Re: Homeland Defense/Neighborhood Improvement Bond Oversight Board (BOB)

Annual Report for the Year 2007 as per Sec. 2-890 of the City Code

Pursuant to City Code Section 2-890 (Annual Report of City Boards and Committees), please accept this memorandum as the annual report of the BOB for the year 2007 in the manner and format prescribed in the City Code as follows:

City Code Question No. 1: Whether the board is serving the purpose for which it was created?

BOB Response: Miami's first ever BOB was created in 2001 by the City Commission to serve in an advisory capacity to the City to oversee and monitor implementation of the proceeds of the \$255 Million in Bond Funds for Miami's Capital Improvement Projects (CIP). Armed with the input and vision from the Mayor's office and City Commissioners, augmented with the assistance and education from the City Manager's office and CIP Department, the BOB continues to diligently fulfill its purpose.

City Code Question No. 2: Whether the board is serving current community needs?

BOB Response: City Administration estimates the City of Miami's current unmet capital needs exceed \$1.5 Billion. Bond proceeds and other funds currently available for Miami's CIPs total \$650 Million, about 1/3 of the total needed.

Keeping in mind the fairest interests of the entire community and with an eye on Miami's \$1 Billion shortfall for Capital Improvements, the BOB stays on-track by observing the prudent guidelines we established for all CIPs brought before us: A.) Is the project and its budget on the list specifically identified by the City Administration and set forth in informational pamphlets and media releases prior to the November 2001 election, or in the City Ordinance (as amended) creating the BOB, or one of the Commissioner's prioritized personal district projects or been sent to us by the City Commission as an item approved by their resolution and thereby recommendation?

B.) Have all available matching grants been applied for and the funds secured? C.) Has the CIP and its budget been approved by the CIP Department and secured the approval of all of the City's Boards having an interest and by the BOB Audit Committee? D.) Will the CIP be purchased, implemented and/or constructed within the timeframe that the BOB has established? E.) What is the actual cost of operation and maintenance and has a line item been established in the City's Budget for the following year to reflect the cost of operation and maintenance of the new item and/or facility?

City Code Question No. 3: A list of the board's major accomplishments.

BOB Response: During its 5th year, the BOB continued in its role as the Mayor's, Commission's and the taxpayer's watchdog to oversee Miami's CIP program, and in my personal opinion our finest achievement this year has been all of the ground-breakings and ribbon cutting ceremonies held to initiate and/or complete many projects. More city parks are now flourishing, Little Haiti Park is well along and with Miami-Dade County's participation, an enhanced community oriented Police Training Facility has moved into the design stage.

Aware that the Miami Commission's creation of the Homeland Defense/Neighborhood Improvement Bond Oversight Board was a historical first, BOB members feel relevant in their important role in restoring the public's trust in the City's fiscal ability to raise general obligation bond funds and to insure that the funds are spent wisely on the intended improvements, with no fraud, waste or abuse. Earning the taxpayer's trust allows us to continue improvements in the City's infrastructure. In the 3rd quarter of 2007, and with the highest bond rating in decades, we returned to the bond markets for the second tranche of \$50 million. leaving a balance of \$49 million of the \$255 still available.

The Audit Sub-Committee members continue to hold their meetings whenever necessary to review new projects and to monitor the progress of existing projects; reporting their findings at the next BOB meeting so that immediate action can be taken. We streamline the CIP process whenever possible; to execute the increasing project load quickly. Audit Sub-Committee and BOB members continue to solicit the vision and goals of the Commissioners and the Mayor so that we function with them in mind.

We salute the dedication and professionalism of the City Staff members that allow us to operate effectively. We thank them for their significant contributions and the special devotion shown to us by the whole CIP Department.

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Good communication greatly improves public awareness of Miami's successful CIP program, and our BOB Communications Sub-Committee focuses on that. The BOB monthly meetings are televised live from Commission Chambers, and are rebroadcast several times each month, and our BOB user-friendly website within Miami's Official Website is constantly updated so citizens may easily learn when, where and how their CIP funds are spent. We respond to the media's requests for information and we again endorse the creation of a quarterly or bi-annual Miami CIP Citizen's Newsletter.

City Code Question No. 4: Whether there is any other board, either public or private, which would better serve the functions of this board?

BOB Response: To our knowledge – no other board – either public or private – has been created and educated to specifically address Miami's Capital Improvement Projects program. The BOB is unique.

City Code Question No. 5: Whether the ordinance creating the board should be amended to better be able to serve the purpose for which it was created?

BOB Response: With many successfully completed projects under its belt, BOB has proven its worth and value to the City and one way in which the Ordinance might better serve the purpose for which it was created would be to amend it to make the BOB responsible for oversight of all of Miami's CIP. We may also consider a slight reduction of the operating quorum.

City Code Question No. 6: Whether the board's membership requirements should be modified?

<u>BOB Response:</u> In our opinion, no condition exists that would warrant any change at this time.

City Code Question No. 7: The cost, both direct and indirect, of maintaining the Board?

BOB Response: Much of the city staff's time is voluntary, so the annual cost of maintaining the Board for 2007 remains difficult to estimate. As the portion of staff salaries attributed to the Board include employees from the City Manager's office, the CIP Department, Law, Media Relations and any other city department required to assist in the function of the Board, the actual cost would have to include both personnel and other indirect City expenses.

City of Miami Closes on Bond Issue for **Neighborhood Improvement Projects and** Saves Tax Payer Dollars

-Refinancing of Series A Bonds Saves the City Over \$4 million-

(Miami, FL.)- The City of Miami has closed on a bond issue that will add funding for improvement projects throughout the city's neighborhoods without affecting the millage rate for residents and saving more than \$4 million in previously-issued debt.

"This represents a significant accomplishment for Miami, especially at this time when cities across Florida are restructuring their budgets to accommodate tax cuts mandated by the state," said City Manager Pete Hernandez.

This Homeland Defense/Neighborhood Improvement Project Bond was approved by Miami voters in 2001 and is broken down into two series of debt: Series 2007A totaled an estimated \$103 million and was issued to refinance approximately \$106 million of outstanding Series 2002 Bonds for an overall savings of \$4.8 million in future debt service payments. Series 2007B totaled \$50 Million to provide new money proceeds for improvement projects within the City.

"We are excited about the City's ability to issue debt at lower cost to our tax payers," said Chief Financial Officer Larry Spring. "It is a testament to the hard work and financial diligence the City has instilled since the financial crisis.

The debt millage on residents' tax bills will not be increased due to the level of new construction within the City. The planned repayment source for the bond issues is ad valorem taxes

In addition to avoiding a millage increase and saving money, the total bond issue has a solid interest rate of 4.7% due to positive bond ratings from all agencies. In March, 2007, Fitch Ratings upgraded the rating of the City of Miami's ad valorem tax bonds to an 'A-' from a 'BBB+' and the general obligation tax bonds to an 'A' from an 'A-.' Moody's Investors Service has maintained the city's General Obligation Bond rating at an A2. Standard & Poor's has also maintained its "A" rating and stable outlook for the city.

The bonds mature in 2028.
