

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FIRM's execution of this Agreement shall act as the execution of a truth-in-negotiation certificate stating that wage rates and other factual unit costs supporting the compensation of this Agreement are accurate, complete, and current at the time of contracting. The original Contract price and any additions thereto shall be adjusted to exclude any significant sums by which COM determines the Contract price was increased due to inaccurate, incomplete, or non-current wage rates and other factual unit costs. All such Contract adjustments shall be made within one (1) year following the end of this Agreement.

46.15 INTERPRETATION

The parties hereto acknowledge and agree that the language used in this Agreement expresses their mutual intent, and no rule of strict construction shall apply to either party hereto. The headings contained in this Agreement are for reference purposes only and shall not affect in any way the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement. All personal pronouns used in this Agreement shall include the other gender, and the singular shall include the plural, and vice versa, unless the context otherwise requires. Terms such as "herein," "hereof," "hereunder," and "hereinafter" refer to this Agreement as a whole and not to the particular sentence, paragraph or section where they appear, unless the context requires otherwise. Whenever reference is made to a Section of this Agreement, such reference is to the Section as a whole, including all of the subsections and subparagraphs of such Section, unless the reference is expressly made to a particular subsection or subparagraph of such Section.

46.16 CONDITION PRECEDENT TO AGREEMENT

It is understood by the parties to this Agreement that all duties and obligations as set forth herein for the Design and Construction Phases of the Project are contingent upon and shall not be binding upon COM until such time as Notice to Proceed is issued.

The parties hereto acknowledge that as of the date of execution of this Agreement certain necessary governmental approvals may not have been obtained by FIRM in order to lawfully commence the Project. COM shall not be responsible or liable for any damages of any nature whatsoever, including but not limited to, direct, indirect, consequential, impact or other costs and expenses, which may arise as a result of, or connected to, the failure of any governmental entity, other than COM, refusing to grant any necessary approval, permit, variance or any other required consent which may be necessary to commence construction of the Project, or which may arise as a result of any delay in the granting of any such approval, permit, variance or other required consent.

46.17 ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS

FIRM shall notify COM immediately of notice of any citation or violation which FIRM may receive during the time of performance of this Contract.

46.18 <u>RECYCLED CONTENT</u>

in support of the Florida Waste Management Law, FIRM is encouraged to supply any information available regarding recycled material content in the products provided. COM is particularly interested in the type of recycled material used (such as paper, plastic, glass, metal, etc.); and the percentage of recycled material contained in the product. COM also requests information regarding any known or potential material content in the product that may be extracted and recycled after the product has served its intended purpose. 14

46.19 PUBLIC ENTITY CRIME ACT

FIRM represents that the execution of this Agreement will not violate the Public Entity Crime Act (Section 287.133, Florida Statutes), which essentially provides that a person or affiliate who is a contractor, consultant, or other provider and who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to COM, may not submit a bid on a contract with COM for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases of real property to COM, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with COM, and may not transact any business with COM in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes, for category two purchases for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list. Violation of this section shall result in termination of this Agreement and recovery of all monies paid by COM pursuant to this Agreement, and may result in debarment from COM's competitive procurement activities.

In addition to the foregoing, FIRM further represents that there has been no determination, based on an audit, that it committed an act defined by Section 287.133, Florida Statutes, as a "public entity crime" and that it has not been formally charged with committing an act defined as a "public entity crime" regardless of the amount of money involved or whether FIRM has been placed on the convicted vendor list.

46.20 CONTRACT CLOSEOUT

- 46.20.1 FIRM shall comply with requirements stated in this Agreement and in Specifications for administrative procedures in closing out the work. When FIRM considers the work substantially complete, FIRM shall submit to OAR a written note that the work, or designated portion thereof, is substantially complete, and a list of items to be completed or corrected.
- 46.20.2 Within five (5) business days after receipt of such notice, OAR will make an inspection to determine the status of completion. Should OAR determine that the work is not substantially complete, OAR will promptly notify the FIRM, in writing, giving the reasons therefor. FIRM shall remedy the deficiencies in the work, and send a second written notice to OAR that the work or designated portion thereof, is substantially complete, again listing items to be completed or corrected.
- 46.20.3 FIRM and OAR will reinspect the work. When OAR determines that the work is substantially complete, FIRM will prepare a Certificate of Substantial Completion in the form of Exhibit H, accompanied by FIRM's list of items to be completed or corrected, as verified and amended by OAR. FIRM will submit the Certificate to the OAR together with FIRM's written acceptance and acknowledgment of responsibility to complete to be completed in the Certificate as needing to be

completed or corrected. A date by which each listed item will be completed or corrected shall also be included.

- 46.20.4 When FIRM considers the work to be complete, FIRM shall submit written certification that:
 - 46.20.4.1 The Contract Documents have been reviewed.
 - 46.20.4.2 The work has been inspected for compliance with Contract Documents.
 - 46.20.4.3 The work has been completed in accordance with Contract Documents.
 - 46.20.4.4 Equipment and systems have been tested in the presence of the COM's representative and are operational.
 - 46.20.4.5 The work is completed and ready for final inspection.
 - 46.20.4.6 At the same time that FIRM submits certification, FIRM shall also submit:

46.20.4.6.1 A Final Certificate of Occupancy.

- 46.20.4.6.2 Certificates of inspection and testing for mechanical work, and electrical work.
- 46.20.4.6.3 Project record documents and "as built" drawings.
- 46.20.4.6.4 Operating and Maintenance data and instructions to COM's personnel.
- 46.20.4.6.5 Warranties and bonds as required under the Contract Documents.
- 46.20.4.6.6 Keys and keying schedule.
- 46.20.4.6.7 Evidence of all COM/user operating demonstrations and training for all equipment in Project.
- 46.20.5 FIRM and OAR or designee will make an inspection to verify the status of completion within ten (10) business days after receipt of such certification. Should the OAR consider that the work is incomplete or defective, OAR will promptly notify the FIRM, in writing, listing the incomplete or defective work. FIRM shall take immediate steps to remedy the stated deficiencies, and send a second written certification to OAR that the work is complete. FIRM and OAR or designee will then reinspect the work. When the OAR finds that the work is acceptable under the Contrast Documents. COM shall request the FIRM to make closeout submittals.

- 46.20.6 FIRM's closeout submittals to COM shall provide evidence of compliance with requirements of governing authorities and testing agencies and shall include:
 - 46.20.6.1. The requirements of the Contract Documents.
 - 46.20.6.2. Evidence of payment and release of liens: To requirements of general and special conditions.
 - 46.20.6.3. Certificate of Insurance for products and completed operations.
- 46.20.7 FIRM shall submit a final statement of accounting to the OAR. The statement shall reflect all adjustments to the Contract Sum as follows:
 - 46.20.7.1. The original Contract Sum.
 - 46.20.7.2. Additions and deductions resulting from:
 - a. Previous Change Orders.
 - b. Allowances, if applicable.
 - c. Unit prices.
 - d. Deductions for uncorrected work.
 - e. Penalties and bonuses.
 - f. Deductions for liquidated damages.
 - g. Deductions for reinspection payments.
 - h. Other adjustments
 - 46.20.7.3. Total Contract Sum, as required.
 - 46.20.7.4. Previous payments.
 - 46,20.7.5. Sum remaining due.
- 46.20.8 FIRM will prepare a final Change Order, reflecting approved adjustments to the Contract Sum which were not previously made by Change Orders.
- 46.20.9 FIRM shall submit the final application for payment in accordance with procedures and requirements stated in the conditions of this Contract.

46.21 JURISDICTION, VENUE, WAIVER OF JURY TRIAL

This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the state of Florida. Any controversies or legal problems arising out of this Agreement and any action involving the enforcement or interpretation of any rights hereunder shall be submitted to the jurisdiction of the state courts of the Eleventh Judicial Circuit and venue for litigation arising out of this Agreement shall be in such state courts. By entering into this Agreement, FIRM and COM hereby expressly walve any rights either party may have to a trial by jury of any civil litigation related to this Agreement.

The parties acknowledge and agree that this Agreement is the product of negotiations and has been typed by one party for the benefit of both, and the negotiated terms and conditions herein shall not be construed for or against either party.

46.22 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

FIRM is an independent contractor under this Agreement. Services provided by FIRM pursuant to this Agreement shall be subject to the supervision of FIRM. In providing such services, neither FIRM nor its agents shall act as officers, employees, or agents of the COM. This Agreement shall not constitute or make the parties a partnership or joint venture.

46.23 CONFLICTS

Neither FIRM nor its employees shall have or hold any continuing or frequently recurring employment or contractual relationship that is substantially antagonistic or incompatible with FIRM's loyal and conscientious exercise of judgment and care related to its performance under this Agreement.

FIRM further agrees that none of its officers or employees shall, during the term of this Agreement, serve as an expert witness against COM in any legal or administrative proceeding in which he, she, or FIRM is not a party, unless compelled by court process. Further, FIRM agrees that such persons shall not give sworn testimony or issue a report or writing, as an expression of his or her expert opinion, which is adverse or prejudicial to the interests of COM in connection with any such pending or threatened legal or administrative proceeding unless compelled by court process. The limitations of this section shall not preclude FIRM or any persons in anyway from representing themselves, including giving expert testimony in support thereof, in any action or In any administrative or legal proceeding.

In the event FIRM is permitted pursuant to this Agreement to utilize subcontractors to perform any services required by this Agreement, FIRM agrees to require such subcontractors, by written contract, to comply with the provisions of this section to the same extent as FIRM.

46.24 WAIVER

COM's and FIRM's failure to enforce any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such provision or modification of this Agreement. A waiver of any breach of a provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement.

46.25 SEVERABILITY

The partial or complete invalidity of any one or more provisions of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or continuing force and effect of any other provision.

46.26 INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE

The effectivel Exhibits A shrough 1 are incorporated into and made supert of this Agreement.

46.27 MULTIPLE ORIGINALS

This Agreement may be fully executed in counterparts, each of which, bearing original signatures, shall have the force and effect of an original document.

Two water-play structures, a Wacky Waterway, two refurbished 400-foot water flumes, concession buildings and restrooms are all part of the new and Improved 4.69-acre aquatics complex at C.B. Smith Park.

The water-play area that can entertain up to 115 little squirts, 5 and under, has two slides and features a300gallon tipping coconut that splashes over a roof into the play pool.

For those 5 and up, there is a 286-capacity activity pool complete with a 600-gallon tipping bucket and five slides.

A 484-foot Wacky Waterway, accommodating up to 162 people, is awash with New Braunsels General Store International interactive features, including one that enables bystanders to soak those floating down the lazy river.

This \$6.5 million Design-Build water-park revamp went from contract award to completion in just 26 weeks. RDC was on the job 24/7 with as many as 110 workers daily. The project, which involved nine separate parmits, was completed within budget, on time and with no change orders.

Technical Proposal Site Amenities and Equipment

Recreational Design & Construction, Inc. has provided the following amenities and equipment for the Phase I construction of the Grapeland Heights Park located at 1500 NW 37th Avenue in Miami, Florida 33125. RDC's proposal is based on the attached phased plans.

Site Preparation:

- Clearing and prepping the entire site to prepare the area for construction shall be performed as a part of this scope of work.
- Debris resulting from the clearing, grubbing and demolition shall be disposed of at an off site location in accordance with all applicable codes and statutes.
- The area with-in the Phase I limits of construction shall be graded/shaped as required to construct the ballfields, access roads, parking lots, create dry detention/wet retention areas for storm water drainage and provide a proper building pad elevation for the ballfield concession/restroom building.

Site Work:

- One hundred ninety one (191) asphalt parking spaces, including a minimum of six (6)
 ADA accessible spaces, shall be constructed.
- Each asphalt parking space shall be striped in accordance with Miami-Dade County standards and provided with concrete wheel stops.
- FDOT compliant signs shall be provided for each ADA parking space.
- ► A 24'-0" wide park entry road shall be constructed at the northwest corner of the park to provide access from Northwest 37th Avenue.
- A 24'-0" wide divided main park entry and exit road shall be constructed on the north side of the park to provide access from Northwest 37th Avenue.
- Asphalt roadways and parking lots shall be constructed with a 12" sub-base (minimum LBR40) compacted to 98% of maximum density (AASHTO T-180), 8" lime rock base compacted to 98% of maximum density (AASHTO T-180) and an 1 ½" Type S-1 asphaltic concrete wearing surface.
- Type "D" curbing shall be installed to protect all landscape islands.
- Two (2) 12'-0" wide lockable "baffle" gate shall be installed at the Northwest 37th
 Avenue entrance to help prevent access to the park during off hours.
- Two (2) 12'-0" wide lockable "baffle" gate shall be installed at the Northwest 37th Avenue entrance and exit to help prevent access to the park during off hours.
- ADA compliant concrete and asphalt sidewalks shall be installed from the park entrance to provide pedestrian access to all the site amenities. The sidewalks will be constructed

in accordance with the City of Miami standards.

- Nine hundred fifty (950) lineal feet of 8'-0" wide mulch path shall be installed for extension of and use as a Vita Trail to be constructed as part of a future phase.
- A CMU dumpster enclosure (w/gates) shall be installed for the concession/restroom building in accordance with local code requirements.
- A bicycle rack with direct burial, as manufactured by DuMor Inc. (or equal), shall be installed near the ballfields. The bicycle rack will be provided with a 5'-0" x 5'-0" x 4" thick concrete maintenance pad.

<u>Main Entrance Park Sign:</u>

- A two hundred square foot (200sf) park sign shall be designed for and installed at the main entrance from Northwest 37th Avenue..
- The entrance sign will be constructed of 2" thick high density polyurethane board as ► manufactured by Sign Arts Products Corporation (or equal).
- The entrance sign shall be installed in accordance with the Florida Building Code to meet the wind load velocity requirements.
- Heavy-duty in-ground lighting, as manufactured by Kim Lighting (or equal), shall be provided to illuminate the new park entrance sign.

Site Electric and Lighting:

- A 3-phase electric service shall be installed to provide power for the ballfields, concession/restroom building, sanitary lift station, entry/exit drives and the Phase I parking lot lighting.
- Parking lot and driveway lighting shall be provided to meet the minimum standards required by the Miami-Dade County Code of Ordinances.
- All light poles shall be installed in compliance with FBC 2001 High Velocity Wind ► Zone requirements.

Site Utilities:

- The existing 24" water main located in Northwest 37th Avenue will be tapped to provide a 12" potable water service for this phase of the site that will supply the domestic water service to the concession/restroom building, the irrigation system and one (1) fire hydrant (to be located near the parking lot on the east side of the baseball fields).
- A 12" valved and capped potable water service will be provided on the south side of the ► proposed park entrance drive for "future" extension.
- The potable water system will be installed in PVC (schedule 40) pressure pipe/fittings and include a reduced pressure backflow preventer.
- The irrigation system shall be installed in PVC (schedule 40) pressure pipe/fittings and include a reduced pressure backflow preventer.
- The fire protection service will be installed in ductile iron pipe with mechanical joint

fittings and consist of a 12" double detector check valve assembly with a 1" backflow preventer (at sub-meter) and (1) fire hydrant..

- The gravity sanitary sewer system shall be installed in PVC (SDR-35) pipe and fittings. Sanitary manholes will be installed at every change of direction and as accessible cleanouts at the high ends of the system.
- An on-site sanitary lift station will be provided to collect the gravity sewage systems from each of the proposed structures and discharge into the existing force main located in Northwest 37th Avenue.
- Two (2) 8" "future" sanitary sewer service stub-outs for the banquet facility and the aquatic facility shall be provided.
- ► A 750 gallon grease trap shall be installed at the ballfield concession/restroom in accordance with Florida Administrative Code Chapter 64E-6.

Baseball Fields:

- Two (2) ballfields shall be designed to be two hundred fifty feet (250') from home plate to the foul poles and two hundred eighty to two hundred ninety feet (280'-290') from home plate to the center field fence.
- One (1) ballfield shall be designed to be two hundred feet (200') from home plate to the foul poles and two hundred forty to two hundred fifty feet (240'-250') from home plate to the center field fence.
- One (1) ballfield shall be designed to be one hundred seventy five feet (175') from home plate to the foul poles and two hundred to two hundred ten feet (200'-210') from home plate to the center field fence.
- The four (4) ballfield surfaces shall be constructed with rolled Bermuda Tifway 419 grass sod with a minimum of two inches (2") of growing soil.
- The drainage of the fields shall be designed to allow play to resume in one (1) hour after a one inch (1") per hour rain event.
- The drainage of the spectator area shall be designed to eliminate any standing water within one (1) hour after a one inch (1") rain event.
- Six inch (6") deep 60% clay/20% sand runways, infields and 16'6" wide outfield warning tracks shall be constructed at each ballfield.
- ► Four inch (4") deep x 13'-6" wide coquina sideline warning tracks shall be installed from the dugout to the outfield fence at each ballfield.
- One (1) ten inch (10") high pitchers mound shall be provided at each ballfield.
- A 25'-0" foul "hip" area shall be provided between the baseline and sideline fence and between home plate and the backstop.
- Each ballfield shall be provided with one (1) bullpen located between the dugout and the outfield fence along either the first or third baseline. The bullpen will be outside the field of play and consist of one (1) ten inch (10") pitchers mound and two (2) 10'-0" x 10'-0" three rail fence panels located one hundred (100) feet apart and perpendicular to the baseline fence.

- Each ballfield shall be provided with two (2) covered 9-gauge chain link dugouts located on the outside of the playing field. The dugouts will be 30'-0" long x 7'-0" wide x 9'-0" high and consist of a concrete slab, one (1) dugout gate, one (1) gate to the field and a 21'-0" long aluminum players bench with back support.
- Each ballfield will be provided with three (3) bases, two (2) home plates and two (2) pitchers mound rubbers as manufactured by Hollywood Bases (or equal).
- Each ballfield shall be provided with two (2) twenty foot (20') high yellow foul poles. The foul poles will be installed in accordance with FBC 2001 High Velocity Wind Zone requirements.
- ► A black vinyl coated 9-gauge chain link 30'-0" high backstop and 6'-0" high three (3) rail foul line fence shall be installed behind home plate and along the infield playing areas of each ballfield.
- ► A black vinyl coated 12-gauge core fence will be installed for all other areas of the ballfields.
- The outfield fence shall be a 6'-0" high two (2) rail black vinyl coated chain link and include "Poly Cap" along the top rail.
- Each ballfield will be provided with a "Batters Eye" back-round in the center and wind screen on the rest of the outfield fence.
- ► Foul ball netting will be installed behind the backstop and shall cover the bleacher areas at each ballfield.
- Two (2) 35'-0" long x 12'-0" wide x 15'-0" high chain link fence enclosed batting cages shall be constructed in the baseball field complex.
- ► The batting cages shall be covered with safety netting to prevent balls from leaving the enclosure.

- ► A field sport lighting system shall be provided for the ballfields with a minimum maintained fifty (50) foot candle average and a maximum to minimum ratio of 2:1 on the infield and a minimum maintained thirty (30) foot candle average and a maximum to minimum ration of 2 ½:1 in the outfield.
- The sport lighting systems shall be manufactured by Musco Lighting Inc. (or equal).

The ballfield sport lighting systems shall be provided with a separate electric power supply allowing it to operate independently of the park's other amenities.

Ballfield Concession/Restroom Building:

- A two story ADA accessible 2,360 square foot octagonal structure shall be constructed to include a concession area, a men's restroom, a women's restroom, a utility room, an electric room and an open-air scorer's deck.
- The second floor elevation will be at (\pm) fifteen feet above the first floor finish elevation in order to provide a clear view of the ballfields.
- ADA compliant walkways shall be installed to provided access to the concession/restroom Building.
- The concession/restroom building shall be constructed of reinforced concrete masonry units with filled cells, bond beams, and monolithic concrete foundations with a 4" reinforced concrete slab on grade.
- The roof shall be constructed of pre-fabricated wood trusses with 5/8" CDX plywood sheathing and 5-V crimp metal roof system (standard color as selected by owner). The metal roofing materials shall meet Miami-Dade product approval.
- The concession/restroom building roof shall also include a metal framed cupola with a 5-V crimp metal roof system.
- A metal overhang covering shall be installed between the two levels to provide shade and rain protection on the first floor.
- This Building will be provided with (1) ADA compliant "Limited Use/Limited Application" Elevator, as manufactured by Whirlteq (or equal), with a 1400 lb. maximum capacity. The clear inside dimensions will be 54" wide x 48" deep. The elevator includes automatic doors, an emergency stop/alarm, K-Tech telephone with voice announce, recessed lighting, emergency lowering feature and a twelve (12) month warranty.
- ► The building exterior shall be finished with painted 5/8" stucco (standard color as selected by owner).
- Aluminum intake louvers shall be installed in the exterior wall to provide make-up air into the restrooms, janitors closet and concession area. The louvers shall meet Miami-Dade product approval.
- Bahama shutters will be provided over each second floor opening to provide shade for those viewing the games.
- Roll up impact resistant doors shall be provided at each second floor opening for protection from the elements.
- ▶ The entry doors for the concession area, men's restroom, women's restroom, utility room, maintenance storage room and the electric room will be constructed of painted hollow metal with metal frames and shall meet with Miami-Dade product approval.
- All door hardware provided shall be vandal proof "Classroom" type.

Painted enory floors and base coves (standard color as selected by owner) shall be

installed in the concession area, concession storage, men's restroom and women's restroom.

- ► Floors in electric room, utility room, maintenance storage, elevator vestibule and second floor scorer's deck shall have a steel troweled concrete finish.
- ► The ceiling in the concession area, concession storage, men's restroom and women's restroom shall be epoxy painted 5/8" wallboard.
- Ceilings in the electric room, utility room, maintenance storage and the second floor scorer's deck shall be painted 5/8" wallboard.
- Fire rated frame walls will be installed around the Elevator Shaft Enclosure (1 hour).
- ► The concession area shall be separated from the other areas by a two (2) hour fire rated wall that shall be extended to the underside of second floor deck.
- Frame walls to be constructed of 20 gauge metal studs finished with painted 5/8" gypsum wallboard.
- The concession area will be provided with storage cabinets, counter tops, an impact resistant roll-up window (w/screen and stainless steel ledge), (1) 3-compartment sink, (1) hand sink, (2) floor drains, (1) hose bib and (1) ceiling mounted paddle fan.
- The concession area cabinet bases and counter-tops shall be constructed of 3/4" plywood with all surfaces receiving a plastic laminate coating.
- Two (2) fire extinguishers with recessed cabinets shall be provided to meet the all NFPA and Florida Building Code requirements.
- ADA signs shall be provided at each restroom as required by the Florida Building Code.
- Three (3) hexagonal picnic tables, (1) ADA compliant picnic table and two (2) hexagonal waste receptacles as manufactured by the Plastic Lumber Company (or equal) shall be provided.
- Scorer's counter tops and electric score board control panels shall be installed on the second level.
- Toilet accessories to be Stainless Steel as manufactured by Bobrick (or equal) and shall comply with the latest ADA regulations. The men's restroom shall be provided with (2) recessed towel dispenser/waste receptacles, (2) toilet tissue dispensers, (2) mirrors, (1) pair of grab bars and (2) soap dispensers. The women's restroom shall be provided with (2) recessed towel dispenser/waste receptacles, (3) toilet tissue/feminine napkin disposals, (2) mirrors, (1) pair of grab bars and (2) soap dispensers and (2) soap dispensers.
- One (1) diaper changing station shall be provided in each restroom.
- The toilet partitions shall be floor mounted, overhead braced. Urinal screens are to be designed for complete support to the wall structure. All mounting hardware to be a heavy duty design, using theft resistant one-way screws. All panels to be solid polymer resin 1" thick with uniformly machined radius edges. All partitions are to be connected to the wall with a continuous bracket. As manufactured by Santana (or equal).
- The men's restroom facilities shall consist of (1) water closet, (1) ADA water closet, (1) ADA urinal (w/carrier), (1) urinal (w/carrier), (1) counter-top lavatory, (1) ADA wallhung lavatory (w/carrier), (1) interior hose hib (w/loose tee key) and (1) floor drains.

- The women's restroom facilities shall consist of (3) water closets, (1) ADA water closet, (1) counter-top lavatory, (1) ADA wall-hung lavatory (w/carrier), (1) interior hose bib (w/loose tee key) and (1) floor drains.
- One (1) "bi-level" ADA stainless steel electric water cooler shall be installed on the exterior of the Restroom/Concession Building.
- A recessed wall hydrants (w/lockable box) shall be installed in the exterior wall of the Restroom/Concession Building.
- The janitors room shall contain (1) mop basin, (1) mop hanger and (1) hose/hose bracket.
- One (1) hot water heater (30 gallon) shall be installed above the mop sink.
- Domestic hot water piping shall be provided to the 3-compartment sink, hand sink, lavatories and mop basin.
- The men's restroom, the women's restroom, the janitors room and the concession areas shall be provided with mechanical ventilation in accordance with the Florida Building Code.
- An electric room shall be constructed to contain all the equipment associated with the main restroom/concession building electric service and shall serve as the distribution point for power to the surrounding ballfields.
- Vandal resistant flourescent lights, as manufactured by Kenall Manufacturing (or equal),
 shall be provided in the men's and women's restrooms.
- Wraparound flourescent light fixtures, as manufactured by Columbia Lighting (or equal), shall be provided in the concession area.
- Flourescent strip light fixtures with wire guards, as manufactured by Columbia Lighting (or equal), shall be provided in the janitors room, electric room and scorer's deck.
- Wall mounted vandal resistant light fixtures, as manufactured by Kim Lighting (or equal), shall be provided along the exterior of the restroom/concession building for security lighting. The security lighting shall be controlled with a timer.
- ► A lightning protection system in accordance with NFPA 780 and UL Publication 96A shall be installed for the concession/restroom building.

Landscaping/Irrigation:

- Landscaping shall be provided through-out the developed portion of the project in accordance with the City of Miami code requirements.
- Native species will be planted wherever possible.
- Bahia/Seashore Paspalum sod shall be provided in all areas of development except for the athletic fields.
- The athletic fields will be constructed of rolled Bermuda Tifway 419 grass sod with a minimum of two inches (2") of growing soil.
- Trees installed in the athletic field areas shall provide shade for people but be situated such that the Bermuda grass is not blocked from the sunlight for long periods of time.
- Jurigation controls shall be contained in lockable cabinets that will be hidden from the

view of public areas in the park.

- Irrigation systems shall be provided with rain/moisture sensors.
- An irrigation system that provides full coverage shall be installed for the athletic fields.
- ► A separate zone will be provided for each clay infield and a quick connect installed behind each pitchers mound.

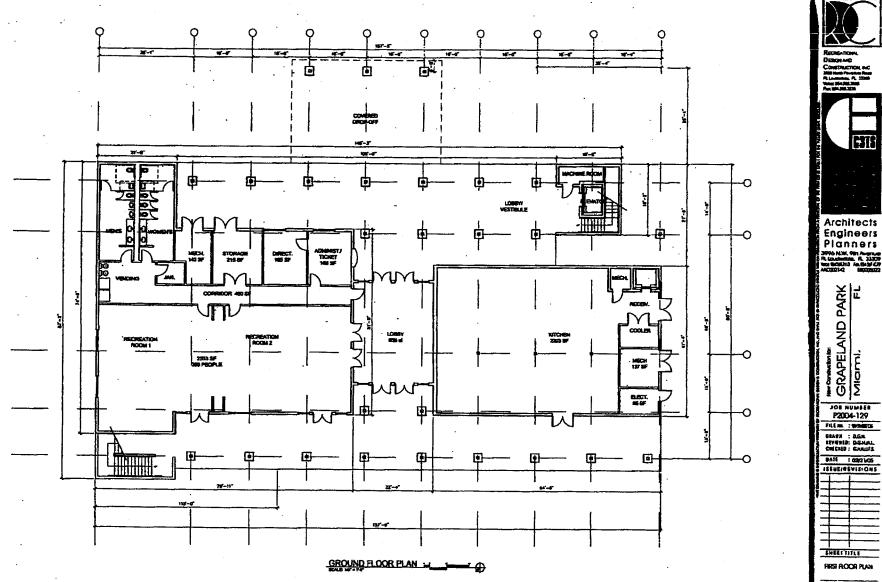
General Provisions:

- RDC shall be responsible to secure all required permitting.

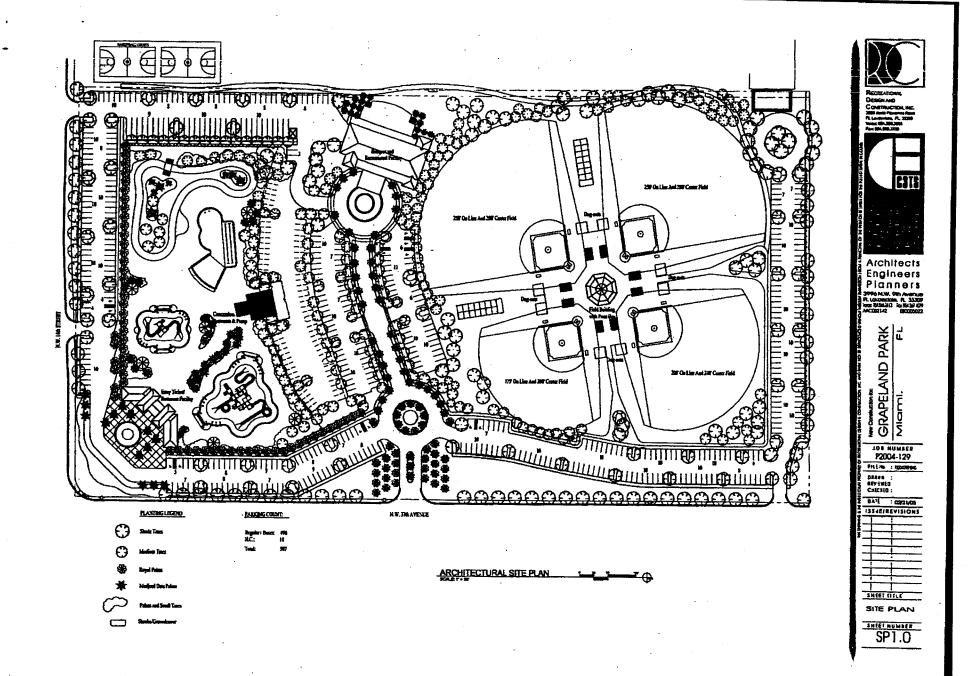

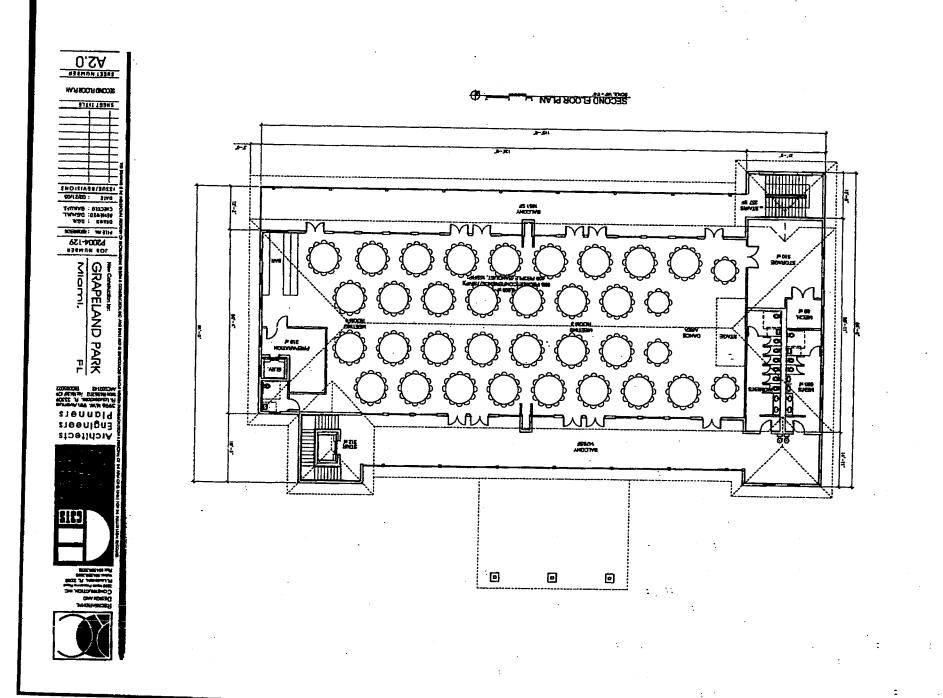
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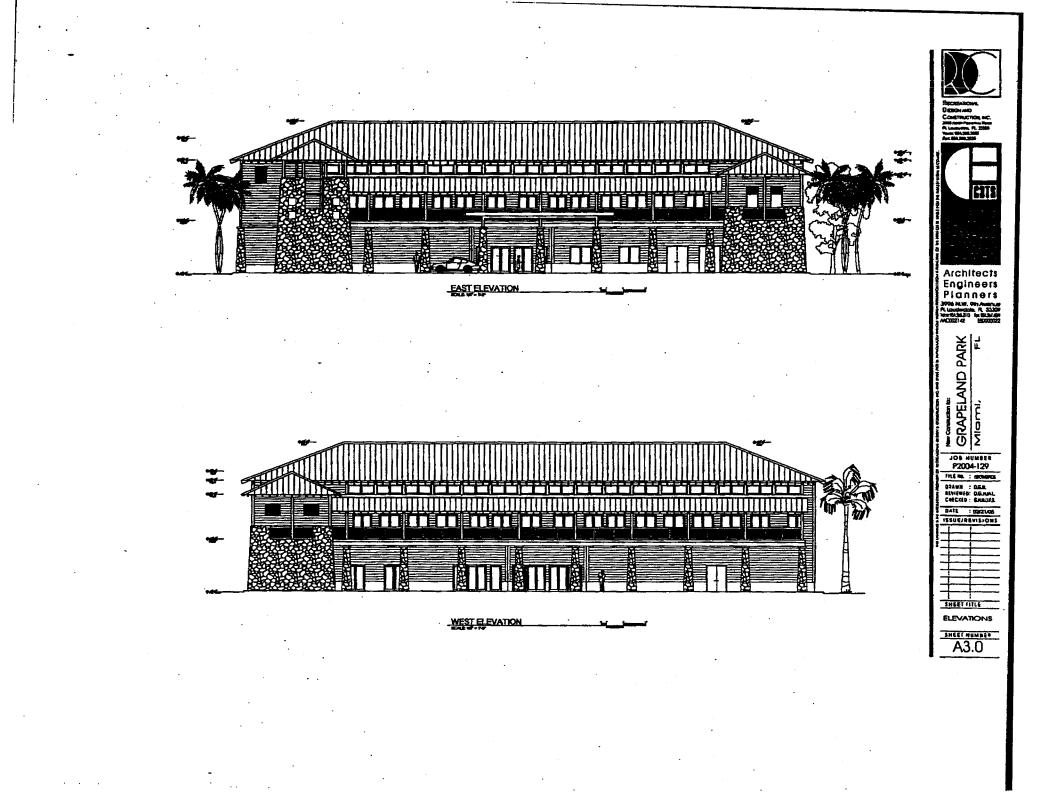


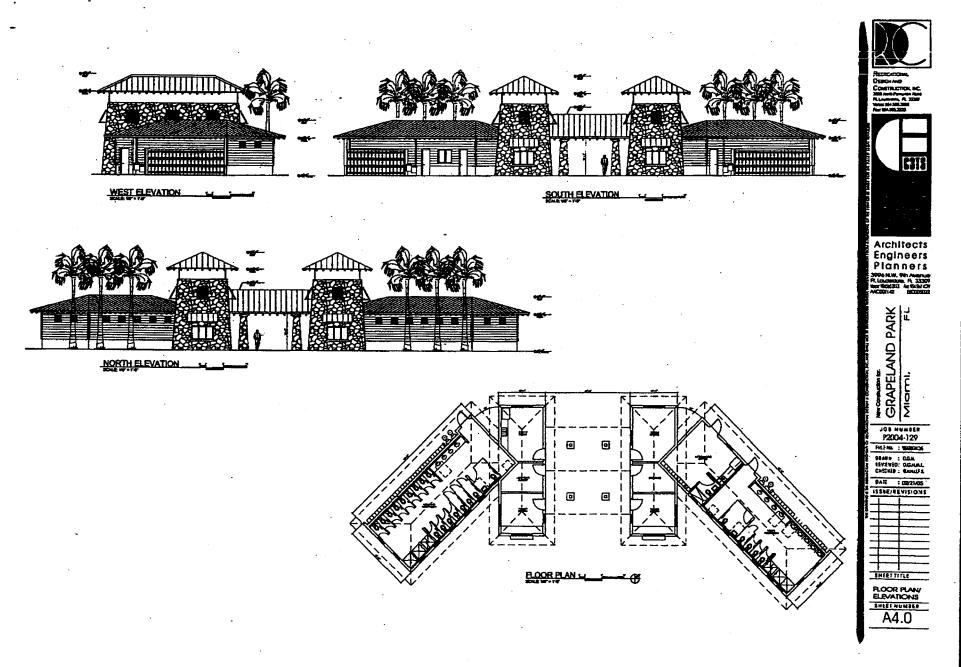
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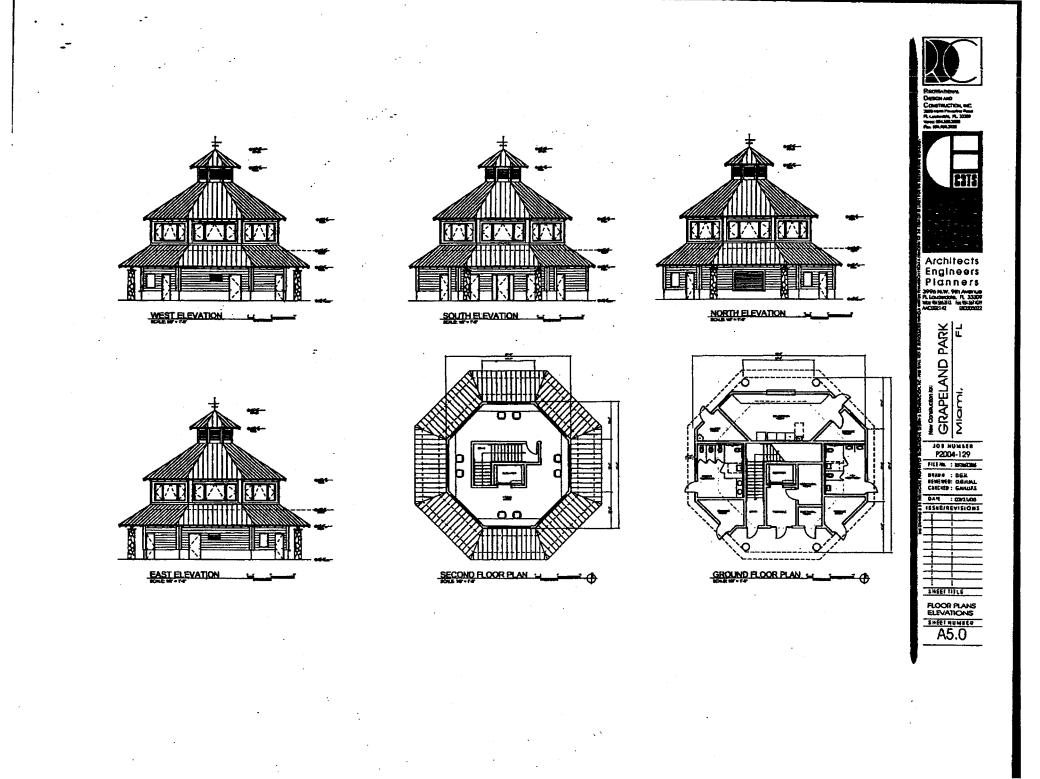


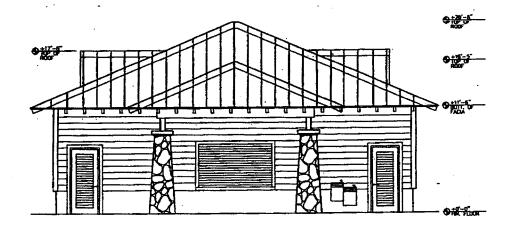
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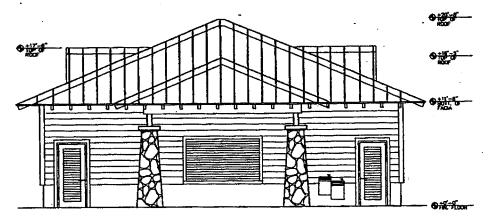




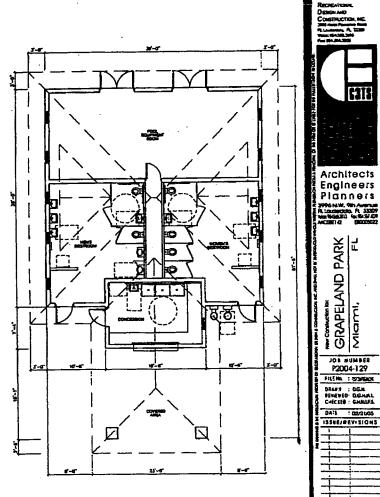




FRONT ELEVATION

POLICY STATEMENT

It is the policy of *Recreational Design & Construction, Inc. (RDC, Inc.)*, that disadvantaged businesses, as defined by 49 CFR Part 26, Subpart D and implemented by the Division of Equal Employment and Small Business Opportunity shall have the maximum opportunity to participate as subcontractors and suppliers on all contracts awarded by <u>City of Miami.</u>

DESIGNATION OF LIAISON OFFICER

RDC, Inc., has designated and appointed a Liaison Officer to develop, maintain, and monitor the DBE Affirmative Action Plan. The Liaison Officer will aggressively recruit disadvantaged businesses as subcontractors and suppliers for all contracts with <u>City of Miami</u>. The Liaison Officer will submit all records, reports and documents required by <u>City of Miami</u>, and shall maintain such records for a period of not less than three (3) years, or as directed by any specific contractual requirements of <u>City of Miami</u>. The Lialson Officer will be posted on the notice boards of the Company.

The following individual has been designated Liaison Officer with responsibilities for implementing the Company's SDBE Affirmative Action Plan in accordance with the requirements of <u>Clty of Miami</u>.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION METHODS

In order to formulate a realistic Affirmative Action Plan, RDC, Inc., has identified the following known barriers to participation by disadvantaged subcontractors:

- 1) Lack of qualified disadvantaged subcontractors in our specific geographical areas of work;
- Lack of certified disadvantaged subcontractors who seek to perform <u>City of Miami</u> work;
- 3) Lack of interest in performing on <u>City of Miami</u> contacts;
- 4) Lack of response when requested to bid;
- 5) Limited knowledge of <u>City of Miami</u> plans and specifications to prepare a responsible bid.

In view of the barriers to disadvantaged businesses stated above, it shall be the policy of RDC, Inc., to provide maximum opportunity by utilizing the following affirmative action methods to ensure DBE participation:

- 1) Provide written notice to all certified SDBE subcontractors in the geographical area where the work is to be performed;
- 2) Advertise in minority focused media concerning subcontract opportunities with the *RDC*, *Inc.*;
- 3) Select portions of the work to be performed by DBEs in order to increase the likelihood of meeting contract goals;
- 4) Provide adequate information about the plans, specifications and requirements of the contract, not rejecting subcontractors without sound reasons based on a thorough investigation of their capabilities;
- 5) Waive requirements of performance bonds where it is practical to do so;

IMPLEMENTATION

On contracts with specific DBE goals, *RDC*, *Inc.*, will make every effort to meet 20% contract goals as stated by utilizing its affirmative action methods. On projects with no specific goals, *RDC*, *Inc.* will, as an expression of good faith, seek to utilize DBE subcontractors where work is to be subcontracted.

REPORTING

RDC, Inc., shall keep and maintain such records as are necessary to determine the Company's compliance with its DBE Affirmative Action Plan.

1 The Contractor and the Surety, jointly and severally, bind themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns to the Owner to pay for labor, materials and equipment furnished for use in the performance of the construction Contract, which is incorporated herein by reference.

2 With respect to the Owner, this obligation shall be null and void if the Contractor.

2.1 Promptly makes payment, directly or indirectly, for all sums due Claimants, and

2.2 Defends, indemnifies and holds harmless the Owner from claima, demands, liens or suits by any person or entity whose claim, demand, lien or suit is for the payment for labor, materials or equipment furnished for the use in the performance of the Construction Contract provided the Owner has promptly notified the Contractor and the Surety (at the address described in Paragraph 12) of any claims, demands, liens or suits to the Contractor and the surety, and provided there is no Owner Default.

3 With respect to Claimants, this obligation shall be null and void if the Contractor promptly makes payment, directly or indirectly, for all sums due.

4 The Surety shall have no obligation to Claimants under this bond until:

4.1 Claimants who are employed by or have a direct contract with the Contractor have given notice to the surety (at the address described in Paragraph 12) and sent a copy, or notice thereof, to the Owner, stating that a claim is being made under this Bond and, with substantial accuracy, the amount of the claim.

4.2 Claimants who do not have a direct contract with the Contractor:

.1 Have furnished written notice to the Contractor and sent a copy, or notice thereof, to the Owner, within 90 days after having last performed labor or last furnished materials or equipment included in the claim stating, with substantial accuracy, the amount of the claim and the name of the party to whom the materials were furnished or supplied or for whom the labor was done or performed; and

2 Have either received a rejection in whole or in part from the Contractor, or not received within 30 days of furnishing the above notice any communication from the Contractor by which the Contractor has indicated the claim will be paid directly or indirectly; and

3 Not having been paid within the above 30 days, have sent a written notice to the surety (at the address described in Paragraph 12) and sent a copy, or notice thereof, to the Owner, stating that a claim is being made under this Bond and enclosing a copy of the previous written notice furnished to the Contractor.

5 If a notice by Paragraph 4 is given by the Owner to the Contractor or to the Surety, that is sufficient compliance.

6 When the Claimant has satisfied the conditions of Paragraph 4, the Surety shall promptly and at the Surety's expense take the following actions:

6.1 Send an answer to the Claimant, with a copy to the Owner, within 45 days after receipt of the claim, stating the amounts that are undisputed and the basis for challenging any amounts that are disputed. 6.2 Pay or arrange for payment of any undisputed amounts.

7 The Surety's total obligation shall not exceed the amount of this Bond, and the amount of this Bond shall be credited for any payments made in good faith by the Surety.

8 Amounts owed by the Owner to the Contractor under the Construction Contract shall be used for the performance of the Construction Contract and to satisfy claims, if any, under any Construction Performance Bond. 11 No.suit or action shall be commenced by a Claimant under this Bond other than in a court of competent jurisdiction in the location in which the work or part of the work is located or after the expiration of one year from the date (1) on which the Claimant gave the notice required by Subparagraph 4.1 or Clause 4.2.3, or (2) on which the last labor or service was performed by anyone or the last materials or equipment were furnished by anyone under the Construction Contract, whichever of (1) or (2) first occurs. If the provisions of this Paragraph are void or prohibited by law, the minimum period of limitation available to sureties as a defense in the jurisdiction of the suit shall be applicable.

12 Notice to the surety, the Owner or the Contractor shall be mailed or delivered to the address shown on the signature page. 13. # EXHIBIT "A" SCOPE

Metric Engineering, Inc. proposes to provide the services identified below for the project entitled "Virginia Key Beach Park Circulation Road and Parking Improvements, B-30184 & Sanitary Force Main Road Re-Construction, B-30199, pursuant to its Professional Service Agreement with the City of Miami for Transportation and Transit Professional Services, dated October 26, 2004.

#### I. GENERAL

The Virginia Key Beach Park Master Plan produced by WRT in November of 2003 calls for the restoration of the existing parking lot to the historical heritage requirements as recorded into the National Register of Historic Places. Metric will provide the construction documents for the restoration of area 1, area 2, area 3, area 4 and area 5 of the Virginia Key Park Restoration Project as shown in the plans prepared by ConsulTech. Metric will provide landscape plans based on the WRT Master Plan, for the restoration of the Parking Lot only (area 3). The proposed improvements include:

- 1. Pavement Restoration / Reconstruction.
- 2. Adding ADA ramp to pavilion adjacent to parking lot
- 3. Parking spaces distribution (including the addition of Handicap accessible spaces)
- 4. Drainage improvements.
- 5. Lighting
- 6. Landscaping for the Parking Lot.

The preliminary engineering construction cost provided in the ConsulTech memo of August 19, 2004 for the French drain alternative is \$ 548,038.14 and for the injection wells is \$778,500.00. The cost of lighting is \$420,000 base on a 1 foot-candle light distribution; and the landscaping cost is \$540,000 base in the Master Plan, for a total preliminary construction cost that varies from \$ 1,510,000 to \$1,740,000.

#### **II. SCOPE OF WORK**

#### **TASK 1 PRE-DESIGN SERVICES AND TESTING**

#### **Geological services**

- 1. Metric will retain the services of H.R. Engineering, Inc. (Geotechnical Engineer) to obtain pavement cores of the existing roadway pavement surface for determining the existing condition, as well as, percolation tests in order to determine the Hydraulic Conductivity of the subsoil.
- 2. Actual field location of tests will be offset to clear existing obstructions or utilities, if any. Utility clearance shall be obtained by the Geotechnical Materials Testing Engineer prior to performing the tests.

Metric will prepared a preliminary construction cost estimate.

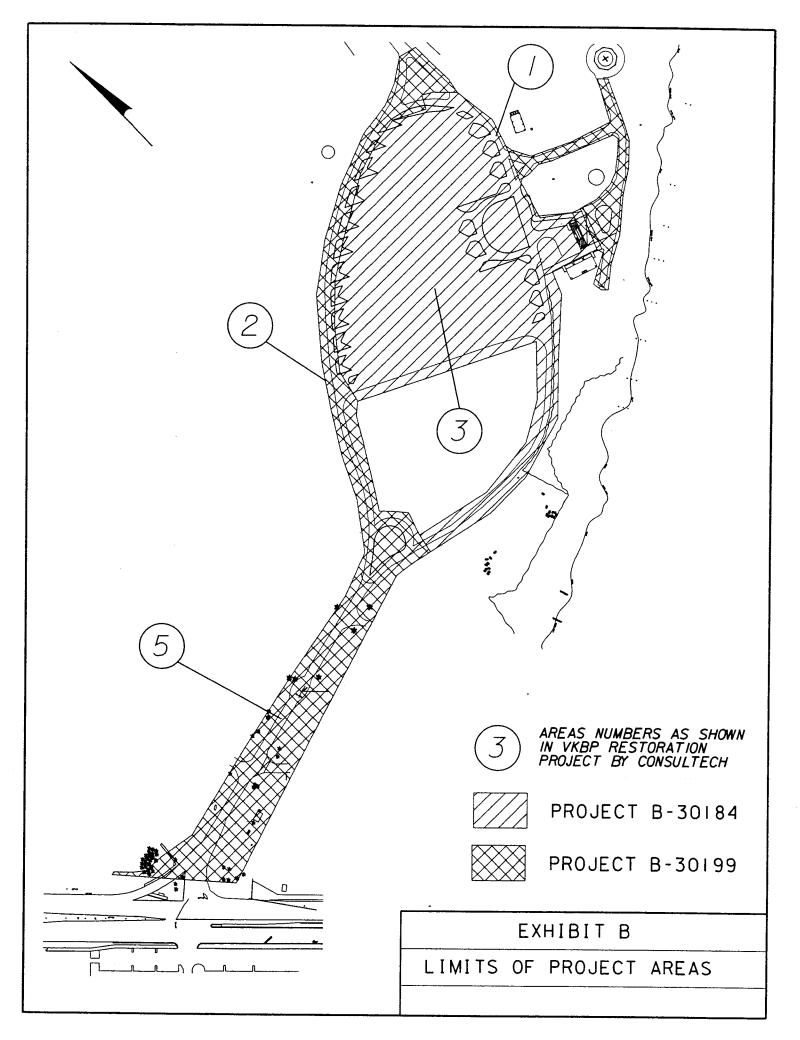

### CONSULTANT WORK ORDER PROPOSAL

TY Lin International / H.J. Ross proposes to provide the services identified below for the project entitled **"Tamiami Storm Sewer Improvements Project, B-50706**", pursuant to its Professional Service Agreement with the City of Miami for Storm Water Sewer/Road Improvement/Dredging Projects services, dated <u>October 6, 2004</u>.

### I. GENERAL

The City of Miami Department of Capital Improvements (CITY) proposes to provide drainage improvements for the area known as Tamiami Storm Sewer Improvements Project. The project covers the area bounded on the north by N.W. 7th Street, on the south by S.W. 8th Street between 57th Avenue and 61st Avenue. T.Y. Lin International / H.J. Ross (CONSULTANT) will provide preliminary drainage design services to reduce the flooding within this area of the City. The preliminary drainage design will be based on topographic surveys and geotechnical explorations along with available data gathered from the CITY and other sources. The data gathered will be used to develop a hydrodynamic model of the existing and proposed conditions and documented in a report format along with estimated cost comparisons for the drainage improvement alternatives in this area.

### II. SCOPE OF WORK

The specific work scope tasks to be performed by CONSULTANT and their subconsultants are:

### II.1 DATA GATHERING AND SITE VISITS

CONSULTANT will assemble existing information including: record drawings of existing utilities, topographic information, USGS Quad maps, FEMA flood maps, City drainage Atlas, aerial photographs, NRCS soils maps, plats, photographic or written documentation of past flooding conditions, as-built plans of drainage improvements, City Master Drainage plans and reports, other drainage studies or reports affecting the project area, etc.

CONSULTANT will conduct site visits to determine any existing conditions that may have an effect on the proposed improvements including the presence of major overhead transmission lines, the presence of grandfather trees, etc. CONSULTANT will document the site visits with dated digital photographs of identified areas. During the site visits, CONSULTANT may also interview residents to qualitatively assess historical flooding conditions.

### II.2 SUBCONSULTANT COORDINATION

CONSULTANT will retain a registered surveyor to obtain topographic information necessary to perform the preliminary drainage design services. CONSULTANT will also retain a geotechnical firm to provide subsurface explorations necessary to perform the preliminary drainage design services. CONSULTANT will coordinate with the surveyor and geotechnical engineer to prepare a scope of work for this preliminary drainage design. CONSULTANT will conduct meetings with these subconsultants, review their work, and coordinate with them to obtain the required services and deliverables.

### II.3 SURVEYING SERVICES

The project surveyor will provide a survey showing the following information:

- 1. Topographic Survey consisting of street cross section elevations @ 100 feet intervals, intersections, and at locations where a change of grade exists.
- 2. Rim elevation; invert elevation, pipe type and size for all drainage and sewer structures.
- 3. Surveyor will plot this information on a CITY provided digital base map.

CONSULTANT will determine extent of any additional survey information required once the preliminary model results are available. Survey elevations shall be based on City of Miami datum.

#### II.4 GEOTECHNICAL SERVICES

The project geotechnical engineer will perform subsurface soil explorations including hand augers, determination of seasonal high groundwater surface elevations, standard percolation tests, soil classification and preparation of a written report.

The geotechnical engineer will layout all boring and percolation test locations, contact Sunshine One-Call and meet all utility location personnel to avoid damage to underground utilities. Once field services are completed, a geotechnical engineer will visually classify soil samples and a written report of the test findings will be prepared. The report will address the following items:

- 1. Soil test boring records with material descriptions and depth to groundwater.
- 2. Determination of engineering characteristics of the subsurface materials encountered including classification, thickness, location and soil stratum.
- 3. Calculation and reporting of the soil's hydraulic conductivity k value.

### II.5 COORDINATION WITH REGULATORY AGENCIES

CONSULTANT will conduct pre-application meetings with relevant permitting agencies such as Miami-Dade Department of Environmental Resources Management (DERM), the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD), Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), and the Miami-Dade Department of Public Works. CONSULTANT will conduct these meetings to assess any agency requirements that may affect the preliminary drainage design of the project.

### II.6 HYDRODYNAMIC MODEL OF EXISTING CONDITIONS

Based on the above five tasks, CONSULTANT will prepare a hydrodynamic model of the existing conditions within the project limits. CONSULTANT will utilize either the computer program *AdICPR* or *XP-STORM* to perform the hydrologic and hydraulic calculations for the existing conditions. Hydrologic rainfall data used for the model will be based on published rainfall amounts and distributions obtained from SFWMD or DERM. CONSULTANT will perform the hydrodynamic model of the existing conditions for the following storm events: 5-year/24-hour, 10-year/72-hour, 25-year/72-hour, and 100-year/72-hour.

CONSULTANT will document the depth and flood duration for each critical junction during each storm event. Once the flooding areas and levels of flooding have been identified, CONSULTANT will establish existing conditions Levels of Service (LOS) and will rank and prioritize the flood problem areas for approval by the CITY.

### II.7 HYDRODYNAMIC MODEL OF PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

Based on the above CITY approved list of flood problem area priority sites, CONSULTANT will prepare a hydrodynamic model for up to three proposed alternatives to improve the existing conditions LOS within the project limits. Proposed drainage improvement alternatives may include exfiltration trenches, gravity storm sewers, detention/retention facilities, and pump stations. CONSULTANT will perform the hydrodynamic model of the proposed conditions for the following storm events: 5-year/24-hour, 10-year/72-hour, 25-year/72-hour, and 100-year/72-hour.

#### II.8 STORMWATER GENERAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT

CONSULTANT will prepare a Stormwater General Development Report with sufficient detail to depict proposed improvements and to document the findings of this project including:

- 1. Description of existing conditions, data gathered, documentation of meetings with regulatory agencies and a discussion of design criteria.
- 2. Description and recommendations of geotechnical exploration and conditions.
- 3. Hydrologic and hydraulic model results for each storm event for the existing conditions with levels of service.
- 4. Hydrologic and hydraulic model results documenting the depth and flood duration for each of the proposed alternatives for every storm event.
- 5. Stormwater General Development Plan (1"=200') for each proposed alternative showing any potential utility conflicts.
- 6. Levels of service afforded to accommodate the modeled storm events.
- 7. A preliminary estimate of probable construction cost for each proposed alternative.

CONSULTANT will then present the Stormwater General Development Report to the CITY for final approval before continuing with the Design phase services (to be negotiated).

#### II.9 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

CONSULTANT will prepare monthly written progress reports that include project information, project description, status description of each task item, updates on project schedules and budgets, and identification of any problems that may affect the project schedule, scope, or budget. CONSULTANT will conduct a monthly meeting with the CITY project manager to maintain steady communication. CONSULTANT will provide project management duties required to control the project including quality, schedule and budget. CONSULTANT will conduct internal monthly meetings with key project staff for the life of the project. CONSULTANT will maintain a program of quality control on this project, including review of work products by subconsultants.

### CONSULTANT WORK ORDER PROPOSAL

TY Lin International / H.J. Ross proposes to provide the services identified below for the project entitled **"Fairlawn Storm Sewer Improvements Project, Phase III, B-50704**", pursuant to its Professional Service Agreement with the City of Miami for Storm Water Sewer/Road Improvement/Dredging Projects services, dated <u>October 6, 2004</u>.

### I. GENERAL

Date

The City of Miami Department of Capital Improvements (CITY) proposes to provide drainage improvements for the area known as Fairlawn Storm Sewer Improvements Project, Phase III. The project covers the area bounded on the north by Flagler Street, on the south by S.W. 8th Street between S.W. 57th Avenue and S.W. 47th Avenue. T.Y. Lin International / H.J. Ross (CONSULTANT) will provide preliminary drainage design services to reduce the flooding within this area of the City. The preliminary drainage design will be based on topographic surveys and geotechnical explorations along with available data gathered from the CITY and other sources. The data gathered will be used to develop a hydrodynamic model of the existing and proposed conditions and documented in a report format along with estimated cost comparisons for the drainage improvement alternatives in this area.

### II. SCOPE OF WORK

The specific work scope tasks to be performed by CONSULTANT and their subconsultants are:

### II.1 DATA GATHERING AND SITE VISITS

CONSULTANT will assemble existing information including: record drawings of existing utilities, topographic information, USGS Quad maps, FEMA flood maps, City drainage Atlas, aerial photographs, NRCS soils maps, plats, photographic or written documentation of past flooding conditions, as-built plans of drainage improvements, City Master Drainage plans and reports, other drainage studies or reports affecting the project area, etc.

CONSULTANT will conduct site visits to determine any existing conditions that may have an effect on the proposed improvements including the presence of major overhead transmission lines, the presence of grandfather trees, etc. CONSULTANT will document the site visits with dated digital photographs of identified areas. During the site visits, CONSULTANT may also interview residents to qualitatively assess historical flooding conditions.

### II.2 SUBCONSULTANT COORDINATION

CONSULTANT will retain a registered surveyor to obtain topographic information necessary to perform the preliminary drainage design services. CONSULTANT will also retain a geotechnical firm to provide subsurface explorations necessary to perform the preliminary drainage design services. CONSULTANT will coordinate with the surveyor and geotechnical engineer to prepare a scope of work for this preliminary drainage design. CONSULTANT will conduct meetings with these subconsultants, review their work, and coordinate with them to obtain the required services and deliverables.

### II.3 SURVEYING SERVICES

The project surveyor will provide a survey showing the following information:

- 1. Topographic Survey with street cross sections @ 100 feet intervals, intersections, and at locations where a change of grade exists.
- 2. Rim elevation; invert elevation, pipe type and size for all drainage and sewer structures.

3. Surveyor will plot this information on a CITY provided digital base map.

CONSULTANT will determine extent of any additional survey information required once the preliminary model results are available. Survey elevations shall be based on City of Miami datum.

### II.4 GEOTECHNICAL SERVICES

The project geotechnical engineer will perform subsurface soil explorations including hand augers, determination of seasonal high groundwater surface elevations, standard percolation tests, soil classification and preparation of a written report.

The geotechnical engineer will layout all boring and percolation test locations, contact Sunshine One-Call and meet all utility location personnel to avoid damage to underground utilities. Once field services are completed, a geotechnical engineer will visually classify soil samples and a written report of the test findings will be prepared. The report will address the following items:

- 1. Soil test boring records with material descriptions and depth to groundwater.
- 2. Determination of engineering characteristics of the subsurface materials encountered including classification, thickness, location and soil stratum.
- 3. Calculation and reporting of the soil's hydraulic conductivity k value.

### II.5 COORDINATION WITH REGULATORY AGENCIES

CONSULTANT will conduct pre-application meetings with relevant permitting agencies such as Miami-Dade Department of Environmental Resources Management (DERM), the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD), Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), and the Miami-Dade Department of Public Works. CONSULTANT will conduct these meetings to assess any agency requirements that may affect the preliminary drainage design of the project.

#### II.6 HYDRODYNAMIC MODEL OF EXISTING CONDITIONS

Based on the above five tasks, CONSULTANT will prepare a hydrodynamic model of the existing conditions within the project limits. CONSULTANT will utilize either the computer program *AdICPR* or *XP-STORM* to perform the hydrologic and hydraulic calculations for the existing conditions. Hydrologic rainfall data used for the model will be based on published rainfall amounts and distributions obtained from SFWMD or DERM. CONSULTANT will perform the hydrodynamic model of the existing conditions for the following storm events: 5-year/24-hour, 10-year/72-hour, 25-year/72-hour, and 100-year/72-hour.

CONSULTANT will document the depth and flood duration for each critical junction during each storm event. Once the flooding areas and levels of flooding have been identified, CONSULTANT will establish existing conditions Levels of Service (LOS) and will rank and prioritize the flood problem areas for approval by the CITY.

#### II.7 HYDRODYNAMIC MODEL OF PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

Based on the above CITY approved list of flood problem area priority sites, CONSULTANT will prepare a hydrodynamic model for up to three proposed alternatives to improve the existing conditions LOS within the project limits. Proposed drainage improvement alternatives may include exfiltration trenches, gravity storm sewers, detention/retention facilities, and pump stations. CONSULTANT will perform the hydrodynamic model of the proposed conditions for the following storm events: 5-year/24-hour, 10-year/72-hour, 25-year/72-hour, and 100-year/72-hour.

#### II.8 STORMWATER GENERAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT

CONSULTANT will prepare a Stormwater General Development Report with sufficient detail to depict proposed improvements and to document the findings of this project including:

- 1. Description of existing conditions, data gathered, documentation of meetings with regulatory agencies and a discussion of design criteria.
- 2. Description and recommendations of geotechnical exploration and conditions.
- 3. Hydrologic and hydraulic model results for each storm event for the existing conditions with levels of service.
- 4. Hydrologic and hydraulic model results documenting the depth and flood duration for each of the proposed alternatives for every storm event.
- 5. Stormwater General Development Plan (1"=200') for each proposed alternative showing any potential utility conflicts.
- 6. Levels of service afforded to accommodate the modeled storm events.
- 7. A preliminary estimate of probable construction cost for each proposed alternative.

CONSULTANT will then present the Stormwater General Development Report to the CITY for final approval before continuing with the Design phase services (to be negotiated).

#### II.9 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

CONSULTANT will prepare monthly written progress reports that include project information, project description, status description of each task item, updates on project schedules and budgets, and identification of any problems that may affect the project schedule, scope, or budget. CONSULTANT will conduct a monthly meeting with the CITY project manager to maintain steady communication. CONSULTANT will provide project management duties required to control the project including quality, schedule and budget. CONSULTANT will conduct internal monthly meetings with key project staff for the life of the project. CONSULTANT will maintain a program of quality control on this project, including review of work products by subconsultants.

Subject: Increase in compensation to HDR, Inc. for Program Management Services for the Capital Improvement Plan implementation

### **Purpose of Item:**

To provide an increase in total compensation to the firm of \$1,700,000 for the continuation of program management services.

### **Background Information:**

The firm's services were procured from a competitively bid and awarded State of Florida Contract No. 973-001-00-1 for professional management skills. The services were first authorized by City Resolution No. 04-0010, adopted January 8, 2004. Subsequent Commission action has brought the total compensation to \$4,000,000 and the average invoice is approximatley \$287,600 covering up to 22 professional staff. An increase of \$1,700,000 is necessary so that the services may continue for the City's capital improvement program for an interim period of approximately six (6) months.

The firm has capably assisted the Department with the on-going implementation of the City's \$568 million Capital Improvements and Transportation plan by providing exceptional and efficient services in the areas of overall program management, planning, budgeting, information and data management, performance measurement and quality control, as well as horizontal project management and construction oversight. The firm's work has been particularly noteworthy in its creation and management of the City's first capital program database which tracks the financial, scheduling, and management aspects for each of over 1,000 capital projects, and in the area construction management, which will utilize 75% or more of all budgeted capital improvement dollars, for which the firm has furnished highly skilled contractors and trained construction managers with the demonstrated capability to reduce, if not eliminate, contractor claims and delays.

During the next 6 months, the Department will have issued a Request For Proposals to directly secure program management professional services for the continued implementation of the Capital Improvements and Transportation plan, with proposals to be received in March 2005, an award anticipated in April 2005, and approval of the negotiated agreement expected in May, 2005. The requested increase will enable the City to continue to use the firm's services for implementation of the Capital Improvements Plan until a new contract for such services is in place.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MIAMI CITY COMMISSION AUTHORIZING AN INCREASE IN COMPENSATION FOR THE PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES OF HDR ENGINEERING, INC., PREVIOUSLY APPROVED BY RESOLUTION NO. 04-0010, ADOPTED JANUARY 8, 2004, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000,000, INCREASING THE COMPENSATION FROM \$2,000,000 TO \$4,000,000 FOR PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES FOR MANAGEMENT SKILLS TO BE UTILIZED CITYWIDE ON AN AS-NEEDED CONTRACT BASIS; AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 04-0010 TO REFLECT SAID INCREASE; ALLOCATING FUNDS FOR SAID INCREASE FROM VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND SPECIAL REVENUE FUND PROJECT ACCOUNTS.

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 04-0010, adopted January 8, 2004, approved the procurement of professional consulting services for management skills from HDR Engineering, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Capital Improvements and Transportation has, in conjunction with HDR Engineering, Inc., reviewed the scope of services and estimated fees for on-going program management services and determined that an increase to the contract amount is warranted; and

WHEREAS, the City of Miami ("City") will continue to procure this service under State of Florida Contract No. 973-001-00-1, effective until May 13, 2005; and

WHEREAS, this contract will enable the City to continue to use professional consulting services to assist in the implementation of the \$568 million Capital Improvements Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MIAMI, FLORIDA:

Section 1. The recitals and findings contained in the Preamble to this Resolution are adopted by reference and incorporated as if fully set forth in this section.

Section 2. An increase in the compensation for professional consulting services of HDR Engineering, Inc., previously approved by Resolution No. 04-0011, adopted January 8, 2004, in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000, increasing the compensation from \$2,000,000 to \$4,000,000, for professional consultant services for management skills, to be utilized Citywide on a as-needed basis, is authorized.

Section 3. Section 2 of Resolution No. 04-0010, as amended, is further amended in the following particulars: {1}

The procurement of professional consultant services for management skills from HDR Engineering, Inc., for the Department of Purchasing, is approved, utilizing existing State of Florida Contract No. 973-001-00-1, effective until May 14, 2004 May 13, 2005, subject to further extensions or replacement contracts by the State of Florida, to be used Citywide on an as-needed contract basis, in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000 \$4,000,000, with funds allocated from Account No. 122001.250106.6.270 and Account Code No. 341330.319301. 6.270.

Section 4. Funds, in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000, for said increase, will be allocated from various Capital Improvements and Special Revenue Fund project accounts.

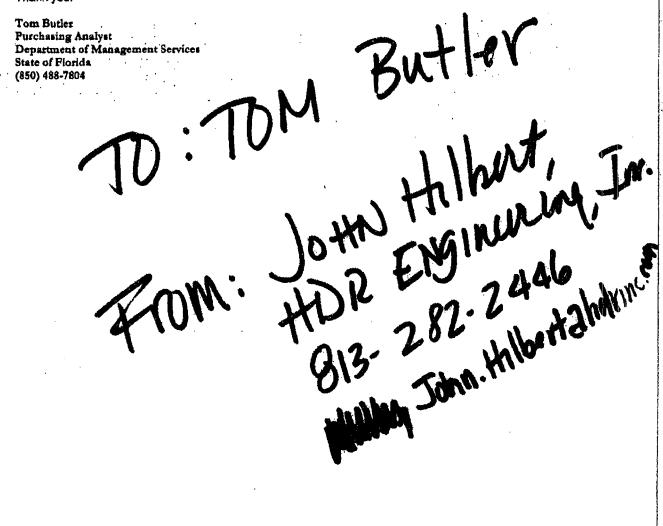

## State Term Contract No. 973-001-00-1 Amendment No. 1

THIS AMENDMENT, effective as of the last date signed below, is by and between the State of Florida Department of Management Services (the "Department") and the entity identified below as Contractor (the "Contractor") (collectively, the "Parties"), and amends State Term Contract No. 973-001-00-1 (the "Contract").

WHEREAS the Department is implementing an electronic procurement system, currently known as MyFloridaMarketPlace, (the "System") with the assistance of a third-party agent, Accenture LLP ("Accenture"); and

WHEREAS the Department wishes to include the Contractor and the Contract in the System; and

WHEREAS the Contractor desires to participate in the System; and

WHEREAS the Contract allows modifications in the event an electronic procurement system is implemented.

THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained below, and other good and valuable consideration receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

1. Registration. The Department shall allow the Contractor, following effective registration with Accenture, to participate in the System. The Contractor shall register in the System within ten (10) business days of the effective date of this Amendment. Contractor shall visit <u>www.mylloridamarketplace.com</u> and follow the appropriate instruction in order to register.

2. Transaction Fee. Effective April 1, 2003, the Contract provision entitled "Surcharge Fee and Summary of Total Sales" is deleted and replaced with the following "Transaction Fee" section. This Transaction Fee is in lieu of, and not in addition to, the surcharge fee authorized by section 287.1345, Florida Statutes (2002).

## Transaction Fee

The State of Florida, through the Department of Management Services, has instituted MyFloridaMarketPlace, a statewide eProcurement system. Pursuant to section 287.057(23), Florida Statutes (2002), all payments shall be assessed a Transaction Fee of one percent (1.0%), which the Contractor shall pay to the State.

For payments within the State accounting system (FLAIR or its successor), the Transaction Fee shall, when possible, be automatically deducted from payments to the Contractor. If automatic deduction is not possible, the Contractor shall pay the

Transaction Fee pursuant to Rule 60A-1.031(2), F.A.C. By submission of these reports and corresponding payments, Contractor certifies their correctness. All such reports and payments shall be subject to audit by the State or its designee.

The Contractor shall receive a credit for any Transaction Fee paid by the Contractor for the purchase of any item(s) if such item(s) are returned to the Contractor through no fault, act, or omission of the Contractor. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a Transaction Fee is non-refundable when an item is rejected or returned, or declined, due to the Contractor's failure to perform or comply with specifications or requirements of the agreement.

Contractors shall be responsible for reporting sales and paying user fees resulting from sales made by authorized resellers.

Failure to comply with these requirements shall constitute grounds for declaring the vendor in default and recovering reprocurement costs from the vendor in addition to all outstanding fees. VENDORS DELINQUENT IN PAYING TRANSACTION FEES MAY BE EXCLUDED FROM CONDUCTING FUTURE BUSINESS WITH THE STATE.

3. Electronic Invoicing. Notwithstanding any provision of the Contract, the Contractor shall supply electronic invoices in lieu of paper-based invoices for those transactions processed through the System. Electronic invoices shall be submitted to the Customer through the Ariba Supplier Network (ASN) in one of the following mechanisms – EDI 810, cXML, or web-based invoice entry within the ASN.

4. Catalog Data. Accenture is responsible for converting Contract catalog information into a format supported by the System. To accomplish this conversion, the Contractor shall provide certain information in electronic format directly to Accenture; alternatively, the Contractor may follow the "punchout" solution described in more detail below.

Within ten (10) days of written notice from Accenture, Contractor shall provide all information necessary to facilitate electronic purchases from this contract, or shall contract Accenture and begin work on the "punchout" solution described below. Such information may include, but is not limited to, Contractor name, SKU, brand/manufacturer, product name and brief description, unit of measure, and price. Contractor shall provide this information in the format requested by Accenture. No costs or expenses associated with providing this information shall be charged to the Department, Customers, or Accenture. With Contractor's timely assistance, Accenture shall create and maintain web-based placement of the requested contract information.

#### "Punchout" Alternative

The Contractor may offer, as an alternative to providing the information discussed above, an online "punchout" solution, in which the Customer accesses the Contractor's website directly from the System, rather than the System maintaining the Contractor's data. This solution must

allow the Customer to reach the Contractor's site, browse for contracted items only, and return to the System with a list of items ready to be inserted into a requisition. If Contractor selects this alternative, it must meet the following requirements:

- The solution must conform to cXML 1.0 or 1.1 standards.
- The solution must conform to the technical specifications and implementation requirements provided by Accenture, and the Contractor must work with Accenture to ensure successful integration of the punchout solution into the System
- The solution must have the capability to provide only those products awarded under the contract, and block any non-contract item(s) from being added to the requisition.

#### Warranty

For the purposes of this section, the Contractor warrants and represents that it is authorized and empowered to and hereby grants the Department and Accenture the right and license to use, reproduce, transmit, distribute and publicly display within the System the information outlined above. In addition, the Contractor warrants and represents that it is authorized and empowered to and hereby grants the Department and Accenture the right and license to reproduce and display within the System the Contractor's trademarks, system marks, logos, trade dress or other branding designation that identifies the products made available by the Contractor under the Contract.

If the Contractor is not the manufacturer, it shall be the Contractor's responsibility to obtain authorization from the manufacturer to comply with the provisions of this section, including securing any intellectual property rights of the manufacturer. If the Contractor is the manufacturer, it shall only authorize dealers, outlets, distributors, value-added resellers, etc. within their network that can comply with the provisions of the Contract.

5. Additional Modifications. The Department reserves the right to further revise the collection and reporting requirements in conjunction with alterations to the System.

6. Conflict. In the event any of the terms herein conflict with the terms of the Contract, the terms of this Amendment shall control. All other terms of the Contract remain in full force and effect. Contractor waives and releases any and all claims for additional compensation arising out of or relating to this Amendment.

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## SPECIAL CONDITIONS

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of this Request for Proposal is to establish a 36 month contract for the purchase of Professional Consulting Services for Management Skills by all State of Florida agencies and other eligible users in accordance with Eligible Users paragraph, General Conditions. It is anticipated that the contract will be effective from May 1, 2000 through April 30, 2003.

## **OPTIONAL CONTRACT USAGE**

In addition to the eligible users referenced above with the consent of the successful Proposer(s) purchases may be made under the terms and conditions of this Request for Proposal, by government entities located outside the State of Florida. Appropriate governmental entities' purchasing laws, rules and regulations shall apply to purchases made under this contract.

#### PURCHASES UNDER \$2,500

Agencies have the option to purchase from non-contract vendors provided the cost is below \$2,500. State agencies are encouraged to use the State Visa Purchasing card for all purchases under \$2,500.

#### SCOPE OF SERVICES

Contractors selected will provide consulting services in some or all of the following areas:

#### Category:

- A. Planning, Budgeting and Performance Measurements Consulting Which includes the following:
  - Needs Assessment Identify and develop assessment instruments, data collection methods, analysis, interpretation and public participation strategies.
  - Strategic Planning The development of long range outcomes, priorities and strategies for the agencies.
  - Performance Budgeting Implementation of the requirement of the Government Performance and Accountability Act of 1994.

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#### **ESTIMATED QUANTITIES**

It is anticipated that the State of Florida agencies, and other eligible users, will expend approximately \$2,000,000 under any contract resulting from this Proposal. These estimated figures are given only as a guideline for preparing your Proposal and should not be construed as representing actual figures under the contract.

The vendor shall guarantee that the contracting agency will be granted unlimited rights to reproduce, for the agency's use, materials and reports specifically developed for the department's requirements. If the vendor contemplates use of materials that are copyrighted, and charging a licensing fee for the right to reproduce or use such materials, the proposed cost of such a license shall be clearly presented by the vendor. Such information shall also be included in any material presented in response to later specific requests for services.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MIAMI CITY COMMISSION AUTHORIZING AN INCREASE IN COMPENSATION FOR THE PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES OF HDR ENGINEERING, INC., PREVIOUSLY APPROVED BY RESOLUTION NO. 04-0010, ADOPTED JANUARY 8, 2004, AS AMENDED BY RESOLUTION NO. 04-0209, ADOPTED APRIL 8, 2004 AND FURTHER AMENDED BY RESOLUTION NO. 04-0498, ADOPTED JULY 22, 2004, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$1,700,000, INCREASING THE COMPENSATION FROM \$4,000,000 TO AN AMOUNT GUARANTEED NOT TO EXCEED \$5,700,000, FOR PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES FOR MANAGEMENT SKILLS TO BE UTILIZED CITYWIDE ON AN AS-NEEDED CONTRACT BASIS; AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 04-0010 TO REFLECT SAID INCREASE; ALLOCATING FUNDS FOR SAID INCREASE FROM AVAILABLE INTEREST EARNINGS ON THE HOMELAND DEFENSE NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT BOND PROCEEDS.

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 04-0010, adopted January 8, 2004, approved the procurement of professional consulting services for management skills from HDR Engineering, Inc. ("HDR") under a currently effective State of Florida Contract No. 973-001-00-1; and

WHEREAS, additional approvals of the City Commission pursuant to Resolution No. 04-0209, adopted April 8, 2004 and Resolution No. 04-0498, adopted July 22, 2004 established total compensation to HDR in an amount guaranteed not to exceed \$4,000,000; and

WHEREAS, HDR has capably assisted the Department of Capital Improvements and Transportation with the on-going implementation of the City of Miami's ("City's") \$568 million Capital Improvements and Transportation plan by providing exceptional and efficient services in the areas of overall program management, planning, budgeting, information and data management, performance measurement and quality control, as well as horizontal project management and construction oversight; and

WHEREAS, HDR's work has been particularly noteworthy in its creation and management of the City's first capital program database which tracks the financial, scheduling, and management aspects for each of over 1,000 capital projects, and in the area construction management, which will utilize 75% or more of all budgeted capital improvement dollars, for which the firm has furnished highly skilled contractors and trained construction managers with the demonstrated capability to reduce, if not eliminate, contractor claims and delays; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Capital Improvements and Transportation has, in conjunction with HDR, reviewed the scope of services and estimated fees for on-going program management services and determined that an increase to the contract amount is necessary to cover an interim period of approximately six (6) months; and

WHEREAS, during this interim period, the Department will have issued a Request For Proposals to

directly secure program management professional services for the continued implementation of the Capital Improvements and Transportation plan, with proposals to be received in March, 2005, an award anticipated in April, 2005 and approval of the negotiated agreement expected in May, 2005; and

WHEREAS, said increase will enable the City to continue to use HDR's professional consulting services, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the State of Florida Contract No. 973-001-00-1, to assist in the implementation of the Capital Improvements Plan until a new contract for such services is in place; and

WHEREAS, the City's Chief Procurement Officer had previously determined that this State of Florida Contract was entered into pursuant to a competitive process in compliance with City laws; and

WHEREAS, funds for this increase are available from interest earnings on the Homeland Defense Neighborhood Improvement Bond proceeds;

* Presentation by Deputy Fire Chief Maurice Kemp. Chief Kemp provided the Board with a list of items needed by the Fire Department, including the need for an incident command post, technical rescue vehicle, terrorist cache vehicle, domestic security/terrorist cache equipment, decontamination showers, sampling/monitoring equipment, fiber optic and listening devices. The Fire Department is gearing up to handle incidents involving a massive level of individuals, such as the Department has never had to consider handling before.

* Board Member Marko made a recommendation that the Fire Department's list be referred to the Audit Committee for consideration.

* Vice Chairman Reyes suggested that there was no need for further discussion or consideration of the list, noting that the list of needs was very straightforward.

* Chairman Flanders inquired as to whether funding could be scaled back after it is determined at what level Congress would provide funding to the Fire Department.

* Assistant City Manager Rollason suggested perhaps line item entries could be done and sources of funding could be changed on line items, depending on what other sources of funding become available to the Fire Department.

The work has been completed. \$67,942 have been spent with remaining balance of slightly over \$22,000. Two improperly bounded underground tanks were found, pulled and the area was cleaned. # Incident Command Vehicle

This vehicle will serve as a Mobile Command Post on the scene of major incidents. The vehicle will be equipped with wireless Internet access to allow access to other agencies, databases and the City's Communication center.

# Technical Rescue Vehicle

The Department of Fire-Rescue's Technical Rescue Team specializes in confined space, trench and high angle/rope rescues. The team operates out of fire station 6. This vehicle will be used to store specialty equipment used by the team and for the rapid transport of this equipment to the scene.

# **Terrorist Cache Vehicle**

This vehicle will be used for storage and rapid transport to the scene of the cache during a manmade or naturally occurring disaster.

# **Domestic Security/Terrorist Cache Equipment**

This equipment will include the following:

- Antidotes/Medicines These drugs will be used for the rapid treatment of a large number of individuals. The victims treated could include rescue personnel as well as citizens.
- Medical Equipment This equipment will be essential for providing treatment at mass casualty incidents.

# THE CITY OF MIAMI, FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF FIRE-RESCUE

- Level "A" Protective Suits Fully encapsulated suits will protect fire personnel while operating in a chemical or biological environment.
- Decontamination Showers Will be utilized to decontaminate a large number of people at a major chemical or biological incident.
- Atmospheric Sampling/Monitoring Equipment This equipment will be used to sample and monitor. The equipment will determine the presence of chemical, biological or radiological agents.
- Fiber Optic & Listening Devices This equipment will be used to look and listen for trapped victims in confined spaces or beneath collapsed structures.
- Tents These tents will be used to provide shelter for rescuers and citizens during extended operations.
- Portable Air Conditioners Will be used to expedite the physical rehabilitation (recovery) of rescue personnel working a major incident. May also be used to cool civilians during extended operations.
